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



DOUBT

The desire to be able to prove the existence of a divinity has troubled humanity since human consciousness first became aware of the divine. To this very day we are fond of saying that any number of things--from sunsets to hot fudge sundaes--are "proof that there is a God." We get so caught up in the story of "doubting Thomas" that we fail to notice that today's Gospel gives us John's account of Pentecost, the bestowing of the Holy Spirit upon the disciples following the Resurrection. Thomas, evidently, missed out not only on seeing the Risen Christ, but receiving the Holy Spirit as well. This is not to be taken lightly and, perhaps, makes Thomas' disbelief a bit easier to comprehend. It also makes his professing that Jesus is his Lord and God--the only time the New Testament explicitly refers to Jesus Christ as "God"---more remarkable.

NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

SECOND SUNDAY OF EASTER

One of the stranger facts of the Second World War was the survival of 1,500 Jews in the city of Berlin. Their continued existence relied on a mixture of cunning, courage, luck and determination on their part. An unexpected group of Germans-- from lovers to employers who hid employees in their factories-- also assisted them. As one employer dryly remarked: "When the penalty for hiding one is the same as for hiding seven, you may as well be hung for a sheep as a lamb." On the other hand, betrayal could come from those on whom the Jews might have hoped to rely.

As the Gestapo arrived at an apartment block, one couple-- a mother and son-- sought refuge with neighbors, having first taken the precaution of locking the main door. Christmas carols drifted from inside the apartments, as one neighbor after another refused them, as if they had never known them. There was certainly no room in the inn. In the end, a stranger, a little old lady, ushered them speedily into her home and hid them under her bed. When the Gestapo arrived, they passed swiftly by such an insignificant and obviously law-abiding person.

Most of the survivors moved away from Berlin at the end of it all. But, as one survivor said, "What the Nazis also achieved was to make me Jewish." What, in the beginning for some, had been a forgotten or unheeded characteristic became not just the reason for persecution, but also a focal point of pride and belief.

In its original form, John's gospel concentrates the stories of the resurrection and the gift of the Holy Spirit into one chapter. Then, as if it was by popular request, John tags on another final chapter, with further supportive resurrection experiences.

The summary of the earlier chapter offers concise points of reflection on the risen Lord. To appreciate them fully, we have to read them against the background of the whole gospel; their significance has already been traced for us by John in the body of the gospel text. John's gospel, more self-evidently than the synoptic gospels, is imbued throughout with the presence of the risen Lord.

The two themes, which dominate today's gospel, reflect the usual pattern used by John, of gift and response. Jesus appears as the bringer of peace and the giver of the Holy Spirit. What is asked in response from his followers is faith, as the indispensable channel for the new life in the Spirit.

Throughout the gospel Jesus has illustrated, through signs and teaching, his special relationship with the Father, a relationship which enables him to bring people into a new way of living. Jesus is now recognized in his gift of peace and in his life-giving wounds. The disciples are filled with joy at seeing him; Jesus empowers them with the Holy Spirit, who will enable them to forgive sins and remove the blindfolds we put on ourselves.

The story of Thomas shows how difficult this can be, if Jesus does not physically show himself to us. John uses this story of doubt to end his gospel with a reminder of the great need for faith. It is such faith that will enable the persecuted early Christians to discover true life in the presence of the Lord.

We can find many barriers on the path to accepting the new life of the risen Lord. There is the lack of faith which dulls our perception, preventing us from seeing God's power working through us and in his world. There is sin, depression, sometimes even despair. There is our heavy investment in secular preoccupations and our failure to make the links between them and the divine life, which can be celebrated in them.

Faith is not a purely intellectual adherence to the Creed or the truths taught by the Church. Openness of mind and heart, nourished by prayer, the sacraments and our fellowship with other believers, allows us to discern God's love at work in us and in the world. Just as we recognize the risen Lord through his gift of peace and through his wounds, so we, too, express our faith through the giving and receiving of peace and through the living out of our own woundedness and vulnerability.

Blessings of the Risen Lord—Alleluia!!!

