### NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

### FEAST OF THE HOLY FAMILY 2014

Today's feast offers much-needed support to marriage and the family, even if its title, at first hearing, seems less than helpful. A "holy" family can sound like an unreal family, a family that travels through life trouble-free. A family which consists of the Son of God and two great saints hardly seems to be the kind we could hope to identify with, let alone imitate. However, not everyone sees it that way. A little boy's painting of the Christmas scene showed the stable, the ox and the ass, and of course the Child, but on either side of the manger there knelt a punk-rocker. "I can see baby Jesus," said the teacher, "but who are these two young people? And where are Mary and Joseph?" "Well, Miss," said the budding artist, "they're the babysitters; Mary and Joseph have gone to the bingo game."

We laugh perhaps, yet I wonder if that child's understanding of the Holy Family isn't closer to reality than that of most adults. Of course Jesus, Mary and Joseph are a unique family. Nonetheless, as today's Gospel makes clear, they are a real family, as real as any family in this church today; they lived real lives, just like the people around them. They were Jews, humbly following the normal Jewish religious customs. So they complied with the ancient Jewish law which said that every first-born baby son should be presented in the Temple (as a thanksgiving for the wonderful gift of a new life) and then "bought back" from the Lord on payment of a few shekels, or, in the case of the poor, an offering of a couple of birds. The offering of the poor was all that Mary and Joseph could afford. Clearly, Jesus was born into a home where luxuries were rare and where the family struggled to make ends meet.

While Mary and Joseph were in the Temple at Jerusalem they met two elderly God-fearing people, Simeon and Anna, who had astonishing things to say about Jesus: how they had always longed for his coming and how he was the One everyone was waiting for. However, Simeon also made a mysterious prophecy: he told Mary that her heart would be pierced by a sword. There would be heart-rending times ahead for the Holy Family; being the Mother of Jesus would cost her dearly; situations would arise when she, like any of us, would be bewildered by God's ways.

The Gospel ends with the simple statement that "the child grew to maturity." Jesus grew up, passed from childhood to youth to manhood. In the meantime Mary and Joseph did what all good parents do: they built a home, taught their little one how to pray, set a good example, provided food and clothing and, above all, surrounded him with love. But the very ordinariness of his growing-up was surely a challenge to them. It must have been their strong faith – and faith is a theme running through today's readings – that enabled them to hold on to the incredible truth that Jesus was not simply another boy from Nazareth, but the unique, long-awaited Messiah.

Jesus would one day promise that wherever two or three are gathered in his name, he is present with them. Already that promise was foreshadowed in the Holy Family: Mary and Joseph – and Jesus himself in the midst. In every Christian family that promise is fulfilled, though faith alone can discern his presence. Many a couple will say with a wry smile: "Just stay a few days in our house and you'll know we're no holy family." But I wonder. The Vatican Council spoke of the Christian home as "the domestic church", the Church in miniature; it is in and through the ups and downs of family living that most people are to grow in holiness.

Jesus is in the midst not just of perfect homes (whatever they might be) but of every Christian home; in the midst of everything that happens there: the bread-winning, the love-making, the messiness, the misunderstandings, the joys and the frustrations, the coping with growing children or aging parents. He wants every couple to know that he is with them, whatever their problems or difficulties. The kingdom of heaven is to be sought not high above the clouds but much nearer home; every family, however ordinary, can in its own small way be a holy family; and that is precisely what the Lord wants yours to be.

May God's blessing be with you and your family today and throughout the coming year.



have allowed himself to be guided by the Spirit if he had not nurtured a relationship with God?

The passage from the Letter to the Hebrews lists Abraham's acts of faith. It was with faith that he left his homeland, received the power to bear offspring, and offered his son to God. This account of Abraham's faith is recounted in Hebrews alongside that of Abel, Enoch, Noah, Moses, and Jesus. The author of Hebrews prefaces these examples with an explanation of faith: "By faith we understand that the worlds were prepared by the word of God, so that what is seen was made from things that are not visible" (11:3). On this Feast of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph, we may want to ponder how well to rest our faith in the Word of God. Such trust may lessen anxiety in our families. And such trust will help us realize the blessings in our families.



# THIS WEEK AT HOME

### Monday, December 29, 2014 St. Thomas Becket, Bishop and Martyr

Thomas Becket (1118–1170) took a stand against the leaders of his day that led to his death as a martyr. His actions have been a light to many through the centuries. It is good to contemplate how one person's actions can make an impression on lives nearly a millennium later. Today's Readings: 1 John 2:3–11; Psalm 96:1–2a, 2b–3, 5b–6; Luke 2:22–35.

### Tuesday, December 30, 2014 Sixth Day within the Octave of the Nativity of the Lord

We read in today's Gospel that the prophetess Anna constantly praised God, praying and fasting in the Temple. Although we need to be about our many duties and responsibilities during the day, we are still called to focus our lives on prayer. Beginning each day with a passage from Scripture may provide us with a more prayerful attitude. Could praying with Scripture daily be a New Year's resolution you are willing to make? Doing so could bring about changes in your life. Today's Readings: 1 John 2:12–17; Psalm 96:7–8a, 8b–9, 10; Luke 2:36–40.

