



NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

SECOND SUNDAY EASTER 2013

Wounds are something that we all receive at some time during our lives. We can receive them through surgery, and even in the process of giving birth. People can be injured on building sites, doing agricultural work, working in a factory, or while taking part in sports and hobbies. As well as physical wounds, life can wound our moral and spiritual side too. Children treated cruelly can grow up with deeply wounded personalities. Somebody treated with contempt or disdain by a loved one can be badly hurt. We often talk about "broken hearts" in reference to love affairs that have gone wrong. Cardinal Richelieu, the famous seventeenth-century statesman, thought that "Wounds inflicted by the sword heal more easily than those inflicted by the tongue."

There can also be a certain pride in wounds. One Roman poet wrote that a soldier lists his wounds like a shepherd counts his sheep. There is a famous speech in Shakespeare's HENRY V, when King Henry imagines the veteran of a battle boasting of his wounds: "Then will he strip his sleeve and show his scars and say, 'These wounds I had on Crispin's day." Wounds and scars can be a sign that we have really lived, and suffered, and have experienced the harder side of life.

As Christians we believe that the whole human race is wounded in a quite drastic way. We are all born wounded by the effects of original sin. We are still basically good, having been created by God, but our minds, wills and hearts are impaired. It was to repair this damage, and to raise us up to share his divine life, that Christ came.

Wounds are central to today's Gospel reading. Although we refer to Thomas as "doubting", he does actually have a point. He believes that the other apostles have seen something, but he is not sure that it is the real Christ. What makes Christ real for Thomas is the reality of his suffering, represented by his wounds. The authentic risen Christ, for Thomas, must still bear the marks of his real, earthly life, a life marked by suffering as well as by miracles and joy. Unless he can handle the wounds made by the nails and the spear, Thomas is worried that the apostles may be imagining a false Christ untouched by earthly reality, and especially the reality of his terrible death. Are they trying to pretend that all those terrible things never happened?

There is always a temptation to imagine Christ the way we want to see him, rather than as he is himself. A Jesus unmarked by suffering, who has not confronted sin and death, is not the real Christ. Jesus retains the wounds humanity inflicted on him, precisely to remind us what we are capable of, and to show how much he loves us. His wounds become the source of our healing. The blood and water that flowed from his side became, in words from the Missal, "the fountain of sacramental life in the Church". Jesus' wounds are also a powerful witness to the continuity between his earthly body and his risen, glorious body.

Jesus also gives the apostles the gift of the Spirit, and grants them peace. He shares his authority with them, and helps them understand who he is and what he has done for them. We too share in this gift of the Spirit in baptism and confirmation. We begin, even in this life, to share in God's divine life, God's self-understanding. That is why we can see in the wounded Christ not just an executed outcast, but the divine savior of the world.

By living a sacramental life in the Church, we become more and more like our wounded savior. We learn to appreciate more our own woundedness and the wounds that others have received. We begin to recognize our own need for healing.

To the best of our ability we can help heal the wounds of the world around us. Often we are so harassed by everyday trials that we can forget to be positive, grateful, encouraging. Perhaps we can ask forgiveness from someone we have hurt, or gently try to reconcile others who are at odds. Perhaps we can try to speak or think more positively about the people in our lives, our family and friends, or even those we find trying or difficult. A small act of kindness, or encouraging words, can go a long way to foster healing and to create more positive relationships.

On this Divine Mercy Sunday we hear, as we do every Sunday, the words "This is the chalice of my blood...which will be poured out for you...for the forgiveness of sins..."

Do I truly hear and really heed the words of God's mercy that are spoken to me? Do these words make a difference?

DO NOT BE AFRAID

Did you notice? Today is called the "Second Sunday of Easter," not the "First Sunday after Easter." Our celebration of Easter is not over. These Sundays of Easter continue to present the mystery of Jesus Christ's victory.

The readings begin with the "signs and wonders" abounding in those earliest days. Sick people lay in the street, hoping that at least Peter's "shadow might fall on one or another of them." Then, in a powerful passage from the book of Revelation, the visionary falls down "as though dead" upon seeing the victorious Christ. But Christ extends a gentle touch: "Do not be afraid . . . once I was dead, but now I am alive forever."

In the Gospel, that same Christ appears and breathes on the disciples, and gently leads Thomas to believe. This Christ—more powerful than any evil force, victorious over death itself—touches us and whispers, "Do not be afraid."



LUCKY SEVENS ...

From the bible to casinos, seven is often considered to be a magical, perfect, and lucky number. Jesus told us to forgive those who hurt us seventy times seven times. Clearly he meant that to mean infinity. Genesis speaks of the seven days of creation, scripture speaks of seven archangels, and the Book of Revelation speaks of the Seven Seals of Revelation. The bible is saturated with the number seven. It would take several pages just to list the references.