Don't be reasonable

Musing about the ideal frame of mind for artists and writers, the English romantic poet John Keats wrote that they must be "capable of being in uncertainties, mysteries, doubts without any irritable reaching after fact and reason." He called this state "negative capability." The prospect of abiding in uncertainty might feel uncomfortable for us ordinary folks, but Keats understood that where uncertainty, mystery, and doubt exist, anything can happen. It's the place where miracles are possible; in fact it's where the risen Christ resides. As the church continues the celebration of the Resurrection of Jesus, today might be a good day to ponder Keats' idea. For the remainder of the Easter Season try to refrain from "any irritable reaching after fact and reason."

MONDAY, APRIL 16

EASTER WEEKDAY - What makes for faith?

Before the stories that would become scripture were written down, one wonders what ordinary daily life was really like for those who had heard, were touched by, believed in, even loved and followed Jesus. Scripture would one day testify to the Resurrection, but in those first years what made believers so adamant that they were able to stand up to rejection and persecution was a trust in God and the witness of others, an act of abandonment to love. Everyone has a story of how they came to believe, of persons and experiences who challenged their faith and of those who deepened and confirmed it. Remember your story and thank those who supported you today.

TODAY'S READINGS: Acts 4:23-31; 1 John 3:1-8 (267) "They were all filled with the Holy Spirit and continued to speak the word of God with boldness."

TUESDAY, APRIL 17

EASTER WEEKDAY - Be prepared to testify

In the Book of Acts we are told that "with great power the apostles bore witness to resurrection." In fact, says Benedictine monk Columba Stewart in a recent article in *National Geographic*, "the apostles were the movement's cutting edge, spreading the message across the vast trade network of the ancient world and leaving small Christian communities in their paths." This missionary zeal is passed on to each new generation of Christians, but it takes different forms. Today although many Christians still travel to foreign lands to serve the poor and give witness to Christ, believers are also encouraged to evangelize—spread the gospel—within their own homes, parishes, and local communities. How is your evangelization going? Hint: They should know you are Christian by your love.

TODAY'S READINGS: Acts 4:32-37; John 3:7b-15 (268) "We speak of what we know and we testify to what we have seen."

WEDNESDAY, APRIL 18

EASTER WEEKDAY - Let the light shine

The Good News should not—and cannot—be contained. Every attempt to keep it under wraps fails in the long run. Even trying to snuff it out by persecuting and putting its messengers to death only leads to more growth. Just look at Jesus: his gospel spread like wildfire fol-

lowing his execution. Or the apostles: The more they were hauled in by the authorities for preaching about Christ, the more zealous they became. The "light" of Christ, John's gospel says, "came into the world" to shine. It was not something to hide from. Draw close to that light, and share it with others.

TODAY'S READINGS: Acts 5:17-26; John 3:16-21 (269) "Go and . . . tell the people everything about this life."

THURSDAY, APRIL 19

EASTER WEEKDAY; HOLOCAUST MEMORIAL DAY Do what has to be done

The theme of this year's Holocaust Memorial Day is "Choosing to Act: Stories of Rescue." One story recounts the saving actions of an entire town in France. From 1940 to 1944 the residents of Chambonsur-Lignon hid nearly 5,000 Jews, mostly children, from the Nazis. As they were being honored for their heroism, they replied, "How can you call us good? We did what had to be done." The answer, of course, is that countless others did not do what had to be done. Spend some time today browsing the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum website, *ushmm.org*, and read the inspiring stories posted there. Then look around: What needs to be done?

FRIDAY, APRIL 20 - EASTER WEEKDAY

With Jesus the future is now

Although we Christians "wait in joyful hope" for Jesus to come again, remember that he also remains with us. He's in the Eucharist, of course, but you can also find him offering a comforting hand on the shoulder of a homeless mother. He waits in line at a food pantry and serves meals at the soup kitchen. He sits in a prison cell and is there visiting prisoners. He looks out through the eyes of an emotionally troubled person, and he patiently teaches someone to read. He gives and receives. Jesus is in all of us. He only asks that you recognize him.

FEAST OF ANSELM, BISHOP, DOCTOR OF THE CHURCH Just married: Faith and reason

Modern arguments often begin by asserting the fundamental conflict between faith and reason. Since the Middle Ages, however, theologians have insisted no such conflict exists. Just ask Saint Anselm. Between Augustine in the fourth century and Aquinas in the 13th, Anselm was considered the greatest thinker in Western Christianity. And he insisted ignorance alone, not religion, kept us from genuine understanding. "O whole and blessed truth, how far You are from me who am so close to You! . . . NEW HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES DIRECTIVES AND CHRISTIAN MORAL PRINCIPLES PART I: THE HISTORY OF THE ISSUE

The universal healthcare legislation signed into law on March 23, 2010 under the formal name, "**The Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act**" was designed to provide affordable health care for the citizens of the United States. On January 20, 2012, the Secretary of Health and Human Services, Kathleen Sebelius announced a proposed mandate requiring <u>all</u> insurance plans to pay for contraception, sterilization and abortion drugs. Everyone would have one year to comply and those who do not comply with the new directive will be fined, the amount predicted to be in the millions of dollars.

