Notes from Fr. Bob...

3RD SUNDAY OF ADVENT 2015

A lone gunman stepped easily out of the car, rested his rifle on the car door and aimed it at the Church. Through the wide open doors he could see right up the long aisle to his target, a priest who was just finishing his homily at mass that morning. A shot rang out and so ended the life of Oscar Arnulfo Romero, Archbishop of San Salvador. It was March 24, 1980.

For the previous three years Oscar Romero had preached the Gospel to all his people, and had denounced the sins and murders and tortures that were destroying his country. Using the Archdiocesan Radio Station he spoke to all the people and everyone listened to him. To the poor he was the "voice of those who have no voice". To the rich and powerful he was a Communist and an enemy of the State, and he was publicly denounced as such.

"We have never preached violence, "Romero said," except the violence of love, which left Christ nailed to a cross, the violence that we must each do to ourselves to overcome our selfishness and such cruel inequalities among us."

The authorities tried to jam his radio transmissions but he gave his sermons faithfully and the poor people of El Salvador hung onto his every word. What kind of a gospel would it be, Romero asked, that did not provoke a crisis in you? Nice, pious considerations that do not bother people, this is what many people would like. Such a gospel never hurts anyone, and never helps anyone, either. No, the Gospel is courageous, and it makes demands on us, even to the giving of our lives.

This was the message of John the Baptist to his own contemporaries. The Baptist, too, was regarded equally as a messenger from God and as a madman, a holy man and a troublemaker. The people asked John, "What shall we do to make ourselves ready to meet the Lord when he comes?" John gave them simple gospel answers. Share with those who have nothing. Do not exploit others either for money or power or position. He reminded the rich and the military that true wealth, true influence and true power are spiritual things, not matters of money and guns.

Twenty centuries later, in our time, Romero gave the same message to his people. "The Church says to the rich: Do not sin by misusing your money. It says to the powerful; do not misuse your political influence. Do not misuse your weaponry. Do not misuse your power."

The abuse of power has brought great suffering to millions of people.

In every human life we are tempted to misuse our power over others. The Baptist tells us today, "The one who is coming is more powerful than I am." He is the one we must face. And so a feeling of expectation grew among his people.

What must we do in our lives? If we have no sense of God, or no sense of justice, we will not be expecting anything. We will fall into lazy ways of living. Then the Gospel will be only a storybook. It will have no power over us, to touch us or move us or bring us life.

That is why we need Oscar Romero to shake us up, to be a Baptist for us today. For the Advent season of 1978 this is what Romero said. "Advent should admonish us to discover in each brother or sister that we greet, in each friend whose hand we shake, in each beggar who asks for bread, in each worker who wants to use the right to join a union, in each peasant who looks for work in the coffee groves, the face of Christ. Then it would not be possible to rob them, to cheat them, to deny them their rights. They are Christ, and whatever is done to them Christ will take as done to him. This is what Advent is: Christ living among us."

A bullet stopped that brave heart beating, but it could not still the voice. Oscar Romero: a voice in the wilderness of worldly greed, a voice calling to us today.

A feeling of expectancy, of approaching life can come to you, if you will listen out for that voice. You will say, "What must I do?" A voice will answer, "Follow me."

Jubilee Year of Mercy

DESCRIPTION OF THE LOGO

The logo and the motto together provide a fitting summary of what the Jubilee Year is all about. The motto Merciful Like the Father (taken from the Gospel of Luke, 6:36) serves as an invitation to follow the merciful example of the Father who asks us not to judge or condemn but to forgive and to give love and forgiveness without measure (cfr. Lk 6:37-38). The logo – the work of Jesuit Father Marko I. Rupnik – presents a small summa theologiae of the theme of mercy. In fact, it represents an image quite important to the early Church: that of the Son having taken upon his shoulders the lost soul demonstrating that it is the love of Christ that brings to completion the mystery of his incarnation culminating in redemption. The logo has been designed in such a way so as to express the profound way in which the Good Shepherd touches the flesh of humanity and does so with a love with the power to change one's life. One particular feature worthy of note is that while the Good Shepherd, in his great mercy, takes humanity upon himself, his eyes are merged with those of man. Christ sees with the eyes of Adam, and Adam with the eyes of Christ. Every person discovers in Christ, the new Adam, one's own humanity and the future that lies ahead, contemplating, in his gaze, the love of the Father.