### Wednesday, December 31, 2014 St. Sylvester I, Pope

Pope Sylvester I, who died in the year 335, served the Church at the time of the Edict of Milan, the emergence of the Church from the catacombs, and the building of great basilicas, including Saint John Lateran. He presided over the Council of Nicaea (325). Such devotion to the Church surely was spurred by a sense of the need for evangelization. Just as we read in today's Gospel that John testified to light, so did St. Sylvester. Today's Readings: 1 John 2:18–21; Psalm96:1–2, 11–12, 13; John 1:1–18.

### Thursday, January 1, 2015 Mary, the Holy Mother of God

Since the Council of Ephesus in 431, *Theotokos*, or Godbearer, has been included among the many titles with which we honor Mary. That Council noted that since Christ is both divine and human, Mary is the Mother of God. Since 1967, today also has been observed as a day of prayer for world peace. It is appropriate to ask the intercession of Mary, Mother of God and Queen of Peace, as we pray for an end to strife. Today's Readings: Numbers 6:22–27; Psalm 67:2–3, 5, 6, 8; Galatians 4:4–7; Luke 2:16–21.

### Friday, January 2, 2015 Sts. Basil the Great and Gregory Nazianzen

Sts. Basil (329–379) and Gregory (329–390) modeled the Christian life in so many ways. Both fought the Arian heresy, which held that Christ was not, as we pray in the Creed, "consubstantial with the Father." Both, too, held prayer as the center of their lives. St. Basil was the founder and father of Eastern monasticism. Gregory lived as a hermit for a time, but also did pastoral work and was an esteemed orator. Today's Readings: 1 John 2:22–28; Psalm 98:1, 2–3ab, 3cd–4; John 1:19–28.

# Saturday, January 3, 2015 The Most Holy Name of Jesus

Jesus is "God's chosen one," we hear in today's readings. A name expresses the nature of a person. Persons who played prominent roles throughout salvation history often received their names from God: Adam—man of the earth; Eve—mother of all the living; Abraham—father of many nations; Peter—the rock. What is the origin of your name? If you do not know the day and date on which you were baptized, find out so that you can celebrate your baptismal name day. Today's Readings: 1 John 2:29—3:6; Psalm 98:1, 3cd–4, 5–6; John 1:29–34.





### YEAR OF SACRAMENTS . ONE WORD AT A TIME

Cry

Infants **cry**. We all know it. In their vulnerability, they let us know that they

need nourishment or need to be held. We know that this is true of the newborn Jesus. The Eternal Word made flesh shares the human vulnerability of every other infant on earth. And this infant vulnerability—their need and their smallness—draws us close to them.

We may grow up, but we never leave behind our fundamental vulnerability. In different ways, we continue to cry for sustenance, for mercy, for strength, for healing, and for connection and communion. In our vulnerability, God draws close to us, as Scripture says, with bands of love. When our deepest needs and vulnerabilities prompt us to cry, the Lord draws us to himself through sacramental signs and rituals. He hears our every cry, and the sacraments of the Church tell us that this is true.


In the last century, a few new feasts were blended into the Church year, including today's. After World War I, the chaos of daily life in Europe made its impact felt on the family structure. Partly to offer Christians an image of hope and holiness in married family life, and also to promote the welfare of children, today's feast was "invented" in 1921. In 1969, it became a feast of Christmas.

The prayers today remind us not only of family life, but of life in the community of faith. We ponder the mystery of a God who loves us dearly enough to embrace the struggles, joys, and daily sorrows of family life. The message of Christmas shines through: God-with-us is available to us in the ordinary patterns of our lives and commitments. The lives of people who raise their children in difficult circumstances, and of people who remain faithful to life in the Church in spite of some of their own family struggles, occupy a special place in our hearts today in prayer.

### WE ARE GOD'S HOLY FAMILY

The scriptures of Israel are filled with many stories of barren couples who were miraculously granted the gift of children by God. Surely the best known among these is the first reading from today, from which Luke took inspiration when he recounted the miraculous birth of John the Baptist to Zechariah and Elizabeth, and the more miraculous birth of Jesus to Mary and Joseph. In each instance, we are given examples or role models of those who trusted in God. More than examples of those who trust, they are models of selfsurrender. They abandoned their own presuppositions and prejudices about the workings of the world and turned their lives over to belief in a God who can make life grow where none ought to; a God who can turn death around into a new and unimagined life; a God who can, today, take a tiny child of humble parents in an insignificant town and make him into a light for all the world. This is what we, as God's holy family, are called to do each day: to trust not in ourselves and the way we think things should be, but to open ourselves and surrender ourselves in faith to a God of endless promise.


