

NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

SEVENTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME 2014

We may complain about bank charges, but at least having a bank account removes the need to bury our money in the ground. This is what was done in ancient times in the face of, say, the peril of a marauding army. If the people who buried their wealth died before they could come back to retrieve it, then hidden treasures lay underground for future generations to find. In fact, over the years there have been some amazing finds. Sometimes it may happen when a farmer glimpses pieces of the treasure accidentally while plowing his field.

Jesus compares the kingdom of God to such finds. First, a hidden treasure; but notice that it is a surprise find, which fills the man with joy, but he does not yet possess it. He has only glimpsed it and seen its amazing value. Next he hides it, keeps it from the owner of the field, so that he can plan on how to make it his own. This may sound like a shocking deception to some people, but Jesus often uses rather outrageous examples to make his main point: that the man is willing to put everything aside in his life so he can obtain the treasure. So, unlike the rich man in the Gospel who had glimpsed Jesus' goodness but refused to sell everything and follow him, this man is willing to give up everything so that he can finally possess this treasure.

Jesus reinforces the message with the parable of the pearl beyond price. But this time the merchant has been spending a lifetime searching for the one really great pearl. And then the same pattern occurs. He finds, he sells all, and then he possesses. Such is his joy at the discovery of this incomparable pearl that he risks everything to obtain it.

Over and over again in the Gospel story the discovery of the presence of the kingdom of God in Jesus brings a joyful response. It may be revealed through his forgiveness, his healings, or the way he makes known a glimpse of God's love for God's creatures, but each discovery leads to a commitment to Christ. It may be Zacchaeus who comes down from his tree and is invited to the kingdom, or it may be Matthew himself who is called from his banker's desk and puts all his energies into following Christ. Everything now is risked to obtain this pearl beyond price.

In a secular society, where the pressure of market forces so dominates our daily lives, the treasure of the Gospel can lie hidden deep beneath the hard earth. Not only unbelievers but some Christians as well can act as though the Gospel is just another creed. We come to church and go through the motions. Then suddenly, through God's grace, the treasure may be discovered. The words of the Gospel are heard as true, perhaps for the first time. God's rule, as it became present in Christ's ministry, is discovered as something real. His love, his forgiveness, his divine presence, his promise of eternal life: this is the treasure that becomes the one thing worth having.

This discovery may come in a sudden, surprising conversation or after years of patient seeking. But the pearl and the treasure are glimpsed, not fully possessed. We have a glimpse of the glory now, but it determines the way we lead our lives. Our priorities are changed: we see things differently. Many of the material things that we strive for, even if they are good in themselves, become less important. The joy of the discovery can be infectious. It can draw others to set their hearts on a treasure that will not fade but will only be fully realized in heaven. Striving for such a treasure can transform our lives. And then, in faith, we will know the answer to the question, "Is there anything better than this to be found?"

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

By the dawn of the fourteenth century, the sacrament of confirmation was ripe for a rescue. since vast numbers of the faithful never received it, and when it was celebrated, it was done so in isolation from baptism and Eucharist. A bishop named William Durandus set out to reclaim this liturgy, but he had a creative touch and added some things into the mix that had never been thought of before. One was a slap. Oddly, he replaced the kiss of peace at the end of confirmation with a slap on the cheek that endured to modern times. This "wake-up call" was related in his imagination to a custom in the military, wherein ceremonies of knighthood and investiture involved a symbolic wound as a sign of willingness to suffer.

Within every congregation today there are people who have memories of fretting through their confirmation liturgies, anxious to know how enthusiastic a slap the bishop would bestow. Durandus loved symbolism and had a reason for every ritual and practice, but his creative spin on the celebration shows how sadly adrift confirmation was from its anchorage in baptism, how far off-course from its home port of the Eucharistic community.





