

NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

TWENTY-NINTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME 2013

Harry, a successful businessman, had gotten where he was by being very careful with his money. After years of prosperity, the country and world were suddenly plunged into deep recession. Harry's business was badly hit and he was in danger of bankruptcy. He went into church and prayed to God. "Lord," he prayed, "this is Harry. You know me. I come to church every Sunday. I try to lead a good life. But now I've fallen on hard times. My wife and family are suffering. Lord, please get me out of this. Please let me win the lottery." Saturday came. There was no lottery win for Harry. A second time he went to church. "Lord," he prayed, "I can't impress upon you enough the urgency of my situation. Please, Lord let me win the lottery." Saturday came: still nothing. A third time Harry went to church. "Lord, I'm desperate. Please, please, let me win the lottery." At that moment a voice came from heaven. "Harry, can't you meet me half way? Can't you at least BUY A LOTTERY TICKET?"

We're inclined to be a bit upset about the kind of prayer Harry prayed. We think it's unworthy, or at least in bad taste, to pray so blatantly for something for yourself. We think we should be praying for more commendable things, or better still, we shouldn't be asking for things at all. However, that's not how Jesus talks about prayer. Whenever Jesus talks about prayer in the gospels, it is nearly always to urge his followers to ask for things from their heavenly Father. The parable in today's gospel is a good example. Jesus urges his friends to be persistent in asking God for what they need and what they want. Harry had something in common with the widow in today's gospel. First, he was persistent and, second, he asked for what he really wanted. True, he failed to play his part in the transaction, but two out of three isn't bad!

The widow in the parable is being held up to the disciples as a model in prayer. The message is: keep on praying. Be persistent. The unjust judge does not stand for God. Jesus is not saying that God is reluctant to answer prayer. He is CONTRASTING God with the unjust judge. God's desire to help is being contrasted with the unjust judge's reluctance to help. When we persist in our prayer, we are expressing our faith in God's willingness and desire to help us; we are affirming our belief in God's goodness. We are acknowledging our dependence on God for everything we have and everything we are.

Jesus is very realistic about prayer. He understands that we often reach out in prayer to God when we are desperate. When someone we love is seriously ill, we bombard heaven with our prayers. We ask others to pray for them; the more prayers the better. At that moment, we have no doubt about what we want and we have no difficulty in asking God for it. That kind of prayer in which we pester God, and go on pestering him, is just the kind of prayer that Jesus urges his followers to pray. It's not an inferior kind of prayer. It's not a selfish prayer. It is the foundation of all prayer. Let's be clear what we are praying for: we're praying for the person we love to get better. We're appealing to God precisely for that. We shouldn't try to make our prayer 'respectable' by praying "that the doctors and nurses will be inspired to do their job properly." Of course, we can pray for that as well. However, we are first and foremost praying that our loved one will be restored to health. Questions about how God answers prayer have no place in times like these. There are theological questions about prayer and how God answers prayer, but they have nothing to do with the business of actually praying. When we kneel down to say our prayers, we do so in a simple and straightforward way, taking Jesus at his word: "Ask and you will receive; seek and you will find; knock and the door will be opened to you." Like the widow in the parable, like Harry the businessman, we know what we want and we simply go on asking God for it.

PERSISTENT PRAYER

To the best of our knowledge, the authors of the New Testament did not spend much time in each other's company following the Resurrection. They took their charge to go to the nations and spread the Good News seriously. Paul and Luke are an exception to this, having travelled together on missionary journeys. It is no accident, then, that perseverance in prayer is a favorite theme of both authors. Luke's Gospel (which speaks most frequently about Jesus' own prayer), Acts, and the Pauline Letters all exhort us to unceasing prayer.

Paul's personality was certainly tenacious; he most likely would have admired the persistent widow in today's Gospel passage. The purpose of these passages is not to make us think—as infants and toddlers do—that if we keep asking or yelling or crying we will eventually get our way. No, the point is that when true disciples believe in something, we will persist in following that belief whether it is convenient or not, even when we come up against seemingly insurmountable obstacles.

Year of Faith

What God Wants of Us

"Give me wealth or want,
Delight or distress,
Happiness or gloominess,
Heaven or hell,
Sweet life, sun unveiled,
To you I give all.
What do you want of me?"
—Teresa of Avila "In the Hands of God," Poem II

Today we celebrate the feast day of Teresa of Avila, a Doctor of the Church who is said to have observed, "There are more tears shed over answered prayers than unanswered ones." This sixteenth-century Carmelite captured my imagination soon after I entered the Catholic Church in 1994 as a single adult. At a time when the two options available to most women were marriage or the convent – and consequently the convents were full of unconverted hearts – she abandoned herself to divine providence, and went on to reform her community purely out of love for God. This kind of passion, I wanted. Though she is perhaps best known for her poem that begins, "Let nothing trouble you, let nothing frighten you, all things pass away, God never changes," St. Teresa endured true hardship and opposition, often from those within her own order. Yet she repeatedly offered her heart with faith and tenderness to "Her Majesty," trusting God to give her exactly what she needed, when she most needed it.

Each of us faces such moments when our faith is tested, almost to the limit, by the circumstances and people who surround us. "Please God, I have faith that you will do this for me."

But today we stop to contemplate another, deeper truth: That faith is as much about what we do not see – about the prayers that go unanswered – as it is about receiving the miracle we asked for. Sometimes faith is not in the receiving, but in the trusting.

Action Step

When was the last time you had to exercise faith by choosing to trust in God even when he did not answer your prayers as you'd hoped? What did it teach you that you could not have learned any other way?

Summary of the Parish Financial Report

- The parish finished the June 30, 2013 fiscal year with an operating deficit (the highlighted line of the Statement of Revenue and Expense) of \$37,819. This means that ordinary parish expenses exceeded ordinary revenue by \$37,819.
- The parish's Sunday, Christmas and Easter collections for the year ended June 30, 2013 increased by \$20,000 from the previous year.
- In 2013, parishioners who died gave bequests of \$1,100 to the parish. This compares with \$45,000 in 2012.
- The \$42,000 decrease in "other income" was caused by a decrease in miscellaneous and food pantry contributions
- Changes in 2013 personnel and insurance costs caused combined parish and school salaries and benefits to increase by \$27,000.
- Maintenance and repair for the church, school and rectory decreased by \$69,000 in 2013.
- School fundraising income fell by \$57,000 in 2013. School endowment contributions declined \$12,000.
 Significant changes were made to increase administration and parental involvement in school fundraising activities in recent months in order to address these declines.
- In order to match archdiocesan reporting, unrealized gains and losses from the school endowment have been moved from "other income and expense" into school revenue. This change did not impact the bottom line of the parish for 2012. The unrealized gains from the school endowment in 2013 were \$53,186.
- The parish support of the school increased from \$294,349 in 2012 to \$319,402 in 2013.
- Building fund campaign collections received during 2013 were \$589,875. Building fund campaign
 expenses for 2013 were \$7,400. Because building fund activity is not part of the normal operations of
 the parish, it is not included in the parish's operating surplus.
- During the year ended June 30, 2013, the parish's investment account had net unrealized gains of \$59,253. Because investment gains are not part of the normal operations of the parish, they are not included in the parish's operating surplus.
- The 2013 balance sheet allocates the \$1,108,802 parish investment between two lines due to the parish's \$500,000 pledge to the capital campaign.
- The asbestos removal and remodeling project that occurred in the school's main corridor and the recent school boiler repairs are not reflected in these financial statements because they occurred after June 30, 2013. These July and August 2013 projects will be reported in 2014.
