NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

FEAST OF CHRIST THE KING 2013

Whenever there is change in the structure of power, the rise of a new leadership, a transfer of allegiance, then there usually follows much uncertainty, violence, even war between peoples and states. Usually it is only after much compromise and often a great deal of suffering that people can adapt to a new situation, come to terms with the new reality and begin to live in peace once again.

That's the situation in the first reading. Following the death of King Saul there is a power vacuum. For a while, there are two rival factions: one is led by Saul's weak and ineffective son, Ishbaal, the other by the charismatic leader David. The scene in our first reading comes at a time when the matter has finally been decided: David is acknowledged as king of all the people of Israel. Not only is he God's choice, but all the people and their leaders eventually move over to David's side and acclaim him as king. This brings an end to the bloody divisions within the people and opens the way to security, prosperity and peace. For this, David was remembered as the greatest of all Israel's kings, and over the centuries, the Jewish people looked for a descendant of David – another messiah, a man anointed by God – to restore that unity and peace.

In the gospel, Jesus is mocked on the cross for claiming to be that long-awaited king. The people stand looking at him, uncommitted, not sure what to make of him – not attacking Jesus, but far from acclaiming him. The elders – the leaders of the people – are in no doubt. They, together with the soldiers and one of the criminals, taunt Jesus for claiming to be the Christ, the one chosen by God, the so-called "King of the Jews." Whereas David saved the people from internal division and external threat, Jesus is perceived on the cross to be totally incapable of saving even himself, let alone anyone else.

These taunts are reminiscent of Satan's threefold temptation of Jesus: "If you are the Son of God..." PROVE IT. Jesus refused to use his powers for himself then, to dominate or gain control over people. The Devil would return at an opportune time. This is that time, but again, Jesus refuses the temptation to think of himself. Jesus' way is service. Jesus doesn't use his power to save himself. Rather, he is where he has always been throughout his ministry – in the company of those who are most despised and rejected by others. He is among the outcast, hanging between criminals. And his final act is not to save himself, but to save another – the "penitent thief" – by offering him salvation. In the words of St. Paul, Jesus creates a place for him in his kingdom. That means that he will be with Jesus, for Jesus is the kingdom.

As we look at that scene, whose side are we on? Where do we stand as this struggle between the powers of good and evil goes on? Hopefully, we are not among those who scream for Christ's death. But perhaps we can see ourselves among the people – non-committal, waiting to see what will happen, unable to throw our lot in with Jesus for fear of what his way may cost in our own lives. Surely Luke wants us to be like the good thief, acknowledging our sins, turning to Christ in faith, seeking to belong to his kingdom.

If we belong to his kingdom, there will be certain consequences in our life. Being loyal to him means seeking to serve as he did, being found among the outcasts, in solidarity with the poor, the powerless, the despised. It means offering and receiving forgiveness. It means quite simply being with the Lord. Jesus promised the thief: "Today you will be with me in paradise." Paradise is an ancient term symbolizing the deepest trust and intimacy between a king and his friends. We can be with Christ in the "today" of our own lives: in prayer and the sacraments, in his word, in serving the poor and needy, in the ordinary events of our lives. As today's final prayer tells us: it is by OUR DAILY LIVING OF HIS GOSPEL that we will be brought to THE JOY OF HIS KINGDOM, to enjoy unending intimacy and friendship with Christ.

YEAR OF FAITH

MARY THE EMBODIMENT OF FAITH

"Throughout her life and until her last ordeal when Jesus her son died on the cross, Mary's faith never wavered. She never ceased to believe in the fulfillment of God's word. And so the Church venerates in Mary the purest realization of faith."—CCC 149

Last week we celebrated the Presentation of the Blessed Virgin Mary, when, according to Tradition, Joachim and Anne presented the young Mary, their only child, to serve in the Temple at Jerusalem until she became a young woman. According to one tradition, Mary was put in the care of Anna, who later rejoiced at the birth of Mary's Son (see Lk 2:21-38).

St. Augustine of Hippo described faith as thinking with assent. In so saying, he reminds us that there are really two vital parts to the act of faith, one intellectual and one volitional. The grace of faith must for that reason perfect both the intellect and the will. What God reveals to us about himself is not just information that might leave us as cold as a mathematical formula would. God's revelation of himself happens in time and in history and has consequences in our lives that call for action. Whether we choose to swim with the tide of this revelation or against it, it demands a response, a "yes" or "no" to the God who is the Lord of history. Faith is the "yes," "a personal adherence of the whole man to God" (CCC 176).

Mary, of course, is the "purest realization of faith" in every sense. She is the ponderer of God's history par excellence. Twice in Luke's Gospel (Lk 2:19 and 2:51) he speaks of her as keeping and pondering in her heart the things connected with the infancy of her divine Son. Her beautiful canticle called the Magnificat (Lk 1:46-55) is a celebration, an extended fiat (meaning, "let it be done"), to the whole plan of God coming to realization in Christ, an event to which she had already consented at the Annunciation (Lk 1:38). Mary's faith was such that she never withdrew that complete "adherence of the whole" of herself to God's plan from crib to cross and beyond, and so we rightly say that she "most perfectly embodies the obedience of faith" (CCC 148).

ACTION STEP

The Feast of the Presentation of the Blessed Virgin Mary is traditionally observed as a special day of prayer among cloistered religious. Consider what you might do to honor women religious—whether cloistered or serving the Church in the world—this week.

Dia de los muertos (Day of the dead)

As part of our Spanish curriculum here at St. Cletus, students had the opportunity to celebrate a very special Hispanic celebration called "El dia de los muertos". 
