Notes from Fr. Bob...

13TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME


“The white man kidnaps the earth from his children and does not care. He treats his mother the earth and his brother the sky as things to be bought, plundered, and sold like sheep or bright beads. His appetite will devour the earth and leave behind a desert. The earth is precious to God and to harm the earth is to heap contempt on its Creator. Preserve the land for your children...and love it, as God loves us all.”

Those haunting words of Chief Seattle in the mid-nineteenth century are a chilling prophecy of how we can abuse, and perhaps eventually destroy our world. We pollute the earth, the seas, the air we breathe and risk our own destruction. The poison of human greed, destructiveness and sin spreads very far indeed.

The various environmental groups remind us that such disfigurement and destruction are not inevitable, and our first reading assures us that the world was not made this way: “the world’s created things have health in them...no fatal poison”. Humanity is very much part of God’s creation, its pinnacle, made as we are in God’s image and intended to enjoy health and immortality.

The two incidents in today’s gospel, on the one hand reflect the evil we find in the world, and on the other offer the promise of wholeness and life. They illustrate the reality of sickness and death in our lives, and they also show just how effectively and completely Jesus deals with these evils. The Scriptures tell us that God found creation “very good” – death, illness and evil are not intrinsic to creation, but were introduced through human disobedience. In Scripture, sin is always portrayed as shattering peace and bringing death. The consequences of human sin are far-reaching. Pollution, deforestation or desertification can be caused in a matter of months but their effects can last for generations. So it is with sin: creation has been scarred by sin, and the human race experiences the consequences of that sin as death, illness, decay, hopelessness. The sickness and death we see in today’s gospel, and which we experience in our daily lives, are the consequences of sin which shattered the peace and beauty of God’s original creation. Like ripples which extend through time, so the evil consequences of human disobedience continue to be felt in creation.

The two gospel stories stress our human inability to rectify our plight. The woman has tried every cure available, to no avail. And what’s more, her illness makes her ritually unclean, unable to stay in the company of others. It puts her beyond human compassion. And once



the young girl has died, people don’t want to trouble Jesus further. Death is viewed as being final, the last word. She too is beyond help. Yet in both of these hopeless situations, the power of God at work in Christ is able to put right the damage caused by sin: he restores to wholeness that which is wounded and brings back to life that which has died. In so doing, he restores the peace which was shattered by sin.

However, though this is God’s work, we have our part to play. Both the woman and the child’s father exhibit great faith, and this enables Christ to heal and raise the dead. Each one of us experiences pain, illness, loneliness, death. The consequences of sin are experienced in many varied ways. Each of us – like creation itself – is in some way disfigured, scarred, damaged. The original blessing of creation has been distorted by original sin; our peace has been destroyed. In recounting these stories, Mark stresses that Christ alone can heal and bring us to new life – but we need to have a real, lively faith in him. Many people were crowding round Jesus, but only the woman was healed. She exhibited real courage in her actions: her illness rendered her unclean, and by touching Jesus, she made him ritually unclean too. She feared his anger. And yet her faith in Christ overcame her fear. In the same way, Jesus told Jairus not to be afraid – only to have faith. And so death was defeated, peace and wholeness are restored.

Christ can restore us to wholeness too. Whatever our own particular wound, he can raise us to new life. When we feel dead inside, when we feel our life blood sapping away, when we feel completely unable to help ourselves, then, through faith, he is able to enter and bring new life and hope. Our fears of sickness, of loneliness, of death can be taken away if we have faith in him. Christ is our life and our peace.

Statements by Cardinal Cupich and the USCCB

ARCHDIOCESE OF CHICAGO



Statement of Cardinal Blase J. Cupich, Archbishop of Chicago, on the Administration's Family-Separation Policy

June 20, 2018

There is nothing remotely Christian, American, or morally defensible about a policy that takes children away from their parents and warehouses them in cages. This is being carried out in our name and the shame is on us all.

I welcome Pope Francis' recent comment, "I am on the side of the bishops' conference," affirming his support of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' statement calling this practice "contrary to our Catholic values" and "immoral." This policy must be rescinded immediately.

We are told that family separations are required by the law or court decisions. That is not true. The administration could, if it so desired, end these wanton acts of cruelty, today. It could right the wrongs committed by these cruel policies. Every day it doesn't deepens the stain on America's soul and reputation.

We are told this policy is supported by Scripture. That too is false. There is no biblical justification for building internment camps for children torn away from their parents.

Scripture tells us that God requires no one to follow unjust laws. It also admonishes us against bearing false witness. As St. Paul wrote, the fulfillment of God's law is love.

We have heard the wails of toddlers crying "Mama!" and "Papa!"—children too young to understand what it means to be used as bargaining chips in a political game whose stakes are their very lives. Their cries pierce the conscience. They remind us that every one of them, along with their parents, are made in God's image, and therefore have a dignity no amount of demonizing can obscure.

This is the dignity we Catholics defend when we work to protect the unborn. It is the dignity Jesus Christ called us to uphold by feeding the hungry, clothing the naked, and, yes, welcoming the stranger. It is the dignity that inheres regardless of one's nation of origin. It is not forfeited once one crosses another nation's border, whether to seek refuge from domestic or gang violence or persecution, or to work for a better life for one's family.

Pediatricians and psychologists universally agree that the trauma endured by these children will have lasting effects

on their still-forming minds. It is a form of torture and child abuse, a violation of human rights. It is devoid of decency, bereft of common sense.

Every so often, history presents circumstances that test the soul of a nation. We are living in one of those moments. Whatever this nation of immigrants does for the least of these brothers and sisters of ours will define us for decades to come, in the world's eyes, and in God's.

