NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

SECOND SUNDAY OF ADVENT 2013

A teacher once asked her class of ten-year olds: "What would you do if one day there was a ring at your front door and when you opened it you found our Lord standing on the doorstep?" One little boy knew what he would do. "I'd run upstairs," he said, "and I'd get the big bible from my Mom's room and I'd hand it over to our Lord and I'd say: 'Jesus, this is your life!""

The boy was closer to the mark than his teacher may have realized. Of course something like three-quarters of the Bible was written before Jesus was born – it's the part we call the Old Testament, the part which usually provides the first of our Sunday readings. Naturally, the Old Testament can't speak directly of Jesus' life and teachings, and yet without it our understanding of him would be impoverished; without it, his life's story would have no context, it would seem to have been parachuted in from nowhere. We'd be meeting him in two dimensions rather than three, so to say, in black and white rather than in color. St. Paul says that "everything that was written long ago in the scriptures" – he's thinking, of course, of the Old Testament – "was meant to teach us." It has not lost its significance. The point is perfectly illustrated in the readings we've heard today.

In the first, Isaiah, who lived eight centuries before the birth of Christ, looks towards a time when God's people will rejoice in a ruler on whom the Spirit of the Lord will rest, who will rule with justice, who will bring peace, who will fill the country with knowledge of the Lord. The responsorial psalm, also from the Old Testament of course, takes up the same theme – a coming king who will rule "from sea to sea", who "will save the poor...and the needy" and "have pity on the weak" and in whose days "justice shall flourish."

When we turn to the gospel, there is John the Baptist crying out: "Repent, the kingdom of heaven is close at hand." And if the kingdom is close at hand, so too is its king, the king that was promised long ago and the promises of the old are about to be fulfilled in Jesus. And so the call goes out: Make ready for the coming of the King! Without the Old Testament we would never have known how perfectly Jesus fulfills the hopes and yearnings of men and women who lived long before him. It would be like hearing the climax of the story of our salvation without hearing the lead-in-the final chapter without the first.


In Advent we are invited to share in the longings and yearnings of Old Testament times so that we may celebrate worthily the birth of the King at Christmas. The infant of the stable is the fulfillment of the whole of the Old Testament, the realization of everyone's hopes and dreams, and he is also destined to come again in glory at the end of time. We are to repent, says John the Baptist: that means that we're to have a change of heart. It may well result in our finding a little extra time for prayer and scripture reading during these days before Christmas, but the main part of the preparation will be the way we lead our daily lives. After insisting that "everything written long ago in the scriptures was meant to teach us", Paul sets before his readers some very practical consequences of listening to the scriptures; you must live together in harmony, he says, striving "to treat each other in the same friendly way as Christ treated you" – apparently squabbles were not unknown among the early Christians! A similar appeal is made to us today: how can we be ready to receive the Prince of Peace if we are not at peace with our brothers and sisters?

But there is something more. Paul speaks of the immense hope that the scriptures bring, for they are centered upon Jesus who is the God of hope in our midst. And so Paul concludes with a prayer – which unfortunately is not included in today's reading – a beautiful prayer which includes in it such wonderful Christian key words as hope, joy, peace, faith, and the power of the Spirit. It's a prayer that we might make our own on this Advent Sunday. 'May the God of hope fill (us) with all joy and peace in (our) faith, so that in the power of the Holy Spirit we may be rich in hope' (Romans 15:13). Amen.

Sunday, December 8, 2013 Live in Harmony with One Another

Today's Readings: Isaiah 11:1–10; Psalm 72:1–2, 7–8, 12–13, 17; Romans 15:4–9; Matthew 3:1–12. During this holy time of Advent, God's Word gives us encouragement so that, as Saint Paul writes, "we might have hope." For our God, Paul tells us, is the source of "steadfastness and encouragement." The prophet Isaiah announces the coming of a wise ruler ("a shoot shall come out from the stump of Jesse") who will judge with righteousness and bring peace—a peace so profound that even natural enemies will live in harmony. Is this the "kingdom of heaven" John the Baptist says is so near? The only way to welcome the kingdom, he says, is to repent of all our unjust behavior. Through repentance and conversion, we "prepare the way of the Lord," and we must demonstrate our conversion in our deeds.

John the Baptist describes the Lord's judgment with the chilling but instructive image of a farmer separating the chaff from the wheat and burning the chaff. Until the time of judgment, he teaches, good and bad will coexist all around us. We must recognize the difference and reform our lives through penance and just actions. In today's Psalm, we continue to sing about justice and the fullness of peace.

Through our Baptism we have already committed ourselves wholly to Christ. The repentance that John calls us to is a continuous work, which we practice daily. What will this work look like in each of our very different lives? How will the Spirit lead us?



THIS WEEK AT HOME

Monday, December 9 Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary

Today we celebrate the patronal feastday of the United States of America. Mary's Immaculate Conception reminds us of Christ's redemptive mission. God preserved Mary from original sin at the outset so that she could be the mother of Christ, who would save us. Washed of our sins and joined to Christ at our Baptism, we are invited into his saving work. Do you have an image of Mary in your home? Place flowers or light a candle in front of it. Today's Readings: Genesis 3:9–15, 20; Psalm 98:1, 2–3ab, 3cd–4; Ephesians 1:3–6, 11–12; Luke 1:26–38.

