



NOTES FROM FATHER BOB ...



FEAST OF SAINTS PETER AND PAUL 2014

The feast of Saints Peter and Paul can lead us to think about the Church, the body of the faithful, and the power of our prayers as a community. In those apostolic times it is clear that there was a great sense of urgency. Peter and Paul were imbued with a sense of mission. They had responsibilities to discharge in the name of the Lord Jesus – above all, to build up the Church into a strong body of faithful people, who in turn would become part of the mission.

Time and again in his writings we hear Paul comparing the Church to a body. There is the recognition that bodies are made up of many parts, and that each part is important and has its own function. But the one function that united the whole body of the apostolic Church was prayer. From the beginning, when they gathered in continuous prayer and waited for the Spirit to come at Pentecost, in good times and bad they would come together to pray, confident that the Lord, who had promised he would stay with them, would be there to guide them. They were certain that nothing, not even death, could separate them from the love of the Lord. They were certain that they possessed the keys of the kingdom of heaven and that evil never could hold out against them.

As we celebrate this feast today, this is a good time to think about our gifts and all that we have done and continue to do now to build up the body of Christ, the Church. As we say the Creed today, let us each hear Jesus asking us the question he asked the disciples – "Who do you say I am?" – and respond by boldly proclaiming our faith in him as the Christ, the Son of the living God.

Then, as we pray our prayers of intercession, we can bring everything to the Lord with renewed confidence. There will be the general intentions for the wider Church and the world, and there will be intentions that are specific to us and our community. But remember that true prayer is always all-embracing because it is caught up in the saving mystery and presence of Christ. Above all, this is demonstrated in the Eucharist, for the Eucharist is the thanksgiving prayer of Christ himself, making present in every age the great events of our salvation: his passion and death; his glorious resurrection and ascension; his promise of future glory.

So, as the Eucharistic Prayer is offered, think about how it unites us with all those who will gather to celebrate this feast across the globe today. Be conscious of the mass of people who will assemble, in great cathedrals, in parish churches, in small remote chapels, with whom you and I are united in faith and hope and love. And so today we can renew our faith in the power of that prayer and cry out with one voice, "Amen."

Identify and encourage the use of gifts and talents of the members of the parish.

Evaluate and support the Parish Commissions in their efforts to fulfill their goals and objectives.

Provide open Parish meetings to explain major issues before the Council, and provide a forum for parishioners to express their opinions.

Make Council planning financial decisions in conjunction with the Finance Committee to determine if adequate resources are available to accomplish Parish goals and objectives.

Make recommendations to the Pastor as a consultative body for shaping and guiding the mission of the Parish through open and constructive communication.

Revise the Parish Mission Statement as necessary.

Be responsive to the directives of the Pastor, Archbishop and Archdiocese of Chicago.

A representative of the Finance Committee. (Non-voting member)

Its roots are in the Hebrew prophets who announced God's special love for the poor and called God's people to a covenant of love and justice. It is a teaching founded on the life and words of Jesus Christ, who came "to bring glad tidings to the poor . . . liberty to captives . . . recovery of sight to the blind"(Lk 4:18-19), and who identified himself with "the least of these," the hungry and the stranger (cf. Mt 25:45). Catholic social teaching is built on a commitment to the poor. This commitment arises from our experiences of Christ in the Eucharist."— from *Catholic Social Teaching: Challenges and Directions*.






PETER AND PAUL

Today is something of a rarity: the celebration of a saint's day that replaces the Sunday liturgy. Only a handful of these days, given the official rank of "solemnity," are considered so foundational and primal to the mission of the Church that they can interrupt the Sunday sequence. And so it is with Peter and Paul today.

In a way, they each have personality traits with which we can identify. They are both impetuous, sometimes acting or speaking thoughtlessly, contradicting the spiritual gifts given to them by God. At such times, they might receive a nudge from God, much the same as many of us experience. On the positive side, these men were deeply rooted in their faith in Christ, tireless and fearless in living out their call to spread the Good News of his death and resurrection. Perhaps we might identify more with one or the other, but the essential truth we celebrate today is this: Through the Spirit, Christ built and continues to build the Church and make the kingdom known through fragile, remarkable human beings, each graced in a particular way for the work of the reign of God.


