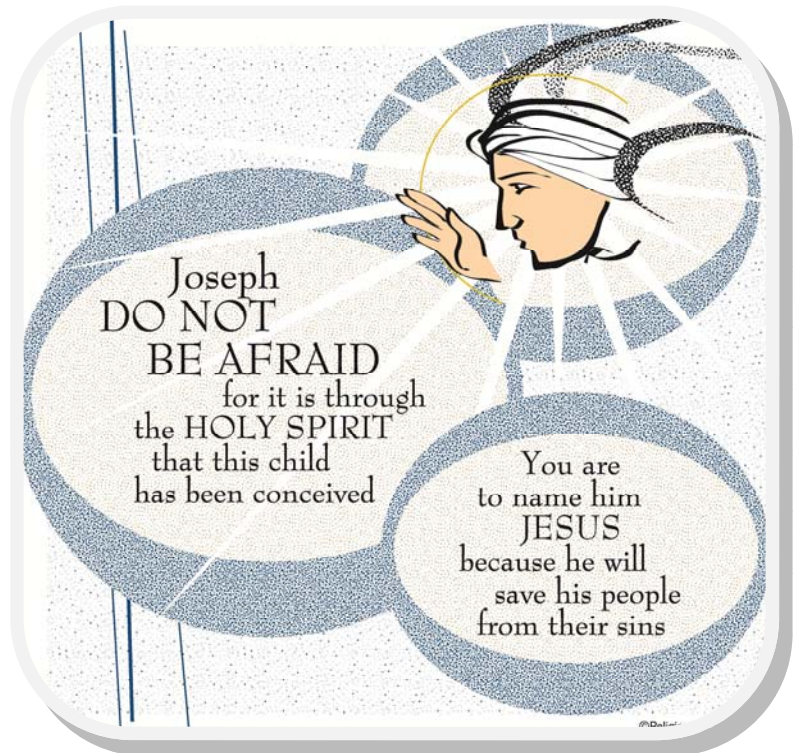

NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

FOURTH SUNDAY OF ADVENT 2013

Our faith, which comes to us with fragrant incense, flickering candles, consecration and communion, now comes to us in the human forms and in the animal shapes of the Christmas crib. If God was mysterious before, coming down on the altar in sacramental sign and raised host, now it is marvelous to see with our own eyes, that he was very, very human also. He loved animals and was surrounded by them. He loved children and came to them like this, a helpless babe, but cozy and warm. This unseen, unknowable God, dwelling in unapproachable light, is here and now with us in flesh and blood. He is part of this world's pageant and part of our parish life. He is part of life, with you and with me. That phrase "God is with us" makes sense now. God is here and I have found him.

Like us, Jesus has a Mom and Dad who love him very much. They watch over him and take care of him, so that, like us, he can grow up safe and sound and surrounded by love. He has a home in a village called Nazareth. His Dad is a carpenter. He grows up and goes to school like all boys and girls do. This is a wonderful kind of God, one who wants to be exactly like we are. This kind of God we can talk to, because we can "see" him and get to know him. From watching his life and how he lives it, from studying his behavior, we can really get to know what kind of person this Jesus is. Risen from the dead and now living forever, this Lord is also flesh and is our brother and friend. For that is why he came...quite simply, to be one of us.

This truth, that God has become a human being, forms the opening statement of Paul's letter to the Romans, read to us today. My message to you, says Paul, is that the Son of God took on our human nature, becoming a son of David's race. His name is Jesus, and being God's Son, he was raised from the dead, so that everyone would know that he is the Lord. The Lord is now with you, and with all who call on his name. What Paul tells the Romans in his letter, he now tells us today. We are God's beloved, here in this place, and we are called to be saints.

The Christmas crib warms the heart of every person who looks on it. How could it not? For there, in that tender scene, in the form of a helpless child, we see the tenderness of God. That same child will be helpless once again, when his life is snatched from him on a cross, and once more we will look upon the helplessness of God.