Tuesday, December 10 Shepherd and Lamb

Jesus, our gentle shepherd, is also the Lamb of God who feeds us, gathers us, and leads us to our heavenly Father. In the celebration of the Eucharist, we receive the Lamb of God. The simple gifts of bread and wine become the very Body and Blood of Christ. As we prepare for the birth of Christ at Bethlehem and also the Second Coming of Christ, we can take heart in Jesus the Good Shepherd, who calls us when we stray and rejoices each time we approach the banquet table of heaven and earth. Today's Readings: Isaiah 40:1–11; Psalm 96:1–2, 3 and 10ac, 11–12, 13; Matthew 18:12–14.

Wednesday, December 11 Saint Damasus I

Pope Damasus (c304–384), whose memorial may be celebrated today, lived in very turbulent times in the early Church, yet survived to see the edict in 380 that declared Christianity the official religion of the Roman state. Damasus calls to mind two qualities of good leadership: alertness to the promptings of the Holy Spirit, and service. During Advent, pray for all those who minister in the Church, that

they "shall renew their strength, they shall mount up with eagles" (Isaiah 40:31). Today's Readings: Isaiah 40:25–31; Psalm 103:1–2, 3–4, 8 and 10; Matthew 11:28–30.

Thursday, December 12 Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe

A young Native American maiden dressed like an Aztec princess appeared at Tepeyac to a poor Indian, St. Juan Diego, on December 12, 1531. Consider attending an early morning celebration of *Las Mañanitas* in a parish nearby where Latino Catholics come together to celebrate in word and song. Place an image of Our Lady of Guadalupe near your Advent wreath on this day, and pray that people of every race, language, and way of life will be afforded the dignity due them as a child of God. Today's Readings: Zechariah 2:14–17; Psalm: Judith 13:8bcde, 19; Luke 1:26–38.

Friday, December 13 Memorial of Saint Lucy

The Church has honored the example of St. Lucy, martyred in the year 304, by adding her name to the First Eucharistic Prayer. Lucy means "light" and in Swedish homes today, the oldest daughter wears a crown of lit candles and serves breakfast to her family. Today's feast gives us a glimpse of the light that is breaking through the darkness of winter. Light candles in your home today to dispel the darkness. How will you let your light shine? Today's Readings: Isaiah 48:17–19; Psalm 1:1–2, 3, 4 and 6; Matthew 11:16–19.

Saturday, December 14 Memorial of Saint John of the Cross

John's life and writings, so full of light and darkness, express his experience of prison, the Cross, and the ecstasy of mystical union with God. He was ordained as a Carmelite priest in 1567 and was a contemporary of Theresa of Jesus (Avila). Where do you find light in the midst of darkness? How might you bring light to someone trapped in the darkness of winter depression? Today's Readings: Sirach 48:1–4, 9–11; Psalm 80:2ac and 3b, 15–16, 18–19; Matthew 17:9a, 10–13.

About the update....

Every month in the update presented below, current information is given about the Capital Campaign. I would like to briefly comment on the numbers shown below. First, the great news is that the 'Total Collected to date' jumped by over \$50,000 this past month – thanks to new pledges, new gifts and payments on pledges received this past month. A number of people responded to the Capital Campaign reminders sent out by the rectory staff, and others responded to the "Thank You" cards sent out by the children in religious education and the school children thanking you for your contribution – whether it was spiritual, financial or promotional.

The number of those contributing to the Campaign shows a considerable increase from 863 to 905, almost 30% of the parishioners. The parish staff reviewed all the names of the parishioners contributing and adjusted the numbers accordingly. Thank you for your support!

Although the Update shows more parishioners contributing to the Campaign, the total amount pledged shows a small decrease of about \$6,000. The increase in contributions was offset by pledges cancelled due to the deaths of a few of our supporting parishioners as well as the cancellation of a few pledges for financial reasons.

I thank you for your continued support of the Capital Campaign and wish you a peaceful Advent and a blessed and Merry Christmas.



Year-end Tax Update...

One of the tax provisions that will expire on December 31, 2013 is the IRA Charitable Contribution Deduction. This is the law that allows tax-free distributions directly from IRAs to charities, by individuals 70 ½ or older. Since this law is expiring it may be to your benefit to maximize your contribution or even your unpaid pledge amount to the "Living our Faith, Building our Future" Capital Campaign before December 31, 2013. This is particularly beneficial to those individuals who generally do not itemize their deductions or who have not yet taken their annual Required Minimum Distributions from their IRAs for 2013. As such, this distribution can be transferred directly to St. Cletus without paying income tax on the amount so transferred. If you are 70 ½ or older and have an IRA, check with your tax professional to see if you can take advantage of this tax incentive before year-end. Cash is not the only donation that is acceptable! Other kinds of assets such as stock or real estate can also be used as gifts to the capital campaign, and if they are appreciated assets, may produce attractive benefits. 

Fourth grade recently completed a book report using their imaginations to depict their favorite character using a pumpkin. Students read a book of their choice and analyzed their favorite character from the text. They then used their creativity to decorate a pumpkin to look like the chosen character. They identified key character traits and provided evidence from the text to support the character qualities. Students presented their pumpkins and summarized their stories for the class.

Purifying Liquids in the Science Lab

Third graders have just learned how difficult it is for seeds to germinate in anything but water. They tried orange juice, coffee, Coke, vinegar, oil and milk with no success. They are now in the process of purifying water filled with dirt, leaves, sticks and grass. The students have been adding aluminum potassium sulfate and calcium oxide to separate out the solids. Students are now ready to filter their water through charcoal and three different grades of sand. They are definitely hoping their water will look much cleaner than when they received it!


