



NOTES FROM FATHER BOB ...

NINETEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME 2013

The words "Seize the Day" can help our understanding of the meaning of Christian discipleship. St. Luke describes some people in the early Church who are paralyzed by fear. Fear prevents them from truly accepting the message of the kingdom of God and keeps their hearts tied to their securities. What are these securities? For some, it is wealth; for others, it is attachments to patterns of life incompatible with being Christian. Rather than generosity and love, small-mindedness or resentments bind the heart to old hurts. Whatever the security, Luke challenges the Christians to reflect about their treasure. To what is the heart attached? What binds it and prevents it from truly living the gospel? Does the heart truly find its treasure in God? For most people, freeing the heart for God can be a lengthy process.

In contrast, Christian life is characterized by freedom and risk. The Christian will be alert and ready to meet the Master. "Seizing the Day" is not about living life half-heartedly, but rather living life to the fullest, as a gift from God. The author of the Book of Wisdom celebrates the deeds of God in freeing the people of Israel from slavery in Egypt. In this, God made his people glorious and called them into a new relationship with him. The author praises the way in which God keeps his people safe and protects them, even in tragedy. Many times the people of Israel wanted to return to Egypt, where they knew security and a familiar pattern of life as slaves. Freedom is much harder to live. Protecting them with love, God called them onward into the strangeness of the desert, unknown territory, and towards the Promised Land. Only after forty years—through uncertainty and struggle—did they reach this place. Many never saw the final goal and although they died before reaching it, their hope encouraged others towards it.

The same journey of faith is shown in the lives of Abraham, Sarah and their descendants, who left home to travel to God's Promised Land. They died in faith, without receiving all the gifts which had been promised, but glimpsed them on the distant horizon. The image of leaving home is a powerful symbol, which calls for risk and a journey into uncertainty, in order to find true freedom. Like Abraham and Sarah, many know that they can trust in God, but do not see or know the route of their earthly journey.

Lived faith knows the life of uncertainty and unpredictability. Often it has to cope with tragedy, which it cannot understand. After the shock and denial--maybe through anger or depression—there has to be a surrendering, if life is to continue. Without wanting to underestimate the pain and difficulty of this process, the readings show that it is only the promise of God's love, which can be guaranteed. In faith, the disciple is called to love the gift of life. The world is graced by God and gifts abound. To root one's heart in the promise of God's love will lead to freedom and joy in life. It helps one to savor each moment and live it to the fullest. One builds up true life in heaven through love.

This mission which was entrusted to all of us by virtue of our baptism must be a lived reality, linked to the particular circumstances of people living in a given period of time.

In the spring of 2009, Cardinal George requested that a strategic plan be developed for the Archdiocese to guide its efforts over the next five years to evangelize, form and renew parish vitality - to assist us in being faithful to our baptismal call.

A Steering Committee was formed who observed and collected research on the faith life of Catholics in the Archdiocese of Chicago to determine the needs of the parishioners within their parishes. The result was the Strategic Pastoral Plan. This document recommended focusing on these areas: evangelization, formation, parish vitality, vocations and social justice.

As a way of incorporating and supporting these initiatives, the Steering Committee proposed that the Archdiocese launch a series of "Years of...". Each year would focus on a particular topic with some suggestions for implementation of the above named areas.

Year 1 (July 2011-2012): Year of Teens and Young Adults.

Year 2 (2012-2013): Year of Sunday Mass. Year 3 (2013-2014): Year of Parent Formation. Year 4 (2014-2015): Year of the Sacraments

The over-riding goals of this plan are to revitalize, challenge, and engage the faith life of Catholic Christians — to pay attention to and be more deliberate in our calling to know, love, and serve our God and our neighbor —to move from cradle Catholic to committed Catholic.

This year the focus is on Parent Formation. It is also referred to as the Year of Strong Parenting or Parents Raising Faith-filled Children. Don't stop reading those who are not parents or whose children are grown. Remember "It takes a village...". We are the body of Christ. We all affect one another - for better or worse.