What is true for the Christian bible is paralleled elsewhere: There are seven lucky gods of good fortune in Japanese mythology, and the Buddhists believe that Buddha walked seven steps at his birth. In Judaism, there are seven days of mourning, the weekly Torah is divided into seven special sections, there are seven blessings recited at a Jewish wedding, the Jewish bride and groom are feted for seven days, and there are seven primary emotions attributed to God. In the Islamic tradition, there are seven heavens and seven earths, seven fires in hell, seven doors to heaven, and seven doors to hell.

And then there are these facts connected to the number seven: There are seven continents in the world, seven colors to the rainbow, seven days in a week, seven basic musical notes, seven stars in the Big Dipper, and seven celestial bodies visible to the naked eye. Seven is the calling code for telephones in Russia. In North America, major-leagues baseball, basketball, and hockey all decide their final championships through a seven-game series, and seven is the jersey number chosen by many elite athletes, including Mickey Mantle. Casinos too like the number seven. Lining up a row of sevens is the route to many a jackpot.

Jesus, Judaism, Islam, Buddhism, nature, the measurement of our weeks, Russian telephone codes, major league sports, Mickey Mantle, and casinos - now that's an audience! It's no accident that there are lots of lists of "sevens":

For example: we have all kinds of theological and church-lists of seven:

Christian theology speaks of the Seven Gifts of the Holy Spirit: Wisdom, Understanding, Council, Fortitude, Knowledge, Piety, and Fear of the Lord. Of Seven Deadly Sins: Pride, Envy, Wrath, Sloth (Acedia), Greed, Gluttony, and Lust; and of Seven Corresponding Heavenly Virtues: Humility, Kindness, Patience, Diligence, Charity, Temperance, and Chastity. It also speaks of the Seven Last Words of Jesus: "Father, forgive them for they know not what they do"; "Truly I say to you, today you will be with me in paradise"; "Father, into your hands, I commend my spirit"; "Woman, this is your son ... This is your mother"; "My God, my God, why have you forsake me?"; "I thirst";

"It is finished".

Mohandas Gandhi spoke of Seven Social Sins: Politics without principle, wealth without work, commerce without morality, pleasure without conscience, education without character, science without humanity, and worship without sacrifice. To this, Roman Catholics have added Seven Themes of Catholic Social Teaching: The life and dignity of the human person; the call to family, community, and participation; rights and responsibilities; the option for the poor and vulnerable; the dignity of work and the rights of workers; solidarity; and care for God's creation.

Catholics have Seven Sacraments: Roman baptism, confirmation, Eucharist, reconciliation, healing of the sick, holy orders, and matrimony. Seven Corporal Works of Mercy: Feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty, clothe the naked, shelter the homeless, visit the sick, visit the imprisoned, and bury the dead. And Seven Spiritual Works of Mercy: Instruct the ignorant, counsel the doubtful, admonish sinners, bear wrongs patiently, forgive offenses willingly, comfort the afflicted, and pray for the living and the dead. Moreover, Roman Catholics venerate the Seven Sorrows of Mary: The prophecy of Simeon, the flight into Egypt, the loss of the child Jesus in the temple, meeting Jesus on the way of Calvary, Jesus dying on the cross, receiving the body of Jesus in her arms, placing the body of Jesus into the tomb.

And of course, not least, we have the famous Seven Wonders of the World, though now there are arguments as to what precisely constitutes that list: Some argue for the original list, The Seven Wonders of the Ancient World, others propose The Seven Wonders of the Modern World, some speak of The Seven Wonders of the Contemporary World, and still others affirm that the real wonders of this world are constructed by nature and they list instead The Seven Natural Wonders of this World.

So what's the true list? What, in fact, constitutes the Seven Wonders of the World?

Recently this story appeared on the internet: A teacher asked her students to name The Seven Wonders of the World. A number of students, with the help no doubt of electronic gadgets, quickly produced the various lists. One young girl, however, without any electronic research, produced her own list. The Seven Wonders of the World, she submitted, are: seeing, feeling, tasting, smelling, touching, breathing, and loving. That list, I believe, trumps all other lists and includes all the sacraments.



TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

An ancient title for this Sunday is *Dominica in Albis*, or "Sunday in White." During the Easter Vigil, the newly baptized are invested with a white garment, a sign that they have put on Christ. At one time, the garments were worn for a full week of celebration and reflection, and on this Sunday the newly baptized would appear in their robes again in their new place among the faithful for Eucharist.

In later centuries, the energy of new life at Easter was largely forgotten, and this Sunday was renamed "Quasimodo Sunday," or "Low Sunday." In recent years, with the recovery of the insight that Easter is the privileged time for celebrating and renewing baptism, there is nothing "Low" about this Sunday. At a week's distance, the beauty and grace of our Easter celebration is sustained by joyful alleluias, the blessing and sprinkling of holy water, and the comfort of the Lord's presence to us. He is risen, and he summons us together, opening up the scriptures for us, breaking the bread, filling us with new life.