FOOD PANTRY UPDATE

Help! Our dedicated volunteers are ready to pack bags for our next monthly food distribution on August 14, but the cupboard is almost bare! We are in short supply of many of our staples and extras. Please add a few items to your weekly grocery list, as you are able. A few reminders:

- All in-date non-perishables are greatly appreciated, especially the staples on our *most needed at this time* list: tuna, dry pinto beans (2-3# bags work best for us), macaroni & cheese, crackers, peanut butter, jelly, canned fruit, cereal and toilet paper.
- Some favorite "extras" include, snacks, powdered drink mix, condiments, laundry detergent, dishwashing soap and diapers, especially sizes 4-6. Usually we put at least one of these extra items in each pre-packed family bag, as well as offering families a choice of one or two of these items on the night of distribution.
- We will have our first of the summer "Share the Wealth" collection of fresh produce—whether home-grown or store-bought at the August 14 monthly food distribution. Please drop off your donations **only** on **August 14.** *Time: 4:45-5:45 p.m. *Place: Morrissey Hall Lobby.
- Jack Dahill also will be distributing school supplies to our households with children on August 14, as part of his Eagle Project. His collection bins are located alongside our food bins in the narthex. Jack and his fellow scouts will be available at all the Masses this weekend and next. Be sure to say hello and offer encouragement!
- You can drop off non-perishable contributions in the designated bins in the Shrine area in the Church narthex after all weekend Masses, and daily 7:45 a.m.-4:00 p.m.

SOCIAL CONCERNS MINISTRY ASSISTANCE PROCEDURES

Recently I have had several parishioners contact me expressing concern about individuals or families who are in our parking lot during Mass times, asking for financial help. Our parishioners are worried about these families receiving the help they need. Be assured, we **never** turn away anyone who comes to us, whether at the rectory door or in the parking lot. Also, we **never** offer money in such situations, and we suggest you do

the same. I'd like to share with you how our Parish/Social Concerns Ministry, answers requests for assistance, so you can share it with others.

- We always offer groceries to **anyone**, **regardless of where they live**, who comes to us to ensure they don't go away hungry. For those living within the community, we provide a referral sheet with General Assistance information for housing, physical and mental health issues, transportation, etc.).
- If a person/family live within Lyons Township or are members of the parish, we invite them to come to our monthly Food Pantry, and let them know the dates, times, and contact numbers for other local pantries. If they are unable to make the monthly evening distributions, because of jobs, school, health issues, or other scheduling conflicts, we make special arrangements. For example, we offer emergency groceries during rectory hours (Monday-Saturday, 9:00 a.m.-5:00 p.m., and Sunday, 8:00 a.m.-12:30 p.m. or by special appointment). If they do not live within our boundaries, we provide information about pantries in their area.

- For those seeking assistance beyond food, our St. Vincent de Paul Conference steps in. If a person lives within our geographical area or is a parishioner, our Vincentian volunteers set up a time to meet, in order to get a fuller picture of the situation which has brought them to us. After determining the specific needs, our SVDP works to address those needs in partnership with other Social Concerns ministries (i.e. ICN Employment Ministry, Interfaith Community Partners, ASP Adult Service Volunteers, etc.) as well as other service agencies in our area (i.e. Lyons Township General Assistance Office, BEDS Plus, Pillars, Community Nurse Health Association, Aging Care Connections, Catholic Charities, etc.).
- If a person does not live in our immediate area, we give them information to help them contact agencies in their geographical area that may be able to assist them.

Of course, there are situations that come up that don't fall neatly into the categories outlined above. However, we meet them to the best of our ability, always with Christian generosity.

I have often been asked if people who stand out in our parking lot, outside local business establishments, restaurants, etc. are all "Scam Artists." My feeling is that I cannot make that judgment and that oftentimes, such individuals **are** in need and may be hindered by mental illness, frustration with their attempts to provide for their families, etc. Sadly, there are a few people who are not aboveboard... which can cause us to become jaded and maybe even hard-hearted towards the plight of those who are struggling. Here at St. Cletus Parish we make every attempt to be prudent but to err on the side of compassion, remembering that we are all children of God.


