NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

EIGHTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME 2015

As the Israelites made their way through desert and barren land in search of God's promises, they mound and ground at the hardness of it all. Wouldn't it better to be back in Egypt where they had hot meals and warm houses every day? Better that than this long, lonesome and never-ending journey. Is that not true? No it is not true. Egypt was security for them, yes, but it was not freedom. Who wants a life with no prospects? No one surely, for that would be a living death. Why live when there is nowhere to go? Life is a journey or it is nothing.

But if our life proves too hard, if there is no relief from the dark grey skies, why go on? Surely, then, it is understandable to live for the day, to settle for the possible pleasures that come our way. Even more, to drown our sorrows in anything that will take away the pain of too much painful life. Drink and drugs often hide a deep desire for life. It can be truly said of many a one who take a drink, 'You do not drink because you want to die. You drink because you actually want to live.'

So it was that the Israelites asked for food for the living in the desert, and God gave them manna for their daily bread. 'Give us this day our daily bread.' Their prayer was answered. In the same way, Jesus in his day fed the crowds with bread. This made the people hungry for more, and they followed him, eager to see what he would do next.

It is at this moment that Jesus takes the opportunity to teach the people how to live. Do not go looking for the spectacular, he says. Do not go just looking for your own daily advantage and pleasure. That would be aimless living, a waste of a good life. Instead, look for the things that endure to eternal life. Look for true bread that forever nourishes your heart and mind and soul. That is going to demand a spiritual revolution inside of you. Stop the selfish impulses inside you. Stop the me-culture, the I-want-it-now culture. Stop the doing-as-others-do culture.

Learn a different way of living. Set your heart on Christ Jesus – God's promise of eternal life for us. Feed from this source every day of your life. "Give us that bread always," the Jewish people said to Our Lord. We should say the same, and say it every day. In reply, the Lord tells us, "You will never be hungry. You will never thirst."

The journey of life is hard. Of that there is no doubt. Many people find it to be an uphill struggle. But once you accept that life is hard, it ceases to be a problem. So says Scott Peck, the American psychiatrist and theologian. If we fully embrace this hardness of life, and willingly set out on the journey, prepared each day to face its challenges and set-backs, then we can help each other along the road. For now life is no longer a problem we cannot handle. Rather it has become the great adventure that leads us to the land of promise, and we are given food for the journey by the Lord himself.

The Religious Education Office currently has openings in a few key volunteer ministries. Please read about them below, and prayerfully consider joining this awesome team!

CATECHIST: The classroom teacher who actively shares their faith and love of Jesus with the children. You do not need previous experience – we provide training, all materials and resources, even written lesson plans! Catechists receive a \$100 tuition credit or stipend at the end of the year. We currently have openings in Grades 1-6 on Sunday mornings and Monday evenings, as well as openings in our Early Childhood Religious Education classes. Co-teaching or Partner teaching is also an option here!

AIDE: The classroom helper who assists the Catechist and students in the classroom as needed. You do not need previous experience – just a desire to help and share your faith with the kids! Aides receive a \$50 tuition credit or stipend at the end of the year. We currently have openings in Grades 1-5 on Sunday mornings or Monday evenings, as well as openings in our Early Childhood Religious Education classes.

OFFICE HELPER: A new volunteer opportunity! This volunteer will assist us in the office during regularly scheduled RE class times. This person will answer phones, monitor children arriving late/leaving early, assist in maintaining a safe environment for our students in the building, and assist with attendance. Office Helpers will receive a \$100 tuition credit or stipend at the end of the year. We currently have openings on Sunday mornings or Monday evenings.

SUBSTITUTE CATECHIST: Occasionally, a Catechist may be absent or need to miss a class. We need people who are willing to serve in this capacity. Volunteers can stipulate a preference for subbing on Sunday morning or Monday evening.

Attendance at a Protecting God's Children session is required of all volunteers 18+ who work with children. This is mandated by the Archdiocese of Chicago. Trainings will take place here at St. Cletus at the end of the summer.

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE OUTREACH MINISTRY

Who Is at Greatest Risk? 1

Any person, anywhere, can be a victim of abuse. Domestic violence affects both women and men, and cuts across all age, racial, ethnic, religious, educational, and socioeconomic strata. Available research, however, indicates that domestic violence does appear to be more prevalent in certain groups:

- women, including those who are single, separated, married or divorced;
- teens and young adults;
- women who lack access to their own financial resources;
- women who abuse alcohol or other drugs, or whose partners do;
- women who are pregnant and have been previously abused; and
- individuals whose partners are excessively jealous or possessive.

Characteristics of Abusers

There is no universal profile of an abuser. Perpetrators of domestic violence can be young or old, male or female, professional or unskilled, educated or illiterate, rich or poor, religious or secular, or of any race or ethnicity. Abusers run the gamut of psychological "diagnoses," ranging from perfectly normal to psychotic. However, abusers tend to:

- objectify their partners (i.e., treat them as a category or object, not as a full human being);
- feel entitled to get their needs met without regard to the needs or feelings of their partners;
- use power (be it physical, emotional, political, economic or spiritual) to make sure their agenda is accomplished;
- feel that coercion is an effective and acceptable way to get their needs met;
- have the opportunity to be abusive without being held fully accountable; and
- behave abusively with a particular victim.

Consciously or unconsciously, most batterers assume a sense of privilege, which is used to gain and maintain power, or the "upper hand" in the relationship. They tend to believe their behavior is completely justified and necessary to fulfill their role in the relationship, as the one who is in charge, in control, is the provider and is "king of the castle." They feel they have attained or have been endowed with privilege to behave the way they do, and do not believe what they are doing is wrong in any way. They believe the role of their partner is to do what she is told, and to further and support the batterer's agenda and needs. Examples of privilege used as justification by batterers include: being male; being physically stronger; being heterosexual, or alternatively being a more experienced gay or lesbian; being white; being a U.S. citizen or being documented (if an immigrant); being the wage earner, or earning more money if both are employed; being more highly educated; being

able-bodied; and being more religious or observant, among others.

In addition, the following characteristics are often seen in abusers:

- Often, abusers will not clearly acknowledge that their behavior is abusive or even hurtful, even if they have been arrested and convicted of a violent crime. For example, an abuser may tend to focus on what "she said" that "made him" act in a way that he considers to be justified and not at all wrong. It often takes years for abusers to move through a process of healing within themselves.
- Following a discrete abusive incident, some perpetrators may be truly sorry for their actions. Some batterers are horrified that they have hit their wives or girlfriends, are overcome with remorse, and genuinely want to change. They may apologize profusely and shower their partners with gifts and extra attention. Unfortunately, without professional help from a certified batterer intervention program, the cycle of violence usually begins anew, often with more dangerous consequences in future assaults.
- Abuse is likely to continue and to progressively escalate if abusers do not address their violent behavior. Voluntary or court-appointed professional help is almost always necessary for a perpetrator to change his behavior. Certified batterer intervention programs take between one and two years to complete.
- Some abusers blame their violent acts on external factors such as their partner's behavior or provocation, being drunk, coping with a medical or psychological illness, or simply having a bad day. Experts in batterer intervention are quick to remind clients that they themselves must take responsibility for their own behavior.



ST. CLETUS WEDDING MINISTRY



The St. Cletus Wedding Ministry cordially invites all parishioners, male and female, to join this ministry. We work in teams assisting the parish staff with wedding rehearsals and wedding day facilitation. Wedding ministers help to


