NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

Twenty-Second Sunday in Ordinary Time 2014

Jesus knows that when we really understand the meaning of our own life, we are saved. We see ourselves as we really are, and appreciate who and what God really is. This so transforms us that we grow in communion with God, through life, through death, and forever.

Into each and every mundane situation, Jesus brings poetry. He constantly looks behind events for the meaning of those events, teaching all who will listen to the eternal significance of every action and word. Today he explains how he is destined to suffer and die, and how he will rise from the dead. When Peter looks merely at the facts, Jesus points to their meaning. To overlook or ignore their meaning is to betray him. Jesus then situates the life of each disciple in relation to his own: each person must renounce self and follow him. And here is the poetry: in renouncing self and following Christ, the disciple saves his or her life. This is the meaning of our life: an offering we make to Christ, which Christ blesses and returns. Today's other readings reinforce the message.

The prophet Jeremiah bemoans his fate as he suffers ridicule for his calling. We could imagine he is full of regret, that he wishes he had taken another path in life. But his language gives away what he really feels. He uses the language of the seducer and the seduced. Even when he determines to ignore the Lord, he feels a burning fire in his heart. He is aflame with love of God. This, in spite of all external evidence, is the true meaning of his life. This is the poetry of his existence. In this he finds healing and wholeness.

St. Paul follows a related theme as he exhorts the Romans to contemplate God's mercy and give themselves in worship. We learn from him that to ponder God, to offer ourselves to God and to praise God is to be drawn into communion with God and so to be saved. We find ourselves more and more in tune with God, and strangers to the lesser values we may find around us. We discover the poetry of our own life, its meaning; and in so doing we do what is good, acceptable and perfect before the Lord.

In the light of the suffering, death and resurrection of Jesus, we begin to understand all he teaches us. We see more clearly the meaning of his life and so the meaning of our own life. We too may suffer, we too will die, but just as certainly, we will rise with him.

When we ponder the ordinary, everyday, mundane nature of much of our life, we can look for the poetry that gives it meaning. We know that our suffering and death are not meaningless, but have meaning in God. So what we do does matter, has eternal significance. We can endure so much more if we feel our endurance has meaning. We can achieve so much more if we are confident there is a meaning to what we achieve. Our faith encourages us. Our faith motivates us. Our faith makes us strong.

So let us turn around the warning of Jesus, where he says, "What, then, will a man gain if he wins the whole world and ruins his life? Or what has a man to offer in exchange for his life?" In giving ourselves over to the truth of our life, that we are Disciples of Christ, we gain the whole world. And now we understand what our life really means, we will give it away to God, freely. And God will return it to us, safeguarded and perfected. We will enjoy life with God for ever.

FOOD PANTRY UPDATE...

At our August 14 monthly distribution we served 235 families with groceries and school supplies for those households with children. We turned away 25 or so families when we ran out of pre-packed bags. However, the families with school-aged children were given school supplies and asked to return the following week to pick up groceries at the rectory during business hours...which most of them have already done. Thank God for all those supporting the good works of our Food Pantry. Thank God for YOU!

HERE ARE THREE WAYS YOU CAN CONTINUE TO HELP SUPPORT THE FOOD PANTRY:

- (1) Make it routine to pick up an item or two for the Food Pantry when you go to the grocery store. Items are flying off the shelves as our volunteers pack the bags we will need for our next monthly distribution! Choose from our list of most needed items at this time, which includes **rice**, **spaghetti noodles**, **canned meat**, **jelly**, **canned/powdered milk**, **snacks**, **crackers and all sizes of diapers**. Remember, **all** in date non-perishables are greatly appreciated!
- (2) Make a monetary donation to the Food Pantry. You can drop an envelope marked "Food Pantry" in the Sunday collection or at the rectory. These funds are used to purchase items needed to balance the assortment of staples and extras included in our pre-packed family bags.
- (3) Volunteer to work at the Greater Chicago Food Depository. On the fourth Wednesday of each month, we send a group of 10-15 volunteers to earn credit for us. At these sessions, we earn \$15 worth of food per volunteer. Please check your calendar to see if you might be able to join our volunteer team on one or more of these evenings. A few things you should know:
 - Volunteers need to be 14 years old to volunteer at the Food Depository during regular sessions.
 - GCFD is located at 4100 W. Ann Lurie Place, Chicago, IL 60632, which is a few blocks from I-55 and Pulaski. If you are interested, please contact Jerry Mitchell, who coordinates the St. Cletus volunteers: emailjerry@comcast.net or 630-849-5857 (Jerry's cell).
 - If you volunteer at the Food Depository on your own, please designate the <u>St. Cletus Food Pantry</u> as the recipient of your volunteer credits. Our Agency Code is A01336.

MISSION LADIES MARK YOUR CALENDARS!



We Catholics say things like this all the time: get the baby baptized, get married, and—even—get ordained. The getting speaks of a momentary ritual, holy no doubt but then finished. After you get something, you've got it. But there is a mistake in thinking about the sacraments this way. We don't get them as much as they get us. What do I mean?

The sacraments surely have a focused ritual moment, but they also lead us beyond the moment. The sacraments are meant to **shape** the way we live. From the moment we are baptized or married or ordained or whatever sacrament we celebrate, that particular sacrament ushers us into a new way of living. It begins—if we are open and responsive to it—a new and fresh pattern of life as a disciple of Jesus or as a sign of God's love in the world or as a shepherd extending the Good Shepherd's care. Clearly, God's creative hand is here at work in our lives.




Reduce. Reuse. Recycle. Inspire!
