

Notes from Fr. Bob...

SECOND SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

The Jews have always had mixed feelings about being God's Chosen People. The psalms reveal the depth and variety of exchange that took place between them and God. Every human emotion is displayed. Is God on our side? Why doesn't he show himself more? Why doesn't he get off our backs? What a good God he is! This flavor of intimacy and concern continues in modern Jewish writing, often in humor and wit. Two things remain clear in the Jewish vision down through the ages. One is that we cannot get away from God. The other is that God demands commitment. This is what being chosen by God means. Our modern western ideas of being chosen are wishy-washy by comparison. Advertising suggests it is a matter of luck or fate. "It could be you", proclaims the advertisements for the Power Ball and Lotteries. Many companies send out unsolicited but ornate envelopes informing us that we have been specially chosen to receive a prize. Keep in mind, there is usually some condition attached that lurks in the small print. Being chosen is linked to the idea of reward rather than responsibility. Unfortunately this expectation can affect the most important choices in our lives. Partners may choose to marry for what they expect to receive rather than for what they might give. Or, the commitment required to live with another person day after day, in sickness and health, proves too much of a demand, and they run away.

God's choosing presents a much clearer picture. A special relationship is established with the chosen one, and it is that relationship which empowers the chosen to carry out the assignment that goes with the act of election. In Isaiah the nature of the relationship is defined first of all as that of a servant, but it is a special sort of servant. It is the servant who is honored in the eyes of his Lord and who has God himself as his strength. "Through the servant God is glorified" is a theme explored at length in John's gospel during the farewell discourse of Jesus to his disciples at the Last Supper. Thus energized by God, the servant will not only reconcile the people of Israel but will be a light for all nations so that salvation may be offered to all. Similarly, Paul, in the first line of his greeting to the church in Corinth, refers to the fact that he has been appointed by God to be an apostle. He too has been chosen, and his assignment is that of an apostle, to proclaim the good news of Jesus Christ. Again, John's account of the beginning of Jesus' public life puts the accent on his special election through the descent of the Spirit. Just as the Spirit hovered over the waters in the first creation, so he now comes down upon Jesus, in instrument of God's new creation. He will take away the sins of the world and in his turn will baptize with the Spirit, his assignment as the chosen one of God.



descends on us and makes us the sharers in God's own life. Our responsibility as chosen ones is to take up the assignments we have just heard of in the life of Jesus, in the life of Paul and in the life of the servant disciple. We are called to take away the sins of the world, to be apostles and to be the light of the nations, bringing salvation to the ends of the earth: all daunting tasks. We may be forgiven for trying to flee them or off-load them on to those we consider to be especially trained for the purpose, the clergy and religious. But through our baptism, we are each called to make unique contributions to these assignments. It helps if we can see how in turn they have been communicated to us. As we have received, so shall we give. How have we been enlightened? What brings clear vision and understanding into our lives? What has our experience of forgiveness been? Have we really forgiven others or allowed ourselves to be truly forgiven? Finally, how have we received the good news? What words or images moved or still move us? It is through our own experience of God that God will communicate his presence to others.



But we know from John the Baptist that for Israel to accomplish God's will, it must also recognize that Jesus is the Son of God. During these weeks we also get to know Jesus. SAINT AGNES (DIED 304)

January 21

Writing about Saint Agnes in the year 377, Saint Ambrose, Bishop of Milan, declared: "This is a virgin's birthday into heaven: let us imitate her chastity! And a martyr's heavenly birthday: let us offer ourselves in sacrifice!" Chastity: mastery of oneself in order to give of oneself whether in the priestly, religious, married, or single state. Sacrifice: "to make holy," to set someone or something apart for service. Ambrose knew these virtues indispensable for discipleship, but challenging to practice in his world—or our own. Barely a teenager, Agnes faced gruesome tortures bravely and, when ordered to worship pagan gods, boldly made the Sign of the Cross instead. Thus, her youthful courage strengthened adult believers who wavered under persecution or grew indifferent when persecutions passed. To bestow on Agnes its highest honor and keep her witness fresh in believers' hearts, the Church inscribed her name at the heart of the Eucharistic liturgy, in the Roman Canon (Eucharistic Prayer I), until Vatican II the Roman Church's only Eucharistic Prayer.

Deacon Stuart's Homily January 11-12

BAPTISM OF THE LORD HOMILY CYCLE A JAN. 11-12, 2020

I love telling jokes and when I hear a good one I tell it often - and with the repeated telling it gets embellished, and in my opinion - better. However, Marlene who likely has heard the joke several times before usually rolls her eyes and says "Just get to the punch line will you?" The reason I mention this is that in Advent we started Cycle A of the church's three year Sunday liturgy and we're hearing Matthew's Gospel. Now both Matthew and Luke had the great advantage of having Mark's available to them as they wrote theirs. So we will hear or read Matthew referencing Prophecies in the Hebrew Scriptures which Jesus along - with his Mother Mary and Joseph fulfil. He adds to events written in Mark, embellishing and providing evidence and connections to those Hebrew Scriptures which we now refer to as the Old Testament.

