Notes from Fr. Bob...

SECOND SUNDAY OF EASTER

One of the stranger facts of the Second World War was the survival of 1,500 Jews in the city of Berlin. It took a mixture of cunning, courage, luck and determination on their part. They were also assisted by an unexpected group of Germans, from lovers to employers who hid employees in their factories. As one employer dryly remarked: "When the penalty for hiding one is the same as for hiding seven, you may as well be hung for a sheep as a lamb." On the other hand, betrayal could come from those whom the Jews might have hoped to rely on.

As the Gestapo arrived at an apartment block, one couple, a mother and son, sought refuge with neighbors, having first taken the precaution of locking the main door. As Christmas carols drifted from inside the apartments, one after another neighbor refused. It was as though they had never known them. There was certainly no room in the inn. In the end it was a stranger, a little old lady, who ushered them speedily into her home and hid them under her bed. When the Gestapo arrived, they passed swiftly by such an insignificant and obviously law-abiding person.

At the end of it all, most of the survivors moved away from Berlin. But, as one survivor said, "What the Nazis also achieved was to make me Jewish." What in the beginning for some had been a forgotten or unheeded characteristic became not just the reason for persecution but a focal point of pride and belief.

In its original form, John's gospel concentrates the stories of the resurrection and the gift of the Holy Spirit into one chapter. Then, as it were by popular request, John tags on another final chapter, with further supportive resurrection experiences.

The summary of the earlier chapter offers concise points of reflection on the risen Lord. To appreciate them fully we have to read them against the background of the whole gospel, for their significance has already been traced for us by John in the body of the gospel text. John's gospel, more self-evidently than the synoptic gospels, is imbued throughout with the presence of the risen Lord.

The two themes which dominate today's gospel reflect the usual Johannine pattern of gift and response. Jesus appears as the bringer of peace and the giver of the Holy Spirit. What is asked in response from his followers is faith as the indispensable channel for the new life in the Spirit.



the gospel Jesus has illustrated through signs and teaching his special relationship with the Father, a relationship which enables him to bring people into a new way of living. He is recognized now in his gift of peace and in his life-giving wounds. The disciples are filled with joy at seeing him, and he empowers them with the Holy Spirit, who will enable them to forgive sins and remove the blindfolds we put on ourselves.

The story of Thomas shows how difficult this can be if Jesus does not show himself to us. John uses this story of doubt to end his gospel with a reminder of the great need for faith. It is such faith that will enable the persecuted early Christians to discover true life in the presence of the Lord.

We can find many blocks on the path to accepting the new life of the risen Lord. There is the lack of faith which dulls our perception, preventing us from seeing God's power working through us and in his world. There is sin, depression, sometimes even despair. There is our heavy investment in secular preoccupations and our failure to make the links between them and the divine life which can be celebrated in them.

Faith is not a purely intellectual adherence to the Creed or the truths taught by the Church. It is openness of mind and heart, nourished by prayer, the sacraments and our fellowship with other believers which allow us to discern God's love at work in us and in the world. Just as the risen Lord id recognized through his gift of peace and through his wounds, so we too express our faith through the giving and receiving of peace and through the living out of our own woundedness and vulnerability.

Blessings of the Risen Lord—Alleluia!!!



Last week we shared with you some of the exciting changes coming to the food pantry in May (new space, weekly distribution, online registration, client choice, etc.). We will spend the next few weeks breaking down each of these areas to share more details about where we are heading. What is Client Choice?

What do we mean when we say 'client choice'? "Client Choice is a method of food distribution at food pantries. Clients are encouraged to select the foods they want, similar to shopping at a grocery store."

Benefits for the Client

Client choice acknowledges that no two families or individuals have the same needs or preferences. Here are a few ways client choice can benefit the client:

- Enables selection of desired products
- Encourages client dignity, self-esteem and builds trust and satisfaction
- Reduces food waste

Accommodates needs (Certain type of diet, allergies, cultural preferences/restrictions, or limited cooking equipment)

Benefits for the Pantry

Offering client choice can benefit the pantry in several ways. Listed below are a few of those benefits:

- Reduces waste and monetary losses; clients choose products they will use and want
- Allows pantry staff to control inventory and finances by seeing which products are most popular and which are not.
- Volunteer time is not spent pre-bagging, but instead, engaging and aiding clients, sorting/organizing donations, and prepping the pantry for each week.

