Notes from Fr. Bob...

SECOND SUNDAY OF ADVENT

"A teacher once asked her class of ten-year olds: "What would you do if one day there was a ring at your front door and when you opened it you found our Lord standing on the doorstep?" One little boy knew what he would do. "I'd run upstairs," he said, "and I'd get the big bible from my Mom's room and I'd hand it over to our Lord and I'd say: 'Jesus, this is your life!'"

The boy was closer to the mark than his teacher may have realized. Of course something like three-quarters of the Bible was written before Jesus was born – it's the part we call the Old Testament, the part which usually provides the first of our Sunday readings. Naturally, the Old Testament can't speak directly of Jesus' life and teachings, and yet without it our understanding of him would be impoverished; without it, his life's story would have no context, it would seem to have been parachuted in from nowhere. We'd be meeting him in two dimensions rather than three, so to say, in black and white rather than in color. St. Paul says that "everything that was written long ago in the scriptures" – he's thinking, of course, of the Old Testament – "was meant to teach us." It has not lost its significance. The point is perfectly illustrated in the readings we've heard today.

In the first, Isaiah, who lived eight centuries before the birth of Christ, looks towards a time when God's people will rejoice in a ruler on whom the Spirit of the Lord will rest, who will rule with justice, who will bring peace, who will fill the country with knowledge of the Lord. The responsorial psalm, also from the Old Testament of course, takes up the same theme – a coming king who will rule "from sea to sea", who "will save the poor...and the needy" and "have pity on the weak" and in whose days "justice shall flourish".

When we turn to the gospel, there is John the Baptist crying out: "Repent, the kingdom of heaven is close at hand." And if the kingdom is close at hand, so too is its king, the king that was promised long ago and the promises of the old are about to be fulfilled in Jesus. And so the call goes out: Make ready for the coming of the King! Without the Old Testament we would never have known how perfectly Jesus fulfills the hopes and yearnings of men and women who lived long before him. It would be like hearing the climax of the story of our salvation without hearing the lead-in to the final chapter first.

In Advent we are invited to share in the longings and yearnings of Old Testament times so that we may celebrate worthily the birth of the King at Christmas. The infant of the stable is the fulfillment of the whole of the Old Testament, the realization of everyone's hopes and dreams, and he is also destined to come again in glory at the end of time. We are to repent, says John the Baptist:

that means that we're to have a change of heart. It may well result in our finding a little extra time for prayer and scripture reading during these days before Christmas, but the main part of the preparation will be the way we lead our daily lives. After insisting that "everything written long ago in the scriptures was meant to teach us," Paul sets before his readers some very practical consequences of listening to the scriptures; you must live together in harmony, he says, striving "to treat each other in the same friendly way as Christ treated you" – apparently squabbles were not unknown among the early Christians! A similar appeal is made to us today: how can we be ready to receive the Prince of Peace if we are not at peace with our brothers and sisters?

But there is something more. Paul speaks of the immense hope that the scriptures bring, for they are centered upon Jesus who is the God of hope in our midst. And so Paul concludes with a prayer – which unfortunately is not included in today's reading – a beautiful prayer which includes in it such wonderful Christian key words as hope, joy, peace, faith, and the power of the Spirit. It's a prayer that we might make our own on this Advent Sunday. 'May the God of hope fill (us) with all joy and peace in (our) faith, so that in the power of the Holy Spirit we may be rich in hope' (Romans 15:13). Amen.

How old do I have to be to volunteer?

Volunteers need to be 11 years old to volunteer at the Food Depository during regular sessions. Ages 16 and older can volunteer self-supervised. Ages 11-15 need to have one adult supervisor per 10 youths.

What should I wear?

Volunteers must wear long pants and close-toed shoes. You will not be permitted to work in the warehouse if you are wearing sandals or shorts/ short skirt. Depending on the project you are assigned to, you may be asked to remove jewelry above the waist (including piercings, but rings are acceptable).

Where is the GCFD located?

4100 W. Ann Lurie Place, Chicago, IL 60632, which is a few blocks from I-55 and Pulaski.

Sunday Notes



THE LONG-AWAITED ONE

As the Sundays of Advent unfold the scriptures shift focus from the final coming of the Lord to his historical birth. Today's scriptures blend the two. Isaiah's disillusionment with the kings of his own day led him to envision an ideal king who would rule with divine approval and be led by divine wisdom. For centuries the Jewish people anticipated the arrival of that Messiah, who would usher in a blessed age when the whole world would finally dwell in justice and peace.

After centuries of such growing expectation, the preaching of John the Baptist about the imminent arrival of the Messiah could not help but provoke intense interest. The Baptist's message about preparation for "the one who is coming" (Matthew 3:11) makes clear that Jesus is, in fact, the long-awaited one who is ushering in the new age foretold by Isaiah and all the prophets.