The mandate has been reported in many of the major news outlets and continues to make the headlines. It is imperative that every Catholic have a "working" knowledge of the present controversy because it directly impacts our ability to freely practice our faith and live it. Never before in the history of our country has such a potential attack on religious freedom been more evident. For this reason, a series of columns will be devoted to informing you about the potentially harmful effects of the new law upon the Church and individual conscience. Just recently, the Administration has retreated from their original position by suggesting insurers pay for contraception coverage and not religious institutions. However, the complicated issue needs further analysis and all the facts presented before a sound judgment can be made whether or not the new proposal respects the right of conscience and the dignity of the human person.

The History of the Issue

On January 20, 2012 the Department of Health and Human Services of the United States Government mandated that all institutions and businesses who offer employees health insurance must include contraception, "morning after drugs" and sterilization as part of an employee's health plan. In simple terms, those institutions are required to pay an employee's portion which includes the Church as an employer and the employee himself to pay for services the Administration calls "reproductive health" and which the Church deems are immoral practices. The Department of Health and Human Services was quick to point out that religious institutions would be exempt from complying with the mandate.

However, the exemption the Department of Health and Human Services was offering was a very narrow exemption which included only individuals who work specifically for a church or parish who at the same time share the same faith of those institutions. In other words, in order to be exempt, the Church must prove to the government the persons they hire or current employees are of the same faith and working specifically for the values a parish or place of worship espouse. The problem with the exemption is the mission of the church extends beyond the local parish to include services for the common good and for society in general, which includes but not limited to serving the poor, medical care and education. Under the mandate, those agencies would not be included in the exemption. It includes Catholic Hospitals, Catholic Universities, Catholic Schools, charitable institutions like Catholic Charities or any other organization which helps or provides a service to society supported and run by the Catholic Church.

For those hospitals, universities and agencies not exempt, what the mandate (as indicated the agreement reached still needs to be studied) would force them to do is pay to support what the Church holds are against her teaching as revealed to us by Jesus Christ. Those women who want contraception, sterilization or the morning after pill would not be required to pay for those prescriptions and services out of their own funds; rather, everyone who pays into the system would fund those services. In other words, any women who choose to get contraception would receive it free of charge, without a co-pay or deductible of any kind. Any person or institution that views such services as against their beliefs has to support the plan whether they like it or not. Hence, the Church rightly claims the policy is an attack on the "right of conscience" which means the freedom not to engage in activities in opposition to one's conscience. Practically speaking, under the law a person will be forced to participate in an evil act even if his/her own conscience is telling them it is wrong.

The issue at hand and outlined above, would be tantamount to cooperation in the evil act itself. By point of illustration: everyone knows it is wrong to steal money that is not theirs. Let's say, someone wants to rob a bank. He believes the only way he can do this is with an accomplice who sits and waits in the getaway car while the other accomplice goes into the bank to steal the money. The person sitting in the car is not actually robbing the bank per se, but is a "cooperator" in the evil act of stealing money from the bank. Rightly, the driver of the getaway car is equally guilty of the crime. But what if the person in car does not want to participate in the heist, but has to because a law said he has to? In this example, the law is demanding the driver of the car be a willing participant to an activity he knows in his heart and conscience is wrong. The law therefore, is unjust because the law is taking away the basic God-given freedom of the driver to say "no" to an activity he/she knows is wrong. Such is the case with the mandate that would require the Church or individual believers to participate in activities they believe are immoral by forcing them to pay for pharmaceuticals and procedures which go against their belief made known by their conscience.

As stated previously, the Administration has come up with a new plan which is being analyzed now to see if it protects the right of conscience and religious freedom granted by the First Amendment and supports the dignity of the human person. Next week will be devoted to any changes and the explanation of a person's right of conscience and religious freedom.

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
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