For example: Last week for Epiphany he quotes "And you, Bethlehem... from you shall come a ruler and shepherd to my people Israel." Or the Prior week, Feast of the Holy Family, "Out of Egypt I called my son - He shall be called a Nazarene." For this reason, the Gospel of Matthew is often called "The Gospel of the Church!" It is the only Gospel that uses the word "Church" in its narrative, three times actually. Matthew brings together the Old and the New to make the story of Christ's life so compelling that we may believe and never doubt that Jesus Christ is the Son of God. So you see a worthy embellishment of a story (or a joke) is a good thing!!

Now getting back to the Gospel according to Matthew today! Matthew tells us that at Christ's Baptism - by John, the Heavens opened, the Holy Spirit descended like a dove and a voice came from the Heavens proclaiming: "THIS IS MY BELOVED SON, WITH WHOM I AM WELL PLEASED." But John was "Baptizing for repentance and the forgiveness of sins." This seems very odd because Jesus was sinless! Indeed we heard about the exchange between John and Jesus - John telling Jesus he should be baptizing him. But you see God's purpose was to reveal Christ's identity to John and the crowds - in a way that would leave no doubt in their minds who Jesus was, is and ever will be. THE SON OF GOD! Matthew writes that Jesus response was "Allow it now, for thus it is fitting for US to fulfill all righteousness" - meaning what had indeed been prophesied in the Hebrew scriptures was fulfilled with Christ's baptism.

Here again we have Matthew connecting Jewish Scriptural prophecy with the events in the life of Jesus. In this moment as Jesus was Baptized by John, God sanctifies the very act of Baptism - With Water and The Holy Spirit. The early definition of Baptism, when translated from the Latin is; "The Gateway to Spiritual Life." It is a dying of a former way of life, now living for

God and in the ways His Son taught us.

In the Second reading today, from Acts, we heard that Peter preached how after God had anointed Jesus at his Baptism - he went about doing good and healing all those oppressed by the devil - **for God was with him!!**

And as a side note - while not included in today's reading from Acts - God has revealed to Peter - thru Jesus - that baptism is for all and being the first equal opportunist he Baptizes Cornelius - a Roman Centurion - the first Gentile to be baptized!!

So Christ's Baptism was the start of his very public profile and earthly ministry! And so as we end the Christmas season this weekend and begin ordinary time on Monday we are meant to absorb the importance of Baptism - The gateway to Spiritual Life and the subsequent Sacraments.

Since I was ordained some 7 ½ years ago I've been privileged to baptize over 300 infants here at St Cletus. I

tell the parents that these precious little ones are being baptized into the Catholic faith which brings with it an awesome responsibility for them.

Firstly, I explain its called faith because it means believing what we cannot see, touch, prove, experience and we are expected by virtue of our own Baptism to live by the teachings of Christ and His Church and raise these little ones accordingly.

Secondly, Baptism is a great start to their children's lives BUT it's only the start, because it will then be up to the parents and family to affirm this faith by their example.

I don't actually say "That means regular attendance at Mass because I hope they can make that connection" but such attendance is critical for the child's well being!!

Why Critical? Well - Let me summarize an article in the Wall Street Journal about a month ago entitled "DON'T BELIEVE IN GOD? LIE TO YOUR CHILDREN."

It was written by Erica Komisar, a therapist dealing with children and young adults suffering from depression and anxiety. She explained one of the most important explanations for the incidence of mental health issues among this age group today - and perhaps the most neglected - is the declining interest in religion, which has already proved disastrous for millions of vulnerable young people. She quoted a 2018 study by Harvard University which looked at how being raised in a family with religious or spiritual beliefs affects children's mental health. The result, children or teens who reported

attending a religious service once a week scored higher on psychological well being tests and had lower risks for mental illness. Additionally they had higher rates of volunteering, a sense of mission, forgiveness and lower probabilities of drug use and early sexual initiation.

Sadly as we know attendance at formal religious services continues to decline and indeed a recent American Family survey found almost 50% of adults under age 30 don't identify with any religion!

Such nihilism is the fodder for anxiety and depression.

And so to the title of the article!

Erica notes that when asked by parents how they should talk to their children about death when they don't believe in God - She tells them - Lie!

Yes break the 9th Commandment! Why?

Because, she notes, a belief in Heaven and life after death helps them grapple with tremendous and incomprehensible loss - and in an age of broken families, distracted parents, school violence, the latest TV news - such imagination helps them cope.

I encourage you to get this message out to your families and friends with young children whose attendance at a religious service has lapsed - and if their children have been baptized it's actually what they signed up for after all. And they don't need to take my word for it - tell them to read the science.

In conclusion:

- 1) Children and young people benefit greatly, both emotionally and spiritually from being a part of a family that regularly attends a religious service.
- 2) Just as Baptism began Christ's ministerial life and journey on earth, so it begins our spiritual life and journey towards the sacraments.
- 3) Embellishing a story (or joke) can be a very good thing as Matthew clearly demonstrates with his Gospel writings.






