



NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

TWENTY-THIRD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

I'm sure, to many people, today's gospel appears a little harsh. It is one of the gospel teachings that is difficult to digest. The whole notion of hating your father or mother would seem to go against the grain of society and gospel teaching.

Once upon a time, there was a man named Billy, who was in his early forties. His job offered no creative, financial or promotional opportunities. His emotional life was becoming a mess, and he soon became depressed and sought counseling. In discussion with his doctor, it soon became apparent that Billy was a very creative person, who had given up hope of personal growth because he felt his first duty was care of his family. Behind that sentiment hid the powerful personality of his domineering mother – a very manipulative woman.

The problem was that Billy did not 'hate' his mother sufficiently. Billy was so emotionally bonded to her that he had never become his own person. Billy had spent most of his life running after his mother, without asking himself what he was doing or why he was doing it.

In the Hebrew language, 'hate' was a passionate way of expressing a hundred per cent detachment from something. In this context, it could mean growing out of dependencies and becoming our own person. So, Jesus is inviting us to turn to him for all our needs and give up unhealthy dependencies on others. This invitation asks us to look at our lives afresh, with new eyes that are fixed on the life and teaching of Jesus. We are not to act out of compulsion, but to take control of our lives and know why we are following Jesus Christ. We are being called to stand out from the crowd and be our own person.

In the gospel, great crowds followed Jesus. Some heard that he cured people. The sick followed him because they hoped for a cure. Some heard that he had fed the five thousand. The hungry followed him, hoping to be fed. Others heard that the authorities didn't like Jesus because he stirred up trouble for them. These followed him in the hope that he would be a political leader, freeing them from the oppression of the Romans.

There were so many people following Jesus, all with different reasons, all hoping for their own dreams to become real. Jesus wasn't happy that people followed him blindly and without thinking. He said that to be his followers, they must break from the crowd. If they wanted to join him, there would be a cost, which they must pay on their own – they couldn't depend on others to pay it for them.

Today, there are crowds that follow Jesus. They admire his compassion, his honesty and his miracles. But following Jesus Christ means there must be sacrifice and a cost. The same is true in everything we do: in sport, in exams, in relationships. Whether it's study, or training or discipleship, there is always a price for achieving what we want – 'no pain, no gain.'

One of the best examples is the life of St. Francis. He wanted to follow Jesus; he wanted to commit himself to his faith, but his father refused to allow him. His father took away his money, so that Francis would depend on him; he took away his freedom, by locking and chaining him in the house. St. Francis chose to leave his family, disown his father, and follow Christ – he took a stance which cost him dearly. He became his own person for Christ.

The price we pay—the cost of our following Jesus—isn't always so drastic. However, we must be careful that we put God above everything else, even our dreams. That's the only true way to be a follower of Jesus Christ. There can be nothing material (things or places), nothing emotional (people or family), nothing spiritual (devotions or prayers), which would stop us saying that God is my all. 'In God alone is my soul at rest.' When we grasp that, we are free to be disciples of Jesus. And remember, once Billy was able to break free, he also freed his mother.

Year of Faith

ARE YOU READY FOR HEAVEN? by Jeff Cavins

"If any one comes to me and does not hate his own father and mother and wife and children and brothers and sisters, yes, and even his own life, he cannot be my disciple. Whoever does not bear his own cross and come after me, cannot be my disciple."—Luke 14:26-27

When I was a boy, my dad took me on fishing trips to northern Minnesota for the walleye opening. I cannot begin to tell you how excited I was at the prospect of going up to the lake with Dad and his friends. For weeks I would read Field & Stream magazine, organize my tackle box, and dream of the large fish I would soon catch. More than anything, I looked forward to being with my Dad, lying down at night and listening to him and his friends laugh and play cards and tell stories in the kitchen below. Anticipating those glorious fishing trips was nearly as exciting as the trips themselves.

In the Gospel of Mark (13:24-32), Jesus tells us that there is a day coming when life as we know it will radically change. Unlike those fishing trips, the time of Jesus' return is unknown—not even the angels know when it will be. All we know for certain is that he will return. This week as we celebrate the birthday of the Blessed Virgin Mary, we recall that one day we will be taken up to meet the Lord, just as she was assumed into heaven.

Can we live in great anticipation of the Lord's coming, even though we don't know the time of his return? The answer is yes, if we clearly understand what that return will mean. Our destiny as Christians is the beatific vision, to see God face to face. Think of what that will be like, to look into the face of the Almighty who created the universe. Imagine the thrill of experiencing the new dimensions of heaven, color, sound, knowledge, and yes ... the food. Imagine no more pain, worry, anxiety, or depression. Sound good?

The Lord has told us that he will return, not to put us in a state of alarm but in a state of alert. Just as I tended to the details of a future fishing trip when I was a boy, today I tend to the details of my spiritual life, in preparation for the Lord's coming. St. Thomas Aquinas calls this daily attitude of preparation "prudence." Prudence looks forward to the goal we want to attain, then causes us to make appropriate decisions to get us there. If we want to be prepared to meet the Lord and enjoy him forever, we must ask ourselves today: How should I be spending my time and money? What does the Lord, the focal point of history, expect of me today?

Action Step

What one thing would you do differently if you knew the Lord was coming back next week? Take one hour this week, perhaps in adoration, to consider whether there is an area of your life in which your habits are incompatible with heaven.

Living our Faith, Building our Future.

As we continue to move forward with our Building Campaign, just a reminder of the information we distributed to all parishioners last June regarding the downsizing of the building plans as noted below:

Thank you. Through your commitment and your contribution the *Living our Faith, Building our Future* Capital Campaign continues to collect funds towards our new parish center. As you may recall, the main features of the planned parish center are:

- A large gathering area for parish meetings and fellowship
- A gym providing for a safe and competitive area for athletics
- Additional meetings rooms that would be handicap accessible
- And a stage area for school, parish and Fine Arts productions

After further deliberation, research, a tour of another parish facility and prayerful consideration, the Capital Campaign Committee has decided to down size the project without eliminating any of the main features as cited above. This resizing will provide considerable savings, which means we are closer to our goal. Only \$900,000 more is needed to begin construction!

The New Proposal:

- Provides for a Junior High School gym, instead of a high school gym. All the schools that the Cardinals compete with except one play in a Junior High Gym. The new gym will still be larger and safer than Morrissey Hall.
- Reconfigures the proposed office and meeting rooms into only meeting rooms that are handicap accessible. Unfortunately this means we will leave the existing parish offices in the rectory.
- Eliminates the connection between the existing school and the new facility. This cuts costs by eliminating the need for an elevator and the bridge connection to the school.

We have dreamed our dreams, but must now face the reality of what we are able to afford.
