NOTES FROM FATHER BOB...

TWENTIETH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME 2015

A woman was accepted as a new member of a local association of Catholic women. Her situation was unusual, because the rules of the association required that only Catholic women who were regular church-goers could be accepted as members. For most of her adult life she had been a nominal Catholic but was now searching for some purpose in her life. Having heard of this group she applied for membership. The association had been in existence for a very long time and had never been known to deviate from the rules. But her application was timely, because this group of women had just been involved in a program of parish renewal, which had transformed their faith. During that time each one had experienced the reality of God's love. Now their vision of church was different as they discovered a new unity in their ranks. Now, more than ever, they sensed the presence of the Lord in their parish and in their association. They were convinced that their faith and their love as a group would draw this woman, their sister, into full involvement with God and his church. Within months their confidence was vindicated as she joyfully celebrated with them at the altar of God and continued to grow in faith. In receiving the Lord in the Eucharist she had a deep sense of homecoming.

John's Gospel shows that very early in the Church's existence the followers of Jesus held the profound belief that in the Eucharist they received the body and blood of the Lord. For this reason they were often accused of cannibalism by their enemies. It was the sort of accusation that comes easily from those who do not believe and who do not understand. But of course they were not cannibals. John's Gospel focuses closely on Jesus' own insistence upon the physical reality of the gift. What Jesus offers for the life of the world is real food and real drink. Jesus was truly present in the mysterious celebration under the appearances of bread and wine. For the contemporaries of Jesus this teaching was shocking and offensive. By the time John's Gospel was written even some Christians were finding the teaching difficult. The evangelist records the teaching of Jesus in a clear and emphatic manner to remove all doubt about this vital Christian belief and practice. The teaching is uncompromising. It presents us with the sheer physical reality of the gift which brings us union with God and with one another. It changes us.

When we celebrate the Eucharist we commit ourselves to one another in our parish community. During the Eucharistic celebration we gladly receive the body and blood of the Lord. We call this moment Holy Communion. Communion is not something we receive, rather it is something we do and experience. We enter into Holy Communion with Jesus and with one another. It is a great tragedy if our reception of the Eucharist becomes nothing more than mere routine or habit. To receive this great gift of the Lord without reflecting on the purpose or direction of our lives hurts us spiritually. When we celebrate the Eucharist we consent fully to our vocation, which is to follow Jesus Christ without conditions. We give him permission to lead us where he will and to shape our community in the manner he desires. The Eucharist gives us courage to do this. At the Eucharist the Lord calls together a rich mixture of characters and personalities. He loves us in our individuality and calls us into unity. The real food that is Jesus nourishes our unity and makes it possible for us to serve the world into which he sends us. It is for good reason, therefore, that the Church calls the Eucharist the bond of unity. We have true unity only when we can accept the wonderful uniqueness of each member of the Church. The Lord does not want us all looking the same and sounding the same. Our diversity enriches the Church. Our many gifts and abilities help bring about God's rule on earth. In the power of the Eucharist we are called to make a personal commitment to unity in the community of the Church. True unity requires our free consent. Through his own freely given consent the Lord Jesus pours himself out for us in this Eucharist. We respond to his love by committing ourselves to his mission of peace on earth.

FOOD PANTRY

The Food Pantry is truly a group effort—a labor of love-- as was demonstrated so clearly in the August 13 monthly distribution. We received donations—monetary, food, both non-perishable and produce, and school supplies —to ready us for over 200 families. Many hours were donated by the men and women who carried over goods from the food bins; sorted and checked dates; shelved items; packed bags of groceries; shopped locally and at the Greater Chicago Food Depository for groceries to supplement donations; sorted and bagged produce; carried over bags and extras, including school supplies, from the rectory to set up the church narthex—for distribution; registered and greeted client families with a smile and kind words; helped families choose their extras, pre-packed bags, and school supplies for families with children; assisted clients in carrying their groceries to their cars; cleaned up after distribution

I have often heard this comment: "There is sure a lot of hard physical work involved. Why do volunteers do it so cheerfully and faithfully?" I believe the answer is simple... because it is what Jesus asks of us. They take to heart the words of Jesus: "whatever you do for the least of these, you do for me." Bountiful thanks to all of you! Your efforts truly make a difference in the lives of many in our community, who continue to struggle financially.

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE OUTREACH MINISTRY: EDUCATING OURSELVES

RELIGION AND DOMESTIC VIOLENCE¹

A Statement of the U.S. Catholic Bishops

The Church Responds to Domestic Violence

- Religion can be either a resource or a roadblock for battered women. As a resource, it encourages women to resist mistreatment. As a roadblock, its misinterpretation can contribute to the victim's self-blame and suffering and to the abuser's rationalizations.
- Abused women often say, "I can't leave this relationship. The Bible says it would be wrong." Abusive men often say, "The Bible says my wife should be submissive to me." They take the biblical text and distort it to support their right to batter.
- The church condemns the use of the Bible to support abusive behavior in any form. A correct reading of Scripture leads people to an understanding of the equal dignity of men and women and to relationships based on mutuality and love. Beginning with Genesis, Scripture teaches that women and men are created in God's image. Jesus himself always respected the human dignity of women.
- Men who abuse can take Scripture out of context to justify their behavior, but Scripture refers to the mutual submission of husband and wife out of love for Christ. Husbands should love their wives as they love their own body, as Christ loves the Church.
- Men who batter may also cite Scripture to insist that their victims forgive them. Forgiveness, however, does
 not mean forgetting the abuse or pretending that it did not happen. Forgiveness is not permission to repeat the
 abuse. Rather, forgiveness means that the victim decides to let go of the experience and move on with greater
 insight and conviction not to tolerate abuse of any kind again.

- An abused woman may see her suffering as just punishment for a past deed for which she feels guilty. She may try to explain suffering by saying that it is "God's will" or "part of God's plan for my life" or "God's way of teaching me a lesson." However, God is a kind, merciful, and loving God. Jesus went out of his way to help suffering women. God promises to be present to us in our suffering, even when it is unjust.
- The church emphasizes that no person is expected to stay in an abusive marriage. Some abused women believe that church teaching on the permanence of marriage requires them to stay in an abusive relationship. They may hesitate to seek a separation or divorce and fear that they cannot re-marry in the Church. Violence and abuse, not divorce, break up a marriage.

First Responders: Priests, Deacons, and Lay Ministers

Church ministers have three goals, in the following order:

- Safety for the victim and children
- Accountability for the abuser
- Restoration of the relationship (if possible), or mourning over the loss of the relationship.

Church ministers are also encouraged to see themselves as "first responders" who:

- Listen to and believe the victim's story,
- Help her to assess the danger to herself and her children, and
- Refer her to counseling and other specialized services.

In dealing with people who abuse, church ministers need to hold them accountable for their behavior. They can support the abusive person as he seeks counseling to change his abusive behavior. Couple counseling is not appropriate and can endanger the victim's safety.

Church ministers should become familiar with and follow the reporting requirements of their state. Many professionals who deal with vulnerable people are required to report suspected crimes, which may include domestic abuse.


