

Notes from Fr. Bob...


TWENTY-FOURTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

In the nineteenth century, Karl Marx described religion as the 'opium of the people'. He criticized churches for offering false hope to people by talking about eternal life but not addressing their earthly poverty: the unjust working conditions in which they labored the appalling social conditions in which they lived. The caricature of religion presented by Marx does not recognize the struggle of countless men and women who have tried to live the commandment to 'love God and love neighbor'. At the same time, some presentations of Christianity can suffer from criticism that Marx made. Focus on the joy of eternal life and the victory of resurrection can sound hollow to people who experience pain or suffering in this world. The pain of grief may be ignored or the wounds of violent relationships glossed over. To live the Christian message is to acknowledge and live through the presence of the cross in life. In Mark's account of the scene in the Garden of Gethsemane, Jesus wept and experienced terror and anguish. He prayed that he would not have to endure the cross but asked only for the courage to do God's will.

Who do you say I am? Jesus caused confusion among the people to whom he preached because he healed and forgave sinners. Some misunderstood him; others thought that he was Elijah or another Old Testament prophet. Peter was able to recognize him as the Christ, the anointed one, the one for whom the Jewish people had hoped and waited. Like many present-day disciples, Peter only half understood the message of Jesus. Like many other Jews, he hoped for an earthly messiah who would liberate Israel from Roman occupation. This messiah would be victorious and clearly revealed as the hope of Israel. Thus, he could not accept that the Jewish leaders would reject Jesus and suffer death on a cross. This was scandalous. He protested against this message. His ways of thinking were very narrow and he was criticized by Jesus for his short-sightedness.

It is comforting for us that Peter, who walked and ate with Jesus and who knew from reading the prophets Isaiah and Jeremiah that the Old Testament prophets were insulted and suffered, could be so mistaken. If he can make such mistakes, then it is not surprising that we can do the same.

However, no matter how often we may get it wrong, what always matters is our integrity. For example in business today we hear the term 'whistle-blower'. It describes the person who goes public about some malpractice or injustice. There comes a point where conscience demands that the harm and injustice be exposed. The price of honesty can be very high, but it can also be prophetic. To stand out in faith for the rights of others can lead to personal suffering, insult and scorn in the workplace. While the feelings are painful,



In such situations, people may feel unsupported and distanced from their friends. It can be a lonely place when one knows that the right thing has been done but was not welcome. To try and live through the pain is difficult. By the same token the instinctive response of the friend may be to try and superficially cheer up the one who is suffering. The temptation in this is that we try to bypass the reality of the cross. Sometimes we can only be like John and the women who stood by at the foot of the cross. In this way we give witness together to the pain that living the Christian message entails.

In the early 1960's, Martin Luther King wrote about the suffering that must be endured by the Afro-American before his dream of equality and dignity could be realized. However, he recognized that Good Friday would give way to Easter Sunday. To live through Good Friday is the difficult task. Christians place their hope in the resurrection and the victory of Christ over suffering, sin and death. The image of three days in the tomb offers the hope of victory, but the three days may prove a very long time. Support and reassurance can be a mighty help in the dark days. The love and presence of the neighbor can give a person the hope needed to carry on. Be sure it is the faithful, loving, and authentic witness to the invitation of Jesus to take up the cross.

CATECHIST SUBS


Thanks to all the wonderful returning Catechists and the exuberant generosity of new catechist recruits. Our children will be blessed to have devoted men and women nurture their faith.

HUNGER ACTION MONTH WWW.CHICAGOSFOODBANK.ORG

We are almost halfway through the seventh annual Hunger Action Month – have you found a way to get involved in the fight against hunger? Following are among some suggestions found on the Greater Chicago Food Depository website, www.chicagosfoodbank.org.

1) Step into the shoes of someone who is food insecure in *Take the* our community by taking the SNAP Challenge, which asks participants to live on \$35 of food for a week - the average weekly SNAP (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance



Program) benefit for an individual in Illinois. Challenge participants are forced to make food shopping choices on a limited budget, and often realize how difficult it is to avoid hunger, afford nutritious foods, and stay healthy with too few resources.



2) EAT OUT, HELP "86 HUNGER" - During Hunger Action Month, various restaurants across Chicago will be participating in the 86 Hunger charity dine-around. A portion of the sales from certain menu items will be donated to the Food Depository. Learn more on GCFD website.



3) Help fight hunger with the Jewel-Osco Give A Little, Feed A Lot Campaign. At Jewel-Osco locations in Cook County, you will have the opportunity to make a donation to the Food Depository at checkout.

SOCIETY OF ST. VINCENT DE PAUL

In almost every country, groups of Christian friends, known as the Society of St. Vincent de Paul, work to bring help and hope to persons in need. Active SVDP membership, which entails the regular person to person service of distressed persons, is a universally recommended way of Christian caring. However, not every parishioner is equipped for or attracted to this kind of in-person encounter with suffering. But every parishioner, no matter what his capacities and circumstances can be partnered in SVDP's charitable activities. How?

- By praying for those in our community who are vulnerable and troubled.
- If able, by making a monetary donation in the SVDP donation box located in the church narthex.
- By dropping off clean, gently used clothes and shoes in the St. Vincent DePaul Clothing Drop Box, located in the St. Cletus parking lot. These clothes are used in the SVDP Family Thrift Shop's voucher program, which allows less fortunate people to receive clothing and shoes at no cost to them.

How long have you known me?

"I can barely speak about what goes on in my home. Well, it's not really my home. At their insistence I moved in with my son and his wife. They thought I was unsafe in my old home and they wanted me here. What could I say? It seemed generous on their part. How was I to know it would come to this? It all began as I moved slower and slower. They seemed so impatient with me. They would tell me, "get a move on, we don't have all day." But I just couldn't move as fast as they wanted. They began saying other mean things to me, then they began pushing me to get me to move faster. I don't know what overcame them. Finally, she pushed me and I fell. Oh, then things really began to happen. They couldn't get me up, and finally had to call for help. When the ambulance came, they told them I was walking and just fell down. At the emergency room the doctor wondered why I had those finger marks on my arms, but I didn't tell him. After all, where would I live if someone arrested my children for hurting me?"

MYTH: Domestic Violence can occur in older women, but it is quite rare.

FACT: Approximately half of all elder abuse in women is thought to be domestic violence "grown old." Older battered women are less likely to seek and receive help.