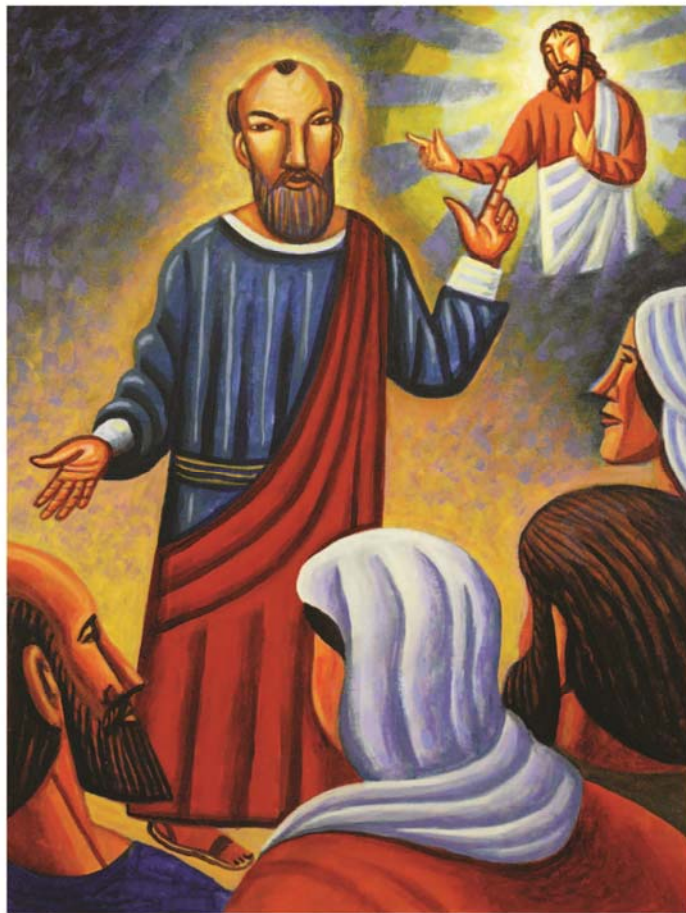
What message is this that God is trying to give us? Why this helplessness, why this vulnerability to the pain of the world? The answer lies in a most forgotten word...the word is "INNOCENCE." Innocence is a total inability to hurt others, and so as such, it is the greatest ability of all. Looking upon the crib, many of us have recognized the face of God in a helpless child. This is the sign that has been given to us, Mary's child. In that child we see, not only the loveliness of God, but also the beauty of every human being.

May the joy and "Innocence" of the Christmas Crib in our Church and homes bring us the realization of how loved we are by this God of LOVE! The prayers and thoughts of all the priests and deacons of the parish, along with your parish staff, wish each of you a blessed, innocent, and holy Christmas. May peace reign in our hearts and homes throughout this holy season and forever.

A Pattern for Apostleship

Today's Readings: Isaiah 7:10–14; Psalm: 24: 1–2, 3–4, 5–6; Romans 1:1–7; Matthew 1:18–24. This Sunday's Scriptures are bursting with good news for all of us. For Christians, the First Reading, from Isaiah, makes it clear that Mary and Joseph (the focus of the Gospel) are called to participate in a plan that has been unfolding for hundreds of years—a miraculous plan. Both the liturgy and the writings of the early Church emphasize that Jesus was born of a virgin mother. The response to today's Responsorial Psalm identifies this child as “King of glory,” and one of the verses calls us to “seek the face of the God of Jacob,” indicating that this royal child is a descendant of the great King David. (Today's O Antiphon is *O Rex Gentium*, O King of Nations.) Even in the midst of confounding the human circumstances that

result from these miraculous events, Mary and Joseph are models of integrity and obedience.

When we read the Gospel together with Paul's assurance that we are all called “to belong to Jesus Christ” and that Christ has given us “apostleship,” these readings encourage us to hear and to answer Christ's call. The pattern they provide for our apostleship is profound: Mary and Joseph's deep desire to do God's will, their honesty, and their prayerful, trusting response to their dilemma. St. Augustine went so far as to say that Mary's model of apostleship outweighed even her motherhood in importance (Sermon 25, 7). What does apostleship look like in your life? What exactly does it mean to you “to belong to Jesus Christ”?



