Notes from Fr. Bob...

20TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Many countries spend millions of dollars on guards and boarder security to keep out illegal immigrants and to monitor refugees and asylum seekers who want to gain access to a better life. These people risk their lives crossing rivers, deserts, and seas, dodging trains or cooped up in containers, boxcars or ship hauls, where lack of air and water can tragically result in death. Throughout the world there are millions of refugees fleeing poverty, violence, and persecution. They dream of getting on the inside – of gaining access to a “promised land” of freedom, prosperity, and security.

The woman in today’s gospel was a foreigner who wanted to have a share in the benefits of the chosen people. She was an alien who wanted to be treated as a citizen – “one of us”, not “one of them”. Why did Jesus seem so unwilling to let her in? There is no doubt that Jesus was very conscious that his mission initially was to his own people, but here he would seem to be making a powerful point for his disciples. He pushes the woman to the limit and in so doing reminds them of how easy it is to reject and dismiss others out of sheer prejudice. She displays extraordinary courage and dignity and as Jesus cures her he draws attention to her great faith. He thereby demonstrates that he had come for men and women of every race and color in every time and place. As so often happens in these encounters between Jesus and an individual person we see that Jesus was profoundly moved by the experience. It is inconceivable that Jesus would have insulted this Canaanite woman. Once again part of the force of the message about the dogs (or more correctly the pups) eating the scraps was for the benefit of the disciples. As we picture Jesus smiling and teasing the woman, we might understand better her chirpy response and Jesus’ delight at it.

It would take a long time for this lesson to be learned even by the disciples. The argument about what was required of gentile people surfaced repeatedly throughout the life of the early church and is recorded in the Acts of the Apostles and the letters of Saint Paul. This is perfectly illustrated in today’s short passage from Romans, where, like Jesus, Paul is hoping that his work for those not of his own race, will prompt his own people to come to their senses.

Today’s gospel challenges us about our priorities in life and the extent to which we treat others as outsiders. Are our priorities all centered on self, on making our own lives comfortable and easy? Or are other people at the

heart of
our lives? Do
we have time for others or
do our priorities mean we ignore their needs?

Charity begins at home. We can ask ourselves about the quality of our relationships – and of the time we spend – with those who are nearest and dearest to us. We might ask if we restrict our love, our time and compassion to our own people. Or can our love extend beyond these narrow limits? Charity might begin at home, but it shouldn’t end there.

This gospel also asks us to see if we are willing to change, to set aside our plans in order to respond to the real needs of people. If we think we are too old or too set in our ways to change, this might mean we have stopped growing, or worse, that we are closing our eyes and ears to the needs of others. It is easy to demonize others, to depict them in ways which deny their basic humanity, so that we can ignore their needs. The gospel challenges us to look beyond labels, to see the common humanity of the person who is different, the stranger, and to respond with generosity.

Have a care for justice and cling to the Lord’s covenant, Isaiah tells us. **HAVE A CARE FOR JUSTICE:** be fair, honest and generous in our dealings with others – not just those close to us, but all God’s children. **KEEP THE LORD’S COVENANT:** acknowledge the Lord in our life. If we act with justice towards others and make room for God in our lives, he promises that he will give us a deep joy; he will hear our prayers and accept not just our sacrifices, but our very selves. Then we will not be foreigners, aliens to God, but rather insiders, members of his chosen people.

Sunday Notes

CALLED TO ACT IN GOD'S NAME

"Let all the nations praise you!" (Psalm 67:4) today's psalm response exclaims. In the psalms and other Hebrew scriptures, this kind of invocation is actually an invitation to God to act, to intervene in human lives in a manner that will cause everyone—not just the Chosen People—to give praise. Stated a bit more strongly, it is something of a "put up or shut up" challenge to God, the sort of strong statement the psalmists of Israel, trusting in their intimate and loving relationship with God, were not afraid to make.

The Gospel has its own exclamation, announcing the appearance of the Canaanite woman with Behold!" (Matthew 15:22) "Behold!" is a scriptural flag that tells us that God is about to act or announce something through an individual or a situation. In the case of Jesus, God was going to act through this woman, whom nobody among Jesus' followers would have believed to be an agent of the divine will. Like the psalmists, we might passively inform or perhaps even actively challenge God to do something so that everyone will come to belief, but God will always turn the tables on us. It becomes our calling, our duty (as it was for Jesus) to behold the situations and persons of our daily lives so that God can act through us, so the Kingdom can be announced through our living.

