

# NOTES FROM FATHER BOB ...

### TWENTY-FIRST SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME 2013

The story is told of two elderly priests, both nearing the end of their days, who made a pact. Whichever of them died first, he would return and tell the other what life beyond the grave was like. Eventually Fr. Joe died and was buried. Some months later Fr. Bill was sitting in his room. It was Saturday night; he was busy preparing his homily – or was it watching football? In any event, he suddenly became aware of a presence: Fr. Joe was standing there before him. "Joe," he gasped "it's you. Tell me, what it is like in heaven?" "Well," replied Joe "you'd be surprised who's there." There was a pause: "And you'd be surprised who isn't," and with that he was gone.

It was hardly the answer Bill had expected. Much the same might be said of the man who questioned Jesus in today's gospel. He didn't get the answer he expected. Mind you, his question could hardly have come at a more inappropriate moment. Jesus is on his way to Jerusalem, where suffering and death await him, while all the questioner is concerned about is the speculative issue of how many people will be saved: "Will there be only a few?" he enquires, rather pessimistically.

Jesus' reply must have brought him down to earth. He says in effect: never mind the numbers game, your task is to work hard – literally, to struggle – so that you'll be able "to enter by the narrow door" that leads to salvation. You may be a Jew, you may even be Roman Catholic, members of God's people, but that doesn't mean you can slip through with the crowd. It's not enough that you belong to the "in" group. There's no way through the narrow door without personal struggle.

Then Jesus puts it another way. This time he speaks not of "a narrow door" but of a closed door and God himself is pictured as the owner of the house. When the householder has locked up for the night – a gentle hint that earthly life does not last forever – it will be no use trying to get in by offering excuses, we ate and drank with you, we heard you preaching in the streets. The householder will not be impressed; he will reply: "I don't know you." Jesus goes on to speak of the anguish they will suffer, as Jews, if the great Jewish patriarchs, Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, and the prophets, are all there at the messianic banquet, while they themselves are locked out. It would be more galling still, if they were to see among the insiders, people from the four corners of the globe. That would mean that some of God's own people had been replaced at the banqueting table by non-Jews, by Gentiles. Those always regarded as first would now be last, and visa versa.

It needs little imagination to translate the message of today's gospel into a message for ourselves. We have been blessed in the most extraordinary way, even more than the Jewish people of old. We have been baptized, we have been adopted as the children of God, we are members of the Church, God's chosen people, we have the sacraments to meet our needs at every juncture of life, we have the scriptures to bring us God's Good News, we have the support of our fellow-believers. Here at Mass we cannot forget that we even eat and drink at the Lord's Table. Such blessings ought to fill us with gratitude. The one thing they must not do is lead us to presumption. If we reach heaven it will not be simply because we are Catholics, or even because we receive the lord himself in the Eucharist. We shall reach heaven because of the gracious goodness of God on the one hand and our own humble efforts on the other.

On that day we may discover that the response Fr. Bill received from his friend had more than a grain of truth in it. Looking around the banqueting table of heaven, we may be surprised – by those who are there, and, perhaps, by those who are not. However, as we have been reminded today, our task is not to waste time on pointless speculation. What matters is that, avoiding complacency, we strive to live out our faith in our daily lives while putting all our trust in our God whose love is strong and whose faithfulness endures for ever.

# THIS FALL OUR PARISH WILL PARTICIPATE IN THE PARISH TRANSFORMATION INITIATIVE



### Why is our parish participating in Parish Transformation?

As the world around us changes, and as we change as people, it is healthy to step back and evaluate how we are living out the mission of Christ through our parish. This is what we will do through Parish Transformation. I am confident that our reflections and discussions will affirm who we are and much of what we are doing as a parish. However, we may find that a fresh look will highlight areas of need that challenge us to try new ideas and approaches. At the end of the day, our goal is to celebrate the gift that is our parish community, while trying to make our parish even more vibrant and effective in carrying out the spirit of Jesus' mission and ministry.

### How will we do this?

Because we will be reflecting upon how our parish is living out the mission of Christ in our community, I want us to think of this process as an extended retreat. We need to enter into this process with openness to where the Holy Spirit is calling us to go. The final product of the Parish Transformation process will be a strategic plan that includes specific actions, goals, and timelines that we will want to accomplish. However, it is important that we remember this is not meant to be simply a corporate planning process. This is an opportunity for us to grow spiritually, both as individuals and as a parish, and to take the next step in our collective faith journey.

The Parish Transformation process will run throughout the Fall, with most meetings to be held on Wednesday evenings each week. The Archdiocese is providing us with a facilitator (at no cost to the parish) to guide us through the process. Our facilitator will provide an independent perspective that will allow him/her to ask honest questions of us and challenge our assumptions. He will also be able to share with us ideas from the 80 parishes that have already participated in Parish Transformation.

### What the parish needs from you...

We need involvement and input from **all** areas of the parish. This means our team needs to be made up of a representative cross section of ages, areas of interest, ethnicities, and levels of involvement. I encourage you to discern if you are being called to join the Parish Transformation Team. If you have not been involved in the parish in the past, please do not let that stop you from joining the team. We need input from everyone in order to develop a strong plan.

Our kickoff meeting for Parish Transformation will be held on Wednesday, September 11, from 7:00-9:00 p.m., Room 201 in the Education Building. If you are unsure if you will be able to commit to meetings throughout the Fall, I encourage you to attend this kickoff meeting to learn more before making a final decision.

#### REFLECTIONS ON THE REIGN OF GOD

A threefold message is developed in today's readings. First, everyone is called to proclaim God's glory and receive salvation. Second, salvation is not for the unprepared. Like a loving parent, God gently corrects and disciplines those who have been called. Often, suffering may be part of the formation process. We learn to accept it as Jesus once accepted his cross. Third, some people who are treated with contempt and disdain by the self-righteous actually do have a place in God's kingdom.

We need to take these lessons to heart. Recall your initial excitement upon hearing God's word. How has the Good News that once struck your fancy taken deeper root in your life? Look again at the crosses you have been given. How are others transformed when they see how you have accepted and grown from your sufferings?

Finally, are there some people you imagine as not invited into God's kingdom? Why do you feel this way about them? For a moment, imagine them on the inside and yourself on the outside. How can this be possible? Always try your best to enter by the narrow gate, gladly proclaiming God's glory.