U.S. Bishops' Migration Chairman Urges Administration to Keep Families Together

June 1, 2018

WASHINGTON—The Department of Homeland Security has recently acknowledged implementation of the policy. . . of separating families arriving at the U.S./Mexico Border. Most Reverend Joe S. Vásquez, Bishop of Austin and Chairman of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' (USCCB) Committee on Migration, issued the following statement in response:

"Forcibly separating children from their mothers and fathers is ineffective to the goals of deterrence and safety and contrary to our Catholic values. Family unity is a cornerstone of our American immigration system and a foundational element of Catholic teaching. 'Children are a gift from the Lord, the fruit of the womb, a reward.' (Psalm 127:3) Children are not instruments of deterrence but a blessing from God.

Rupturing the bond between parent and child causes scientifically-proven trauma that often leads to irreparable emotional scarring. Accordingly, children should always be placed in the least restrictive setting: a safe, family environment, ideally with their own families.

My brother bishops and I understand the need for the security of our borders and country, but separating arriving families at the U.S./Mexico border does not allay security concerns. Children and families will continue to take the enormous risks of migration—including family separation—because the root causes of migration from the Northern Triangle remain: community or state-sanctioned violence, gang recruitment, poverty, and a lack of educational opportunity. Any policies should address these factors first as we seek to repair our broken immigration system."

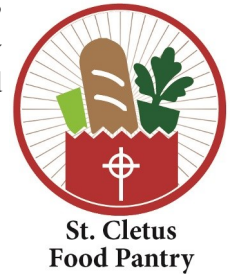

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O LORD, BE MY HELP

Today we encounter readings that draw us into the mystery of suffering and death. In the past few years we have witnessed the devastation of life and property through earthquakes and hurricanes. So many lifted their lament to God, simply asking, “Why?” This is an honest expression of anger toward a God who we believe is the giver of life. When we lose a loved one, we can wonder why the presence of Christ is not enough to make that person rise, even from death, as did the little girl in today’s Gospel passage. Again we raise our voices and ask, “Why?” At moments such as these, let us make the prayer of the psalmist our own: “Hear, O LORD, and have pity on me; O LORD, be my helper.” Let us pray that our mourning will one day be turned into dancing.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

As Independence Day draws near, we think of the men and women of the military who serve with courage and competence, some far from home. How does the Church accompany them? In 1939, Pope Pius XII created an independent jurisdiction of the Catholic Church called the “Military Vicariate.” In 1985 Pope John Paul II created the “Archdiocese for Military Services, USA.” Spanning the globe and serving nearly one and a half million Roman Catholics, more than one thousand priests minister in hospitals, on military bases of all the armed forces, on ships at sea, and on the battlefield. The AMS does not ordain priests, but accepts priests on loan from religious orders and dioceses.

In 1824 a Jesuit priest named Adam Marshall enlisted in the Navy and died at sea in 1825. He was assigned as a “schoolmaster,” but he sought out and ministered to Catholic sailors. Twenty years later, President Polk was worried that the war with Mexico was seen as anti-Catholic, so he recruited two Jesuit priests to serve in the army as chaplains. At the time of the Civil War, only about ten percent of Americans were Catholic. Military policies forced Catholic soldiers to attend Protestant services. The Church protested this rule, and many priests volunteered to become chaplains. Their witness and the courage of the “Nuns of the Battlefield” (several orders of sisters who assisted Civil War victims) helped temper prejudice against Catholics and pave the way for the life and ministry of this vigorous and unique archdiocese.

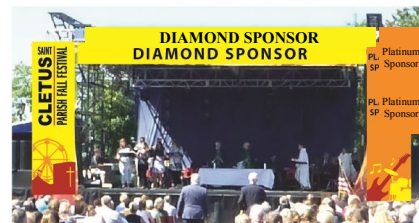

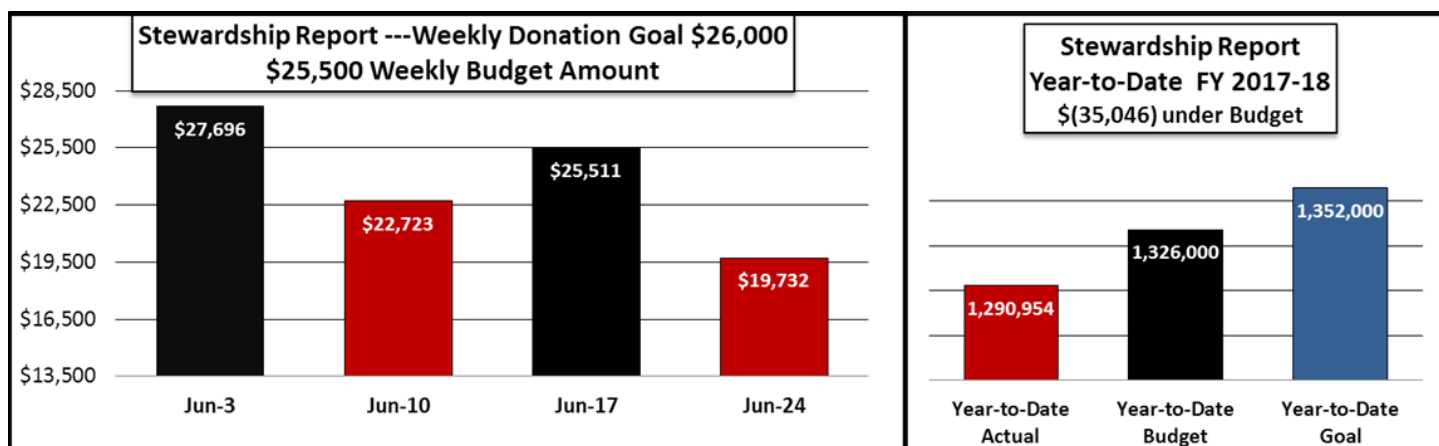