The St. Cletus Food Pantry will place limits on the amount each family is allowed to take based on our resources, donations, and supplies. This amount will be similar to the current amount that families receive in their pre-packed bags. They will simply be able to choose the item they prefer. For example: dried beans or canned beans. 1 box of cereal, but their choice of flavor, based on availability.

RESPECT LIFE

April 8, 2018 Authentic Mercy Is Reciprocal

Today, Divine Mercy Sunday, is a fit moment to reflect on St. John Paul's encyclical which teaches that "merciful love is never a unilateral act." *Dives in Misericordia (Rich in Mercy)*, 14. One who gives with such love is, he says, always also a beneficiary. This isn't easy to grasp or accept but it's worth trying to.

Consider first the assurance that what we do to others *out of love* we do to Christ himself. *Cf. Mt.* 25:34-40 Mother Teresa said this many times. This means that the mercy we show to another in love is, as a spiritual reality, shown also to Christ. Like forgivers, the forgiven too bear a likeness to the divine. *Gen* 1:26 It is the dignity this likeness brings to each of us that both enlivens a spirit of forgiveness within us and at the same time attracts and makes us worthy and desirous of forgiveness.

Then consider the fifth beatitude -- "blessed are the merciful, for they shall receive mercy." *Mt.* 5:7 This is a promise that mercy, when extended not merely as a matter of justice but generously as an act of love, will be reciprocated.

Read together, the two passages teach that when we, who have been made for love, forgive another with love, reverencing the reflection of God in the other, we can be confident of the other's forgiveness of us. Even if the one forgiven fails consciously to accept our act of kindness, the presence of the divine within him will. In this way, genuine acts of mercy are unfailingly communal. They profit both. They generate unity.

John Paul sees the Cross as a model for this understanding. When we shape our own actions toward others with the attitude of Christ, the consummate true man, toward us on Calvary, we too, like Christ, are able "to show mercy to others, knowing that Christ accepts it as if it were shown to Himself."

Practicing mercy this way will require a big change for most of us. We'll need to continually purify our intentions which now understand forgiveness only as a one way action from forgiver to forgiven.

An act of merciful love is only really such when we are *deeply convinced at the moment that we perform it* that we are at the same time receiving mercy from the people who are accepting it from us.

John Paul sharpens the point:

[L]ove, and only love – including that love that is called mercy – is capable of *restoring human persons to themselves with the dignity that is proper to them*, uniting the giver and the receiver in a more profound way. (translated into everyday English by Joseph G. Donders)

Let's try merciful love a time or two today and see what happens. Practiced as a lifestyle, mercy of this kind can produce what Blessed Pope Paul VI calls a "civilization of love".

Second Sunday of Easter

SO THAT YOU MAY BELIEVE

It is not often that the author of one of the books of the Bible comes right out and tells us directly why he is writing what he is writing. In this Sunday's Gospel reading, taken from the conclusion of John's Gospel, the author tells us that he has chosen to record these events so "that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that through this belief you may have life in his name" (20:31).

The letter of John echoes this idea by saying that "[e] veryone who believes that Jesus is the Christ is begotten by God" (5:1)—what we might refer to as being "born again." Our reading from the Acts of the Apostles for this Second Sunday of Easter shows us exactly what it looks like when believers are born again through faith.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Sometimes children acquire nicknames in childhood that stalk them through adulthood: "Pinky," "Boo-boo," and the like. This Sunday was once called "Low Sunday," a step down from Easter glory, and an unfortunate nickname since Easter rejoicing goes on for fifty days. Traditionally this is the day when the newly baptized put away their white baptismal robes and returned to their everyday life after a week of intense celebration. Of course, the goal was to take up everyday duties with a very new point of view.

A long title for the day was *Dominica in albis deposito*, or "The Lord's Day for Putting Away the Albs," so no wonder the nickname "Low Sunday" arose. In the old calendar it was also called "Quasimodo Sunday," after the first word of the opening chant, *Quasimodo geniti infantes*, or "As newborn infants," a reference to the newly baptized taken from the Epistle of Peter. Victor Hugo's bell-ringing hero in *The Hunchback of Notre Dame* was abandoned as an infant on the threshold of the cathedral of Paris on Low Sunday, 1467, and named "Quasimodo" for the feast.





EAGLE SCOUT PROJECT




