Dear Parishioners, September 2014

Our parish family has truly been blessed during this past year. We welcomed 31new families to our parish community, which brings our total number of registered families to 2,732. We baptized 99 new young Catholics during the year. Our school educated 408 students in pre-school through eighth grade, while our Religious Education Program formed 360 young people in the faith in pre-school through eighth grade. Our Confirmation Program provided formation for 68 eighth grade students. Also, 104 young people received the Sacrament of The Holy Eucharist for the first time. 5 adults received sacraments through the R.C.I.A program. While many other adults joined the various adult faith formation programs offered through CREDO. We married 26 couples and renewed the marriage vows of numerous couples. We celebrated the Rite of Christian Burial for 64 members of the community as they enter their eternal reward. Hundreds of Communion visits to the homebound and Holy Anointing of the Sick visits were made



to hospitals and homes. An active Youth Ministry program, Social Concerns outreach services and a variety of other faith formation programs continue to grow. All of this has been made possible because of your extremely generous support of the mission of our parish.

After years of discussions, parish meetings, and prayerful deliberations and with the concurrence of the Parish Pastoral Council, in January of 2012, our parish kicked off a capital campaign titled, Living our Faith, Building our Future. This extraordinary effort to raise funds needed for the expansion of Saint Cletus and for the construction of a new multi-purpose Parish Center. Over the past twenty months pledges of approximately \$3,000,000 have been received and \$2,005,784 has already been collected. We have reached this level of success with generous pledged amounts fulfilled with one-time, weekly, monthly, quarterly and annual donations. I sincerely want to thank everyone for all donations regardless of the amount. Also, let us remember our founding parishioners, those who have come before us and those here today. Their sacrifices and dedication over the past 63 years have provided us our present day facilities. I want to thank you for your sacrifice and dedication you have made to the future of our parish and hope this effort will match that of our brothers and sisters from the past. This extraordinary effort calls for extraordinary commitment!

As you continue to read the Stewardship Report, you will find the balance sheets and statements of revenue and expenses for this past year. You should be proud of all you have been able to accomplish to spread the Good News of the Gospel within this vibrant faith community.

I would like to thank all the members of our parish finance committee for their dedication and commitment to the sound financial health of our parish. The current members of this important advisory committee are: Dave Smith (Chairman), Anne Babirak, Mike Magee, Don McMahon, Mike Pusatera, Dave Sipek, Roman Szabelski, Marie Usher, and Carol Walters.

Thank you for all your contributions of time, talent, and treasure to your parish community. Your generosity allows us to be faithful to our parish mission and the message of the Gospel, as we bring the Good News to all within our community. I would also like to lovingly invite all those who have drifted away, to come to church, find healing, answers, and support... experience Christ and stay.

Summary of the Parish Financial Report

The parish finished the June 30, 2014 fiscal year with an operating deficit (the shaded line of the Statement of Revenue and Expense) of \$73,199. This means that ordinary parish expenses exceeded ordinary parish revenue by \$73,199.

• The parish's Sunday, Christmas and Easter collections for the year ended June 30, 2014 decreased by a total of \$52,500 from the year ended June 30, 2013.

In 2014, parishioners who died left bequests of \$2,000 to the parish.


