

## NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...



## MOST HOLY BODY AND BLOOD OF CHRIST 2014 (CORPUS CHRISTI)

Today's readings are about a memorial. It is not made of stone like those we raise in memory of those whom we have lost, but is nonetheless real: a memorial meal. The Eucharist which we celebrate today is the memorial instituted by Jesus. It draws attention to his life; it proclaims his death; and it celebrates his resurrection from the dead. The Eucharist draws attention to issues in our world that have not gone away and are much needed: sacrifice, service, presence, and redemptive love.

In today's first reading, Moses reminds the people of God's saving goodness, shown to them over many years. The remembering is important, because it keeps the people alive to the continuing saving presence of God. Similarly, Paul emphasizes the importance of the Eucharist, this memorial which represents an intimate sharing in the life of Christ, which binds people together more surely than anything that can tear them apart.

Jesus draws on the familiar tradition of God's provision for the people in the desert and takes it much further. It is not manna which now feeds and nourishes. It is his own flesh, given for the life of the world. Here we have a memorial which draws on the past, takes place in the present, and promises the future. It effects union with Christ, and so with the Father.

So this celebration works on many levels at once. We hear again of the sacrifice of Jesus, his self-giving, his offering of his own life that we might live. We are reminded that in the Eucharist we enjoy communion with Jesus, and so are drawn into his life with the Father. We are also drawn together in faith and become a community with Christ's self-giving at its centre. And we commit ourselves to Christ's kingdom of justice, reconciliation, and peace.

When we celebrate the Eucharist, we are caught up in a living memorial. We are challenged to deepen our commitment to each other as we reflect on the example of Jesus, who gives generously of himself, that we might live. His life of loving service inspires us and empowers us to serve as he does.

Our communion with Christ and with each other in the Eucharist is the beginning of eternal life. In Christ we are already in the tomb, and already risen and ascended to the Father. Eternal life has already begun for us. The Eucharistic memorial is where we are reminded of this and taken up in it. Our communion is our salvation, tangible and very near.

Our great civic memorials commemorate lives lived and lost, and the Eucharist is no exception; but it is much more too. The life that was lived and lost was found again. Jesus died and was raised from the dead. And so too our lives are lived, will be lost, and will be restored to us by God's grace. A memorial which can do this can only come from God. And that God's own self is caught up in this memorial can only come from love.

Blessings of Christ in the Eucharist to All.

## ST. CLETUS PARISH PASTORAL COUNCIL (PPC)

The St. Cletus Pastoral Council has spent this past year in discussion and review of the makeup of our parish representative structure to our Parish Council. After much discussion and discernment it was determined that there was a need to adapt the current structure of two representatives from each parish ministry.

The existing council voted to rewrite the existing constitution to better reflect all members of the parish. A committee of the existing council has met several times over the past few months to discuss, discern and rewrite the constitution to reflect this new approach to representation to the council from the parish. This committee has worked very hard to accomplish this task.

The Council Committee have completed their work and have approved a new constitution that will include an election by the entire parish of six (6) voting members from the parish; three (3) members appointed by the council; one (1) non-voting representative appointed by the Parish Staff; one (1) non-voting representative from the Parish Finance Committee; and the following non-voting members: the Pastor, Associate Pastor(s), the School President or Principal, and the Director of Religious Education. This will be the make-up the new Council with nine (9) voting members.

Over the next several weeks the Council will explain the process of nomination and election to the new Parish Pastoral Council for this coming fall in the Canticle and on-line at the St. Cletus Parish Web Site. You may check the Parish Web Site to review the newly approved Constitution.


## PETER'S PENCE COLLECTION NEXT WEEKEND



## TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Ordinary Time beckons, and so on this Sunday we surrender the last glimmers of paschal joy as we celebrate the renewal of our life around the table of the Eucharist. This feast reminds us that the goal of the catechumen's journey through Lent is not the baptismal font at Easter, but rather the experience of Pentecost. It is all about life lived in the Spirit's embrace in relationship to the Body of Christ, which is found both "on the table" and "at the table."

The season of confirmation is also drawing to a close. and this feast serves as a reminder that this sacrament, a solemn sending from font to table, is keyed to renewed Confirmation has sometimes been vigor. misunderstood as a kind of graduation from religious formation, but it is nothing of the sort. It is about being led by the Lord Jesus to the place where the Spirit flourishes, and where the gifts of the Spirit are most easily detectable. After next week we will resume our consideration of the sacrament of confirmation, its rich and somewhat tangled history, its challenging theology, and its changing celebration.

### **AMEN**


