NOTES FROM FATHER BOB ...

EIGHTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME 2014

When children are in preschool and elementary school, it is more than easy to interest their parents in supporting and taking an active part in school life. For a start the children usually like their parents to be involved in what is happening in their lives. Then quite a number of parents are personally present at school activities or volunteering in one way or another almost daily. This regular contact makes school part of their lives, a feature that is increased by their chat and friendship that develop with other parents who are involved. With high school a different scenario often occurs. Teenage children are often embarrassed at their parents' presence, and they want to keep them as far away as possible from their activities, whether work or play. Then the schools themselves usually have much larger campuses and parents often feel more daunted by the size of the establishments and their own mixed memories of teenage years. Unintentionally the school can be experienced by parents as hostile rather than friendly territory. It also does not feel as easy to get involved in the more demanding academic and extra-curricular activities offered to the pupils. Parents are no longer gods!

Later on in life a reconciliation of views usually occurs. The parents marvel to see their children emerge as mature adults from their stormy teenage chrysalises, and the children are amazed at how their parents have matured so rapidly as well.

St. Paul is aware of how much we put between ourselves and God. His letter to the Romans explores how even the Law, which should have impressed upon the chosen people their need of grace or salvation, becomes oppressive as they seek a righteousness before God based on their obedience. To live as God wants we need the inner gift of faith, which acts like an internal combustion engine of goodness. The reason for this is because faith is the free gift of God. We cannot earn it. But nor can we separate ourselves from it. Our natural and traditional ideas of God, even today, contain a strong tendency to make God distant and forbidding. Accompanying this belief is a feeling of our own inadequacy and failure. We feel guilty because we cannot bridge the gap, because we cannot live up to what we believe are God's expectations of us. St. Paul forcefully reminds us that this is not the point. Of course we cannot bridge the gap. Of course we are failures. But this does not matter. What matters is the overwhelming love of God for us, revealed in all its compassion and enrichment, in the person of Jesus Christ. Nothing can get in the way of that love, a love illustrated so well in the gospel story of the feeding of the five thousand, where we see Jesus taking pity on the crowds, healing them and feeding them with sheer abundance.

Our spiritual growth can often take a similar track to our human development. During our spiritually teenage years, which do not always coincide with our physical adolescence, we feel the need to separate ourselves from the authority figures in our lives, loving as they may be. Our rediscovery of how they may be a more real presence in our lives, perhaps as more equal or intimate companions, is the true business of growing up. If we find it difficult to think of God in such terms, we need only think of how St. John's Gospel invites us to be friends rather than servants. Our God is stripped of any autocratic powers in the person of Jesus Christ in order to be our healing friend and servant. The bit of us that remains an undeveloped child or teenager finds that difficult to accept. We want God to be dictatorial and distant. That makes it easier for us to keep our distance! We can refuse to believe, and blame God at the same time. God, however, keeps on loving us all the same, a thought consoling to all who wander away and also to those who grieve for their children or loved ones who seem to have turned away from God. Whatever diversions we take in our spiritual journeys, God's overwhelming love is always there. Our openness to that love is what enables us to then become friends and servants to each other in God's image and likeness.

GRACE IS EVERYWHERE

Grace is everywhere. People of faith act on this belief. As Christians we are called to reach deeply into ourselves and find God's presence there. We are called to reach outside ourselves and find God there, too.

The reality of grace has sustained and nourished people beyond numbering. The church never tires of telling the story of the loaves and fishes. It is narrated no less than six times in the four Gospels. We imagine the hesitant apostles reaching into the baskets and finding bread, always more bread. We anticipate the ending. The apostles will wear out before the bread runs out.

At another time and place, Isaiah also spoke of an abundance, this time of water, sweet honey, and rich milk. Always, always God is a gift-giver, and we the receivers. Our response is doxology, or praise. In the second reading Paul provides the words and attitude. Praise is everywhere.

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TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Most parishes are now aware of the catechumenate and the journey of new faithful in the RCIA, but this form of sacramental initiation disappeared from view in the thirteenth century along with many other ancient practices. Life back then was hard, and often too short, and priests were increasingly insistent about the responsibility of parents to baptize children in danger of death. Since everyone in that society was under unimaginable threat from famine, warfare, and plague, the liturgical rites changed quickly. Everyone was in danger of death all the time. No longer were babies immersed in fonts, being lowered into the water, although the ritual books never backed down from immersion. Infusion was the new way, a simple pouring of a few drops of water on the child's forehead. The catechumenate collapsed, being reduced to the recitation of the Creed and an Our Father at every baptism. Amazingly, any provision for adult baptism was shelved, so that as late as the 1950s, a person being baptized was presumed to be an infant, unable to answer for him or herself. Questions of creed and commitment were put to the godparents, not to the person being baptized. Even Dorothy Day and Thomas Merton, famous adult converts, remained mute at their baptisms while their sponsors answered for them. In hindsight all this appears strikingly odd, yet it was accepted as the way things were. We have good reason to give thanks for the vigorous reforms of the last fifty years!