The scene is captured within the so called mandorla (the shape of an almond), a figure quite important in early and medieval iconography, for it calls to mind the two natures of Christ. divine and human. The three concentric ovals, with colors progressively lighter as we move outward. suggest the movement of Christ who carries humanity out of the night of sin and death. Conversely, the depth of the darker color suggests impenetrability of the love of the Father who forgives all.



CELEBRATE

This Sunday, God rejoices and sings because of us. We read in Zephaniah today that God "will sing joyfully because of you, / as one sings at festivals" (Zephaniah 3:18). We know plenty about singing at festivals. Already our ears are ringing with the songs and carols that anticipate the Christmas season.

Paul reminds us of the source of our own double rejoicing: God is the mighty savior who is in our midst (in Zephaniah's words). Because this is so, says Paul, we can rejoice and be at ease. We don't have to worry, for God's peace will stand guard over our hearts and minds.

A medieval carol depicts Christmas as "my dancing day" and urges us to enter into the dance. Why all the merrymaking? Because "the Lord is near," as Paul reminds us (Philippians 4:5). He then points to another reason for the dancing: the dawn of the promise of peace, the peace beyond all understanding, that is now within our grasp.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

This week, our celebration of Advent makes a transition in ritual and texts. Beginning December 18, the countdown of nine days (a novena) to Christmas sees a heightened sense of expectation, and also a turning from the call of the Baptist in the wilderness to the events leading up to Jesus' birth. In ancient Spain, December 18 was once celebrated as the "Feast of the Expectancy," and customs grew up to heighten readiness in the homes.

Some customs arise from monastic life and practice and spill over into our parish life. Beginning tonight, those who pray Vespers will sing in the opening phrase a beautiful title of Christ. These titles belong to a collection of opening phrases called the "O Antiphons" after the awe-inspired "O" sung on the first note. There's a playful code in the titles: O Wisdom, O Lord, O Flower of Jesse, O Key of David, O Dawn, O Ruler, O Emmanuel. When you take their Latin names—Sapientia, Adonai, Radix, and so on—the titles form an acrostic when you read them backwards: "ERO CRAS." In Latin, that is translated as "I will be there tomorrow!" It's as if Christ were answering the prayers of the waiting people in the words of the prayers themselves.




THANK YOU MISSION LADIES

A LETTER FROM THE SOCIETY OF ST. VINCENT DE PAUL OF CHICAGO

Dear Illinois Vincentians - The State of Illinois has been without a budget since July 2015. The impasse between the governor and the General Assembly is causing hardship on the people we serve and the social service agencies they depend on for the assistance they deserve. We communicated with



National SVdP Voice of the Poor and with your Council Presidents on this issue and we agreed to ask you to send a letter to Gov. Rauner and House Speaker Madigan urging them to work on a fair and just budget. In March 2015, SVdP National President Sheila Gilbert outlined the moral criteria to guide budgetary decisions:

Every budget decision should be assessed by whether it protects or threatens human life and dignity.

A central moral measure of any budget proposal is how it affects "the least of these" (Matthew 25). The needs of those who are hungry and homeless, without work or living in poverty should come first.

Government and other institutions have a shared responsibility to promote the common good for all, especially ordinary workers and families who struggle to live in dignity during difficult economic times.

We support the goal of reducing future unsustainable deficits and believe our state has an obligation to address their impact on the health of the economy. However, a just framework for the state budget cannot rely on disproportionate cuts in essential services to poor persons. It requires shared sacrifice by all, including raising adequate revenues.