- Other revenue was higher in 2013 because \$54,912 of social concerns revenue was included on this line. Starting in 2014, social concerns revenue is reported in auxiliary group revenue and expense.
- Combined parish and school salaries and benefits decreased by \$18,000 in 2014.
- Ordinary maintenance and repairs for the church, school and rectory increased by \$62,000 in 2014. The increase was primarily caused by additional snow plowing and boiler repair expense.
- Increased organization and school family participation led to a \$53,000 increase in school fundraising revenue in 2014.
- The school took a \$225,000 distribution from the school endowment so that school ceilings and floors could be replaced and the school boiler could be refurbished. Total school endowment distributions were \$250,000 in 2014 vs. \$50,000 in 2013.
- Required parish support to the school decreased to \$248,286 in 2014.
 - Building fund campaign revenue received during 2014 was \$499,288. Because building fund activity is not part of the normal operations, it is not considered in determining the parish's operating deficit.
- During the year ended June 30, 2014, the parish's investment account had net unrealized gains of \$83,351. Because investment gains are not part of the normal operations of the parish, they are not considered in determining the operating deficit. The operating deficit caused the parish to withdraw \$150,000 from its investments in 2014.
- A \$450,000 check, representing the first installment of a bequest that a generous parishioner left to the school endowment, was received in August 2014. This amount is not reflected in our report because it was received after June 30, 2014.






Sources and Uses of Parish Funds

NOTES FROM FATHER BOB ...

TWENTY-FIFTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME 2014

An ancient philosopher wrote that there is an art to being generous. If people have the resources to be generous, they can do so without vulgar showing off, or making those who receive their generosity feel patronized. People who are truly generous are those who do not value money itself, but only in as much as they can spend it usefully on others.

There are also two contrasting sorts of character. One is the prodigal person who spends money foolishly, like the son in the parable. The other is the miser, who hoards money, and even steels the goods of others. The character Harpagon in the play THE MISER, by the seventeenth-century French playwright Molière, is such a person. He defrauds his own horses of their oats, and instead of "giving" people a good day, he "lends" them a good day.

There is also an art to receiving. We can receive presents, or help, or a compliment, graciously. Or we can be ungrateful, sullen and resentful. Even worse, we can resent the good things that come to others, and be eaten up with envy. The same ancient philosopher, Aristotle, defined envy as "a kind of distress at apparent success on the part of one's equals." It is, then, feeling put out, or even bitter, at the good that happens to other people, especially people close to us, or of the same group. The ancient world had a special term for this: it was called the "evil eye."


This is exactly the phrase used in the Greek of today's Gospel reading. At the end of the story, the landowner asks the grumbling worker, "have you got the evil eye because I am generous?" In Mark's Gospel, Jesus lists the "evil eye" as one of the things that come out of people to make them unclean. There was much superstition attached to this phrase, but in the New Testament it is a vivid image for intense envy and resentment. This was thought to show itself in people's looks, just as we might say "green with envy".

So in the Gospel reading we have the contrast of the generosity of the landowner and the envious reaction of the laborers. We might see the landowner as representing God, and the workers as the people of the Old Testament. The Jewish people had labored under the law of Moses for many centuries, and now that Jesus was also bringing in the Gentiles to be saved, some of them felt a certain resentment. Certainly Paul's letters show us that there was disputes between Jewish Christians and those who where converted from paganism. Such tensions would be natural in the formation of a new society. Perhaps the parable is a warning against being blinded by tensions such as this.

But the parable has a wider application than the early Church. We may at times react against the injustice that we see in the world, and often we are right to do so. There is a proper sense of indignation when we see a real injustice done. However, as far as our relations with God go, we have no cause for envy. Like the landowner in the parable, God bestows gifts to people according to the divine will, and everyone has been given some gift. The basic gift is, of course, life. Without that, we would have nothing either to moan about or to rejoice in. As St. Paul asks the Corinthians in this regard, "What do you have that was not given to you?"

Envying other people's money, good looks, fame, or even spiritual gifts, does nothing except to corrode the character of the person doing the envying. Thinking about the gifts we have been given ourselves, and being grateful for them, is more positive and more gracious. We can also rejoice in the gifts that God gives to others. As members of the Church, we are all part of the same body, and can therefore share in each other's gifts. So rather than begrudging God's generosity or moaning about what we don't have, we can bear in mind the words of Blessed John Newman: "God has created me to do him some definite service. He has committed some work to me which he has not committed to another. I am a link in a chain, a bond of connection between persons. He has not created me for naught. I shall do good; I shall do his work."