SAINT JUAN DIEGO (1474-1548)

December 9

How well Mary's own words describe Juan Diego: "God has cast down the mighty from their thrones and lifted up the lowly" (Luke 1:52). Through him, for the diverse peoples of the Americas, indigenous and immigrant, the Mother of God became known as their Mother, too. Cuauhtlatzin, his given name, means "One Who Speaks Like an Eagle," and Juan Diego faithfully delivered the Virgin's request that a church be built at Tepeyac where she had appeared to him. To the skeptical bishop's request for a sign, Our Lady showed Juan Diego roses blooming through stony ground, despite winter's cold. When he unfolded his tilma to present them to the bishop, imprinted there was Mary's image! Her blue sash and the flower over her womb were traditional Aztec symbols of pregnancy and new life. But her features were those of a mestiza, indicating mixed Aztec-European heritage. Thus to peoples too easily prone to a "clash of cultures," Our Lady of Guadalupe remains the enduring icon of unity-in-diversity, the fruit of our one baptism into Jesus, her Son.

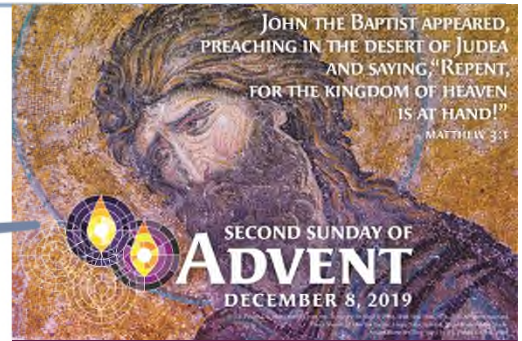

WELCOME TO THE GOSPEL OF MATTHEW

As we begin this new liturgical year, we will be hearing the Gospel of Matthew.

Each of the gospels is unique and in some of its content. Each gospel is shaped by the needs, the problems, and the trials and challenges of the community for which the gospel was written. Matthew's gospel was written for the Jewish followers of Jesus who had continued to attend the synagogue regularly. Matthew presents Jesus as the new Moses by having him do "Moses-like" things: he gives the people new rules of behavior-the Beatitudes; he has miraculous powers (healing, curing, forgiving); brought hope to many people. The main theme of his gospel is that "the kingdom of God is like..." a reign of peace and love, of harmony and serenity, of forgiveness and mercy.

THE JESSE TREE

"A SHOOT SHALL COME OUT FROM THE STUMP OF JESSE, AND A BRANCH SHALL GROW OUT OF HIS ROOTS. " ISAIAH 11:1

This passage is the basis for the Jesse Tree, which has become a symbol of Christ's heritage, or roots, and God's covenant with the Jewish people. The stump symbolizes the family of the Jews; the shoot, Mary; and the branch, Jesus.

In the Old Testament, Jesse, the son of Obed, was a poor farmer in Bethlehem. He had 8 sons, the youngest of whom was David. As a boy, David was anointed by Samuel to succeed Saul as king of the Israelites. Christ was to be born of the house of David in Bethlehem.

Today the Jesse Tree is used to trace God's promise of the Savior and Christ's ancestry.

There are some variations of the symbols but primarily the same intent.

Our Jesse Tree is near the ambo. Each day, simple paper ornaments will be added with a symbol on one side and Scripture passage on the other side. Please come up and take a look.

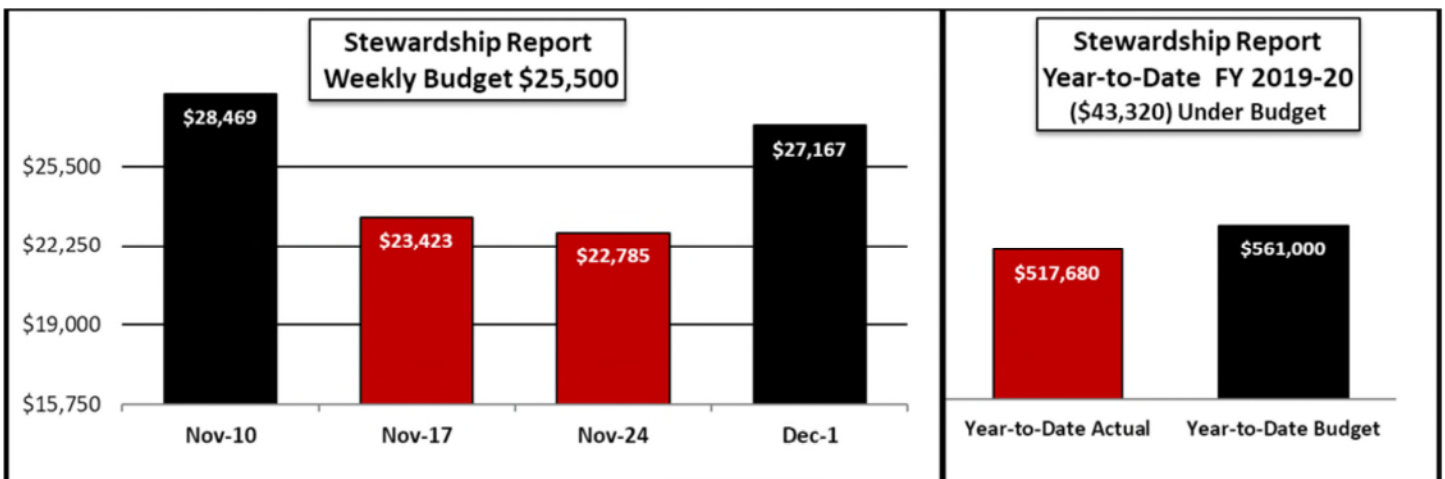