THIS WEEK AT HOME

Monday, December 23

O Emmanuel

God is with us! The seventh and greatest O antiphon announces the holy name. What a great gift, that our God is with us as one who knows our experience and who shares in our sufferings and sorrows, our joys and delights. When we walk the Advent pilgrimage, we find our God reborn in us once again. The first letter of each of the O antiphons spelled backwards spells the Latin words *ero, cras*, which mean “tomorrow I shall be here.” O come, O come Emmanuel! Today’s Readings: Malachi 3:1–4, 23–24; Psalm 25:4–5ab, 8–9, 10 and 14; Luke 1:57–66.

Tuesday, December 24

Vigil of the Nativity of the Lord

On this night, Eastern European Christians spread straw under the tablecloth and place on it an image of the Christ child, a large white candle (Christ as the “light of the world”) and a loaf of bread (Christ as the “bread of life”). The meal includes twelve dishes representing the Twelve Apostles. Italian households traditionally serve fish on this night. What Christmas Eve traditions do you cherish? Today’s Readings: Morning: 2 Samuel 7:1–5, 8b–12, 14a, 16; Psalm 89:2–3, 4–5, 27 and 29; Luke 1:67–79.

Wednesday, December 25

Nativity of the Lord

The Scripture readings proclaimed in the dark of night are some of the most beautiful—full of vivid images, serious teaching, and dramatic story. Isaiah contrasts the “land of deep darkness” in which we have been living with the “great light” of the “Prince of Peace.” Paul’s Letter to Titus teaches that the Lord has “appeared . . . training us . . . to live . . . self controlled, upright, and godly” lives. The Gospel narrates the beloved words: “Bethlehem . . . Joseph . . . Mary . . . firstborn son . . . manger . . . shepherds . . . angels.” The mystery of God born into time surrounds us

once again, always offering more for us to discover. Today’s Readings (Mass during the Night): Isaiah 9:1–6; Titus 2:11–14; Psalm 96:1–2, 2–3, 11–12, 13 (Luke 2:11); Luke 2:1–14.

Thursday, December 26

Feast of St. Stephen, the First Martyr

On this day after Christmas, we are reminded to embrace the whole of the Paschal Mystery (Christ’s dying and rising) in every season of the liturgical year. Stephen died as Jesus did: falsely accused and brought to unwarranted condemnation because he spoke the truth fearlessly. Pray for all those who face discrimination for proclaiming their faith in Jesus Christ, especially those who face a martyr’s death. Today’s Readings: Acts 6:8–10; 7:54–59; Psalm 31:3cd–4, 6 and 8ab, 16bc and 17; Matthew 10:17–22.

Friday, December 27

Feast of St. John

The John for whom the Gospel account is named was an Apostle, called “the one whom Jesus loved” (John 13:23; 19:26; 20:2). He reclined with Jesus at the Last Supper, stood beneath the Cross, and cared for Jesus’s mother. John fervently loved and trusted in the Lord. In whom do we place all our trust? Are you struggling to love God, neighbor, and self? Be open to receive the unconditional love that comes from the Prince of Peace. Today’s Readings: 1 John 1:1–4; Psalm 97:1–2, 5–6, 11–12; John 20:1a and 2–8.

Saturday, December 28

Feast of the Holy Innocents, Martyrs

King Herod ordered the slaughter of boys two years old and younger in Bethlehem. This horror led Matthew to quote Jeremiah: “A voice was heard in Ramah, wailing and loud lamentation, Rachel weeping for her children.” Rachel is pictured weeping for a later generation of Israelites who were deported by the Assyrians for a life of captivity. Pray for all children who suffer death and for an end to genocide and abortion in our day. Today’s Readings: 1 John 1:5–2:2; Psalm 124:2–3, 4–5, 7b–8; Matthew 2:13–18.

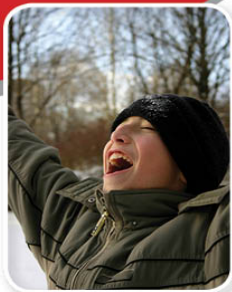