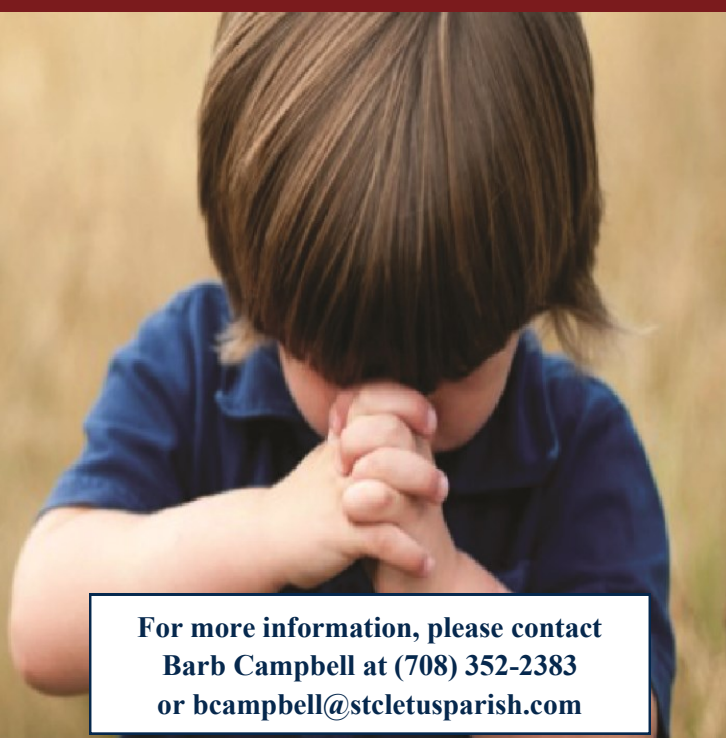

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

4 Million Voices: Giving Hope to Survivors of Domestic Violence

I will never forget the first time I answered a phone call on behalf of the National Domestic Violence Hotline. I was covering the lines so that our staff could enjoy our annual holiday party. The call was from a microbiologist who was in an abusive relationship. She kept saying, “How did I get here? I am a smart woman. How could I be so stupid?” I remember wishing I could erase the blame, pain and shame she was feeling. I also remember thinking, “What can I say to give her hope? What can I say to help her see that she deserves better?”



Our trained advocates—those who dedicate their time to answering the calls, chats and texts we receive from people across the country—respond to hundreds of individuals in need each day. From a concerned parent or sister calling on behalf of a loved one, to a teenager asking whether it’s normal for his partner to monitor his phone constantly, each situation is different from the next.

In June, The Hotline answered its four millionth contact, which is one of four million conversations that our advocates have had with victims and survivors of domestic violence in need over the last 20 years. From my perspective, that number represents a large population of people hurting, and it reinforces that there is still work to be done. On the other hand, that number also represents the courage of so many people seeking help and resources.

Since answering our first call in 1996, The Hotline has worked diligently to become the go-to resource for anyone affected by domestic violence to find help and understanding. With the evolution of technology, we have become more than just a hotline. In 2011, loveisrespect, our project for youth and young adults, launched the nation’s first 24-hour text-for-help service with the support of Mary Kay Inc. In 2013, The Hotline partnered with Verizon to create a live chat service, giving people another safe, private way to connect with an advocate. Through these additional services, we have been able to reach thousands of people, serving 326,422 in 2015 alone.

Domestic violence is a crime that does not discriminate. It does not see gender, race, age, sexual orientation, ethnicity or income level. It occurs in every community and can take a variety of forms, and the wounds are not always visible.

But there is hope.

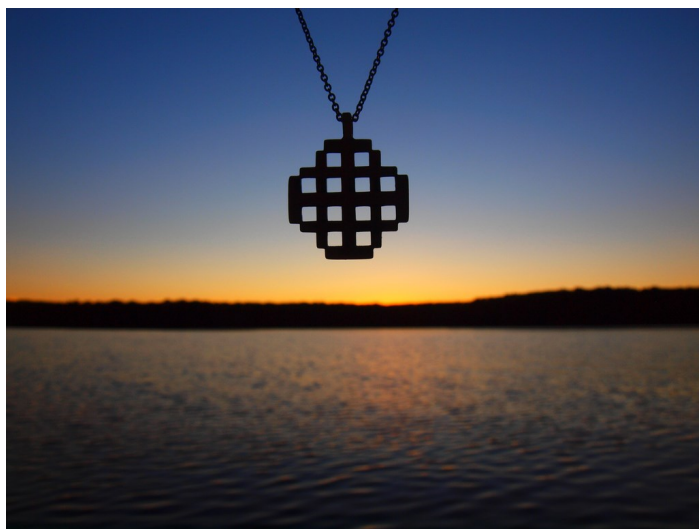

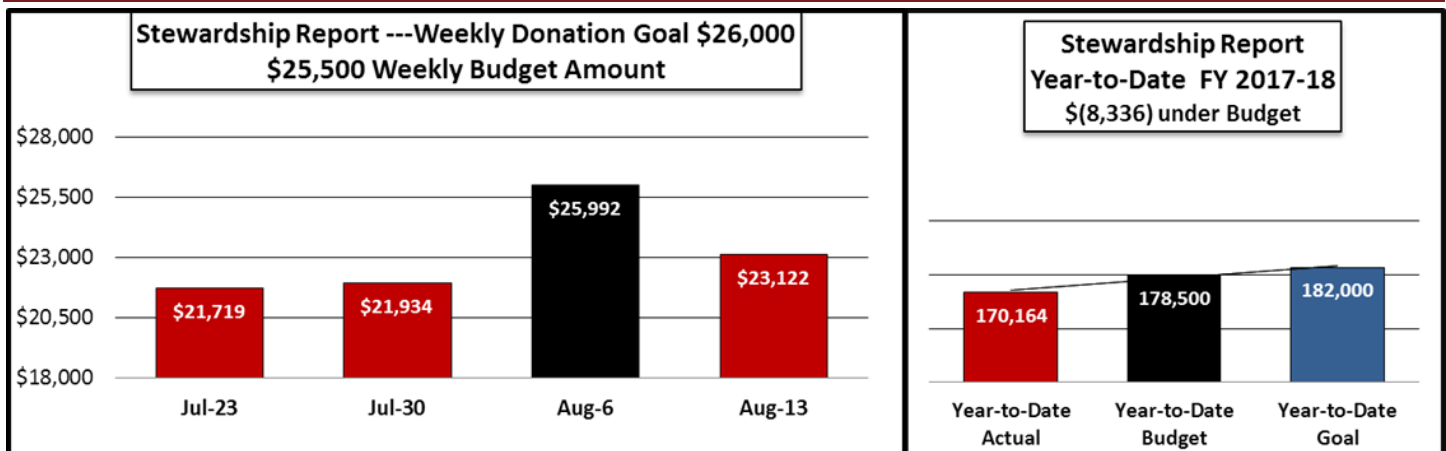
