

NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

TWENTY-NINTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME 2014

On July 6, 1535, Thomas More, one of the most illustrious Englishmen of his day, stood at the foot of the scaffold on Tower Hill. He had been condemned to death for refusing to take the Oath of Supremacy, which would have been to acknowledge Henry VIII as "only supreme head of the Church of England". More was a scholar, the author of many learned books; a devoted public servant, chosen by Henry himself to be his Chancellor; a much-loved family man, deeply attached to wife and children and anxious that his daughters should be educated far beyond the level usually available to women in those days; he was, as C.S. Lewis wrote of him, "a man before whom the best of us must stand uncovered".

He had told the judges who condemned him that he prayed that he and they would "all meet merrily in heaven"; and even as he was mounting the rickety ladder to the scaffold, he retained his customary wit. "I pray, Lord Lieutenant," he jested, "see me safe up, and for my coming down let me shift for myself." Then, after a few words of encouragement to the assembled crowd, he declared that he was about to die as "the king's good servant but God's first".

"The king's good servant but God's first": those words might serve as a commentary on what our Lord says in today's gospel. Let's recall the situation. Jesus has come up to Jerusalem for the last time; he has already been involved in controversy with the religious leaders. Finally the Pharisees decide to try and entrap him. They begin with honeyed words, intended no doubt to put him off his guard – in fact the Pharisees don't come themselves but send some intermediaries – so it's these intermediaries who use the honeyed words: "Master, we know that you are an honest man and that you are not afraid of anyone."

But after the compliments comes the barbed question, aimed to put Jesus in a no-win situation. "Tell us," they inquire, "is it permissible to pay taxes to Caesar or not?" The tax involved, a kind of poll tax, was detested by the Jews on two counts: first because it was a painful reminder that they were a subject people, and second because the coinage in which it was paid bore the head of the Roman emperor and an inscription which proclaimed him to be divine. And so if Jesus were to say that the tax should be paid, he would at once lose all credibility with the people; on the other hand, if he were to say it should not, he could then be accused of fomenting disobedience, even rebellion, against Rome, and that could have – literally – fatal consequences.

You can imagine the tension in the crowd as Jesus calmly holds up one of the well-known silver coins for paying the tax and asks, "Whose head is this? Whose name?" Well, everyone knows the answer to those questions: the head and name are of course "Caesar's" (the Roman emperor's). "Very well, then," says Jesus, "give back to Caesar what belongs to Caesar — and to God what belongs to God." By having such coinage in their possession, they were at least implicitly acknowledging Caesar's right to tax them.

However, Jesus' answer is more than an ingenious way of slipping out of a trap. By adding that what belongs to God ought to go back to God, he's making a further point: that our overriding commitment has to be to God himself. Of course we must accept lawful civil authority; indeed as Christians we ought to be the best citizens: being good, responsible citizens, working for the common good of the community, these are our Christian duties; in that sense, already part of our giving to God what belongs to him. At the same time we do not look to the State as our moral guide: the law may countenance abortion, for example, or the sale of arms to oppressive regimes; but the fact that such activities are legal does not make them morally right. And if ever there were a genuine clash between our duties to State and our duties to God, there is no doubt where our Christian duty lies. It is God's law not the State's that has the last word.

Today, let us remember in our prayers all who face this stark choice that they may courageously follow conscience, no matter what price they have to pay.

RESPECT LIFE MINISTRY A CARDINAL'S CANDOR (PART 1 OF 2)

In our country, respect for life is increasingly subject to state intimidation, censure and restriction. Chicago Cardinal Francis George recently reflected on this evolution in a "tale of two churches: - the church of God and the church of State - in which the state takes on more and more takes on "the mantle of religion," telling the citizens "what they must personally think or what 'values' they must personalize in order to deserve to be part of the country."

On the matter of state coerced redefinition of the divine institution of marriage, the Cardinal writes:

In recent years, society has brought social and legislative approval to all types of sexual relationships that used to be considered "sinful." Since the biblical vision of what it means to be human tells us that not every friendship or love can be expressed in sexual relations, the church's teaching on these issues is now evidence of intolerance for what the civil law upholds and even imposes. What was once a request to live and let live has now become a demand for approval. The "ruling class," those who shape public opinion in politics, in education, in communication, in entertainment is using the civil law to impose its own form of morality on everyone. We are told that, even in marriage itself, there is no difference between men and women, although nature and our very bodies clearly evidence that men and women are not interchangeable at will in forming a family. Nevertheless, those who do not conform to the official religion, we are warned, place their citizenship in danger.

On the matter of government compelled funding of abortion the Cardinal continues:

When the recent case about religious objection to one provision of the Health Care Act was decided against the State religion, the Huffington Post (June 30, 2014) raised "concerns about the compatibility between being a Catholic and being a good citizen." This is not the voice of the nativists who first fought against Catholic immigration in the 1830s. Nor is it the voice of those who burned convents and churches in Boston and Philadelphia a decade later. Neither is it the voice of the Know-Nothing Party of the 1840s and 1850s, nor of the Klue Klux Klan, which burned crosses before Catholic churches in the Midwest after the Civil War. It is a voice whose members promised never to vote for a Catholic for public office. This is, rather, the self righteous voice of some members of the American establishment today who regard themselves as "progressive" and enlightened."

On the matter of resisting or acceding to the new state religion, the Cardinal adds in painful candor:

The inevitable result is a crisis of belief for many Catholics. Throughout history, when Catholics and other believers in revealed religion have been forced to choose between being taught by God or instructed by politicians, professors, editors of major newspapers and entertainers, many have opted to go along with the powers that be. This reduces a great tension in their lives, although it also brings with it the worship of a false god. It takes no moral courage to conform to government and social pressure. It takes a deep faith to "swim against the tide," as Pope Francis recently encouraged young people to do at last summer's World Youth Day.




