NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

Fourteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time 2014

Are we saints or are we sinners? It would seem that we are both at the same time. The good, the bad, and the ugly are all mixed together inside us and a civil war is often raging in our soul. St. Paul speaks about this struggle very eloquently when writing to the Romans. "I cannot understand my own behavior," he tells them. "I fail to carry out the things I want to do, and I find myself doing the very things I hate." This part of his nature Paul calls his "unspiritual self." His inmost self, his true self, he describes as his "spiritual self." Paul, then, is no stranger to Jekyll and Hyde. The human struggle is common to us all. But what will the outcome be? Is it a matter of chance or is it a matter of choice?

Saint Paul says it is a matter of choice. God's choice of us, and in response, our choice of God. The God who made us is also the God who will set us free. The God who breathed new life into the dead body of Jesus in his resurrection, will also breathe spiritual life into us to redeem us from the works of death.

So there is no need, no absolute compulsion for us to be wicked or to do the deeds of darkness.

Yet, we cannot be glib or blasé about our lives. We know from experience how alluring evil can be, how attractive. The story of the serpent in the Garden of Eden is a very seductive image and very true to reality. Our weakness remains. Our inclination to selfish and sinful ways does not go away.

In a previous age the Church was very conscious of this sinfulness of ours and through preaching and the practice of confession brought home to us our need of humility and help. The prayer "I confess" was never off our lips. The classical teaching concerning the "Seven Deadly Sins" remains a powerful warning to us of how our lives can be destroyed by gluttony, sloth, lust, pride, anger, envy, and covetousness.

These sins are the "misdeeds of the body" that Paul speaks about today. Allowing our lives to be ruled by these forces will destroy us. They are deadly to our spiritual life. The beginning of such self-destruction is perhaps, the sin of pride: that independent spirit that refuses to listen or to learn; that know-all attitude to life that despises others and thinks so highly of one's self.

It was pride that prevented so many people from accepting Jesus when they met him. The Scribes and the Pharisees were the great culprits. By contrast, the humble fishermen of Galilee proved to be wise in their acceptance. Yes, the learned and the clever missed their opportunity. It was "mere children" who really understood the mysteries of life.

Understanding life and living it well will come to us if we learn humility of heart. The journey of life will teach us many things if we are open to what each day brings.

Financial Update Report - Summer 2014

With the conclusion of the fiscal year as of June 30, 2014 we wanted to update you on the specific areas of unanticipated overages in this past year's budget. All of the following overages are due to either the severe winter that we all experienced this past year or unexpected emergency repairs to our facilities. The parish also, as you know, experienced a significant shortfall in anticipated income with the Sunday Collections. It is felt that this shortage is also related to the severe winter weather and lower weekly attendance.

We are currently preparing the end of the year financial reports for both the Archdiocese and our parish community. The following reflects only the areas in the budget that were over the expected cost or unexpected emergency upkeep and repair costs. The complete detailed end of the year finance report will be available to the parish when all reports have been completed and submitted to the Archdiocese for review in September.

Our new budget for 2014-15 reflects needed cutbacks in both expenditures and some personnel hours and benefits to address this shortage as we move forward as a financially strong parish community.

- Snow removal and salt purchases expenses were over \$56,000 exceeding the budget by \$36,000
- Engineering fees for monitoring school building foundation problems were \$8,600
- Repairs of school floors and ceilings due to the foundation problems were \$149,110 taken from the school endowment fund
- The school building boiler system needed refurbishing at a cost of \$114,733 of which \$75,890 was taken from the school endowment fund. Insurance paid \$18,455.50 resulting in a remaining cost to the parish of \$20,387.50
- In conjunction with the boiler repairs all the school building steam traps needed to be replaced at an approximately cost of \$15,000 funded by the parish
- Unanticipated repairs to the school building roof system were \$9,000
- Needed tuck pointing of Rectory at a cost of \$10,400
- Rectory emergency plumbing and sewer repairs at a cost of \$9,000
- Repair of Church side roofs at a cost of \$6,500
- Church and Rectory Heating System repairs at a cost of \$8,850
- Seal Coating of parking lots and landscaping needs at a cost over budget of approximately \$6,000
- Increase in both heating fuel and electric costs for the entire facility due to extreme winter weather at an approximate overage of \$4,400
- A shortfall in Church collections in the amount of \$67,500

We hope and pray that the fiscal year 2014-15 will reflect fewer unexpected and unanticipated financial costs due to weather or building problems. Thank you for your continued financial support and prayers.

- 1) The Pastoral Staff and Finance Committee will be responsible to select one representative each.
- 2) The entire parish will elect six (6) voting members.
- 3) The council will appoint three (3) voting members.

TERM OF OFFICE

- 1) Voting members shall serve three (3) year terms, staggered so that each year (2) members shall shall be elected and one (1) member will be appointed.
- 2) The terms begin July of the elected/appointed year (except for the first elections which will take place August 16-24 to begin the new council).
- 3) Voting Council members may serve two consecutive terms. Additional service may follow after a one year break.

VACANCY

Vacancies shall be filled by appointment of the Pastor, for the remainder of the term vacated. If the vacancy is that of an officer, then the vacant office shall be filled for the remainder of the term by election of the Council.

Next week's article will ask for people to consider nominations of eligible candidates for the new council. Next week will include a form for nominations.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Confirmation is complicated, at least in its history. It arose in response to real problems deeply felt, not the least of which was the desire of the bishop to minister to all who were baptized. But it also has to do with the early crisis of how to deal with persons baptized by congregations that had broken bonds with the greater church: heretics. People reasoned that no matter how wrong headed the minister might be, Christ would always work in the waters of baptism. No matter what, God would sweep aside all human obstacles to claim the new life in the water. They were not so sure about the ability of someone who had broken with the church to confer the Spirit.


By the fifth century, already-baptized persons coming into the church were anointed with chrism but not rebaptized. This anointing with *myron* or chrism was seen as an act of reconciliation by the church, and a seal upon the commitments vowed by the newcomer. Today, we preserve this ancient practice by never "re-baptizing" Christians who have been baptized in water in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. We affirm the candidates' baptismal dignity, and we celebrate confirmation at their first reception of the Eucharist.




