



NOTES FROM FATHER BOB ...

First Sunday in Lent 2015

Have you noticed all the books on the shelves telling us how to be better people or develop our careers? The target audience is neither the very successful nor the very poor. Such people either don't need any advice or have enough motivating factors in the hungry faces of their children. No, these books are aimed at people who have a bearable existence, but are not sure they are in the right place. The target audience is those of us who feel we could be doing more, but are also easily tempted to stay exactly where we are. After all, doing nothing new requires less effort and thought.

Those of us who are stick-in-the-muds in our careers often have the same attitude in our spiritual lives. As we begin Lent we are once again asked to test ourselves. We can often suppose that indulging in fantasies is the same as giving in to temptation. Perhaps the real temptation is to stay where we are because we are too comfortable to move from that position. In each of our relationships there is always a tendency to settle for the good rather than the better.

The gospels of Matthew, Mark, and Luke each have a version of this testing scene in the desert. Each trying to show that Jesus had to endure a period of strengthening, making the difficult transition from life as a carpenter to ministry as the Son of God. The other gospel writers attempt to tell us what his temptations could have been. Mark simply says that Jesus endured some testing of his spirit before setting out on his preaching ministry. Until this point Jesus has been content to listen to his cousin John. But now he is becoming aware that more is being asked of him, and he is given courage by the voice from the heavens exclaiming that he is the "beloved" of his Father. Yet his formation is not complete until he spends those hungry days alone with his thoughts and his fears, finding out who he is.

What were the thoughts and fears that may have assailed him? How does one start out on the road to being Messiah? John the prophet is about to endure the fate reserved for most visionaries, so where does that leave Jesus? Wouldn't it be better if he simply went home to his family and carried on with carpentry? Things were easier as a listener to John. Now it seems that he is the one who is being called to fulfill God's plan for his people, a role that will not be without opposition, as he is already finding out.

In the scriptures, the word "Satan" is used in many ways. Initially, it describes an enemy or simply someone who opposes our plans. King David is said once to have been incited by Satan, and in one of Peter's worst moments Jesus applies the name to him. The word gradually becomes a way of putting a face on all those forces that tempt us and are opposed to a loving God. We know that the opposition can be both internal and external. Thank God we do not have to face it alone. Jesus was tempted in every way that we are. The Father who strengthened Jesus in the wilderness is the same God who renews his promise to an unfaithful people, binding himself to them forever in a new relationship.

God's promises come to fulfillment in his Son, who overcomes all opposition by the ministry which he embarks upon in today's Gospel, healing the sick and preaching the good news. Ultimately it will be through his life, death and Resurrection that the world will be renewed.

However we wish to understand the force opposed to God, we can certainly find evidence of it in the violence and destruction we see around us. We might also find evidence of it in the destructive word that sometimes finds its home in us, the word we use to bring both others and ourselves down. We see it in the words and attitudes that cause us to neglect our relationships with God and with those around us.

Mark's gospel was written to strengthen those who were being persecuted and were tempted to renounce Christ to end their pain. He presents Jesus as a man spending time among wild beasts and battling with his own fears, yet as someone who holds true to the call of God. We may not be persecuted today for our faith, but we are tempted to dilute it for the sake of an easy life. We relegate our religious life to one day of the week. Lent reminds each of us that we have to stand up for the faith we profess, even if it causes us to re-examine our attitudes. Let's bring our faith alive as we approach Easter, opting for more rather than less in our spiritual lives. Remember that in the face of our temptations we are not alone. God is with us.

Please, fell free to take one pendant per family and wear it as much as possible, not only as a reminder to ourselves and others of those suffering, but also as a way to create awareness, of the situation in the Middle East, among those who don't know how critical the situation is.

Thanks again for all you do for our persecuted brothers and sisters, and may God continue to bless you and your families with the religious freedom we enjoy in this country today.