As in the two previous years, we will be printing a word a week in the bulletin. It is a value or virtue that can be applied to all of us in our daily lives- in our homes— in our workplace — in school- in our parish- where our faith is lived. It is not limited to any single group of people. Each of us individually and all of us together share in this mission.

Each day is a gift. Treasure it.

YEAR OF FAITH

Faith Is More Than a Chance by Brian Butler

"Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen."—Hebrews 11:1

During my high school years in the Northeast, I had my own "snow day policy": If two or more inches of snow accumulated before dinner, I set aside my books. I figured that more snow would fall overnight, and so felt justified taking a step of "faith" and skipping my homework, banking on the fact that the next day would be a snow day.

Exercising faith in God, however, is more than "taking our chances," as we sometimes do in life. Christian faith asks more from us, not less. When we take chances, we usually are trying to get away with something, like less responsibility, less sensitivity, less self-control, less generosity, etc. Christian faith calls for constant vigilance, a heightened awareness to the slightest "unseen"—but felt—movement of the Holy Spirit; it is a call to give more of ourselves. Thus, today's Gospel reading reminds us: "You also must be prepared, for at an hour you do not expect, the Son of Man will come" (Luke 12:40).

While living by faith is not easy, it can be an adventure. Even though we should exercise prudence in our lives, prudence is a natural virtue. Faith, though, is a theological virtue. Faith, hope, and love are the three God-given gifts that allow us to cultivate other natural or human virtues, such as patience and generosity.

Sometimes faith will inspire us to do something that, on the face of it, doesn't make rational sense—because the impulse comes not from our human reason but by a prompting of the Spirit. However, as we learn to obey these "inner promptings," we may discover an increase in the natural virtues as well.

So when your conscience tells you to wait for the next bus for some "unseen" reason ... wait. Then watch how the conversation with the passenger next to you grow into something meaningful. When the same little voice in your heart, for no apparent reason says, "Cut your neighbor's grass," or "Bake your sister's family some muffins" or "Go to morning Mass before work today," or "Give \$10 to that homeless man" you can say "yes," like Mary did. You may not know what lies ahead, but if we take a small step of faith, chances are that God will be right there to give us more of himself, not less.

The Food Pantry is truly a group effort—a labor of love—as was demonstrated so clearly in the August 8 monthly distribution. We received donations—monetary, food, both non-perishable and produce—to ready us for 250 families. Many hours were donated by the men and women who carried over goods from the food bins; sorted and checked dates; shelved items; packed bags of groceries; shopped locally and at the Greater Chicago Food Depository for groceries to supplement donations; sorted and bagged produce; carried over bags and extras from the rectory to set up the Church vestibule for distribution; registered and greeted client families with a smile and kind words; helped families to choose their extras and pre-packed bags and to carry their groceries to their cars; cleaned up the Church after distribution.

I have often heard this comment: "There is sure a lot of hard physical work involved. Why do volunteers do it so cheerfully and faithfully?" I believe the answer is simple. You do it because it is what Jesus asks of us. You take to heart the words of Jesus: "whatever you do for the least of these, you do for me." Bountiful thanks to all of you! Your efforts truly make a difference in the lives of many in our community, who continue to struggle financially.

- Our most urgent needs are **cereal**, **boxed sides**, **dry pinto beans** (2-3# bags work best for us) **diced tomatoes**, **soups**, **cookies**, **crackers**, **snacks and condiments** (ketchup, mustard, cooking oil, salad dressing).
- Please drop off your donations in the designated bins in the Church narthex. Thank you!
- Beginning on August 10, our Adult Service Project team is painting/refreshing our Food Pantry and the rectory basement. Watch for more on this in future Canticles, when the project is completed!
- Every two years we re-register our Food Pantry clients, to update family information. This process will take place in Church on August 15.
- Jeffrey Wolf will be completing his Eagle Project at the August 15 re-registration, when he distributes school supplies to our Food Pantry families with school age children. Jeff has worked hard and continues to be amazed and thankful for your generous support of this project. Watch for pictures and details in a future Canticle.
