

### NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

### SEVENTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME 2015

The word, 'diet', is usually applied to a strict regime of calorie counting. This practice is more common in countries where people are overfed and accordingly overweight. In such situations the body's weight can increase rapidly and the person becomes physically and emotionally uncomfortable. In some countries overeating produces many medical problems. Part of the cure is a balanced diet. Food is necessary for life and a good variety helps to keep us healthy. Today we are aware, more than ever, of the inner goodness in all foods. We know how each food provides us with the vitamins and minerals that are necessary for our good health. We are aware, too, of the social importance of food. Meals, banquets and parties are laid out when we celebrate birthdays, jubilees, anniversaries and other great events. Food is enjoyed most when it is taken in a meal shared with others. To share food is to share life.

In a remote and lonely place a multitude shared food and life to an extent they did not appreciate. In this hour appointed by God to reveal his Word made flesh, the great liberation of Israel from captivity is reenacted. Just as God had fed the Israelites in the wilderness with manna, so now Jesus multiples the bread and feeds them. Just as God, through Moses, led his people into physical freedom, so now Jesus offers God's people spiritual freedom. On both occasions people gladly received the gift but failed to appreciate the giver. The multiplication of the loaves is but a hint of something greater. We notice that out of a little they all ate as much as they wanted, and that there was even some left over. At this hour, then, the people had a good opportunity to reflect on their spiritual history. Throughout the Hebrew Bible God feeds his people both physically with food and spiritually with wisdom. Both are expressions of his loving care and both are equally important. The wisdom here is the faith and insight which is needed to put people in a right relationship with God. But this particular nourishment is not always appreciated or well received. It is a banquet for which an invitation is given, but the response is not always forthcoming. God's gift always includes the challenge to put him first in all things. It is a blessing to hunger for God. In this gospel scene the physical hunger of the people was but a surface reminder of that deeper hunger by which we yearn constantly for God. Elsewhere in John's Gospel Jesus teaches that his food is to do the Father's will and to complete his work on earth. To hunger for God is to receive God. The hungry heart is receptive to the wisdom of God.

As we get energy and sustenance from food, so we are fed and grow healthy in faith as we hear and receive the word of God in the Scriptures. We are truly blessed that God's nourishing word is proclaimed to us at our regular worship. The Scriptures help us to grow in our knowledge of the Lord and challenge us to adjust our living to his word. But we can never be satisfied, because our knowledge of the Lord is meant to grow day by day. We ourselves can contribute actively to that growth. When did I last spend time studying the Bible? Our hunger for the word of God must never be suppressed or ignored, but satisfied. The more we feed on it the more we will want, because we will discover our huge capacity for God. God's love completes us. We receive God's word in our minds and in our hearts. The Christ-centered person is very open and receptive. The nourishing word always produces good results in that person's life. It brings us close to Jesus and to one another in his body. To know Jesus is to be alive with him. Ignorance is far from bliss. The well-known saying that ignorance of Scripture is ignorance of Christ remains true. But it can also be said that faith-filled knowledge of Scripture will lead us to a deep and loving knowledge of Christ. Now is the time to seek the wisdom that comes from God. Saint Paul speaks of Christ as the power and the wisdom of God. Time spent in bible study is time well spent on ourselves as we dine on the nourishing fare that is God's word. Thanks be to God.



#### FOOD PANTRY UPDATE

Help! Our dedicated volunteers are ready to pack bags for our next monthly food distribution on August 13, but the cupboard is almost bare! We are in short supply of many of our staples and extras. Please add a few items to your weekly grocery list, as you are able. A few reminders:

- All in-date non-perishables are greatly appreciated, especially the staples on our *most needed at this time* list: canned tomatoes/sauce, dry pinto beans (2-3# bags work best for us), assorted canned beans, canned vegetables, canned peaches/pears, soup, canned meat, crackers, shelf-stable microwave meals and paper products.
- Some favorite "extras" include snacks, powdered drink mix, canned/powdered milk, laundry detergent, dishwashing soap and diapers, especially sizes 4-6. Usually we put at least one of these extra items in each pre-packed family bag, as well as offering families a choice of one or two of these items on the night of distribution.
- We will have our first of the summer "Share the Wealth" collection of fresh produce—whether home-grown or store-bought—at the August 13 monthly food distribution. Please drop off your donations **only** on **August 13.** Time: 4:45-5:45 p.m. Place: Church narthex.
- We also plan on distributing some school supplies in August, so please place your contributions in our regular food bins: new pencils, colored pencils, pens, crayons, markers, pocket folders, erasers, single subject spiral notebooks and loose leaf paper.
- You can drop off non-perishable contributions in the designated bins in the Shrine area of the Church narrhex after all weekend Masses, and daily 7:45 a.m.-4:00 p.m.
- **Monetary donations are also appreciated.** Checks should be written to St. Cletus Social Concerns, and placed in the collection basket or mailed/dropped off at the rectory.

### **Youth Ministry Mission Accomplished**

Twelve teens and two adults set out on July 5 to begin a week of service with Young Neighbors in Action. The week was action-packed but included time each day for prayer and reflection, and the group balanced work with fun and spiritual growth with fellowship.

The trip started by checking into Lindenwood Conference Center in Donaldson, Indiana. This is owned and operated by the Poor Handmaids of Jesus Christ sisters. The land and accommodations were beautiful.

We set out to the Marshall County Neighborhood Center that includes a food pantry and clothing distribution for the county. Throughout the week, the kids scrubbed, cleaned, planted, painted, cleaned gutters, built flower pot stands out of old pallets, sorted clothes and baked treats for the food pantry attendees.

We also worked at the Earthworks farm. This is managed by Farmer Sam, and all the produce is used for the sisters and the assisted living center on the PHJC campus. The food scraps from the gardens and the motherhouse are used to feed the pigs and goats and chickens as well as for composting for the gardens. On the farm the kids learned to mow grass, weed whip, install chicken wire around the greenhouse, weed, (lots of weeding) plant lettuce, harvest and wash green beans, yellow beans, and kale, move lots of dirt to help prevent flooding, crush stone, mop the workhouse.

One afternoon, we visited Culver Beach and Culver Academy and had a lovely afternoon cleaning the beach and petting the horses at Culver Academy.

Each morning and evening the entire group (six different parishes from Illinois, Missouri, and Ohio) met for worship and sharing. Additionally, on Wednesday night the kids participated in a social justice simulation where different roles were assigned, and the kids had to figure out a social welfare system. It paralleled the intake process at the neighborhood center so that the kids could see the process in real life as well as feel the process for a few minutes in play.

The overall mission of the Young Neighbors in Action is to look at social justice issues that exist in the world and in every community and to encourage the kids to ask why these issues exist and what they can do about them. The kids came home energized with great ideas on how to get involved with our community and within our parish!

Thank you to the teens who participated in the mission trip, and thank you for Deacon Stuart Heyes and Mrs. Robbie O'Shea who gave their time to join them.


