

Notes from Fr. Bob...

THIRTY-SECOND SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Some years ago a friend of mine went to buy a new bible. He desired a small pocket translation of the New Testament that could easily be carried from place to place. He chose a version of the Good News Bible. He took one from low down in the pile of books so that it would not have been fingered and looked at by other prospective buyers. Proud of this buy, he went home and opened it. Shock and surprise! The text had been bound into the bible upside-down. The initial reaction was one of anger. Questions were asked in his mind: why had the shop sold such a bible? Why had he not noticed it? The first idea was to ask for his money back. Then he laughed. The upside-down bible was an important reminder that the values of the gospel are not those of the world. The bible would come to have an important value in reminding him that the gospel parables often present a world being turned upside down!

Today's gospel contrasts two groups of people. Jesus warns his apostles about the attitudes of the Pharisees. This group of laymen was zealous in keeping the Law and following the command of the scribes. They believed that by faithful living of the law, they would bring about the kingdom of God. While living the law was a way to holiness, unfortunately the Pharisees began to see themselves as better Jews than others. Superiority about keeping the law led to a perfectionism which inflated their opinion of themselves and led them to impose burdens on people, especially the poor. Also they despised those who could not keep the law. The parable of the Pharisee and publican highlights their self-regard and high opinion of themselves. It is the publican praying, 'Lord, be merciful to me a sinner', who returns home at peace with God.

In contrast to the attitudes of the Pharisees, Jesus praises the widow whose offering is small but represents all she has. In Jewish society widows were understood as being in God's special care since they had nobody to defend their rights in a patriarchal society. Poor in spirit, they trusted deeply in God and were promised that they would inherit the kingdom of heaven. Utter dependence upon God, not self-righteousness, is rewarded. The world of worldly success and reward is turned upside-down.

The blessing of the widow who is generous to Elijah is the theme of the first reading. The thirsty traveler asks the poor widow for a little food and water. From her heart she wants to help him but has no spare food. Trusting in God's promise she shares her meal and is blessed with abundance. Her world is turned upside-down. There is a tendency in most people to like


things the way they are and consequently change is very difficult. It is difficult to accept that at

times God turns the way we see the world upside-down. It is startling to recognize that it is generosity of the poor that can reveal God's plan in a special way. Conversion and change is a slow process; it requires growing in trust in God and beginning to see the world in another way. It is a time of vulnerability. Conversion leads to the capacity to be able to let go of self-reliance and possessions and to recognize dependence on God. For people who have grown up hearing phrases of the form; 'save for a rainy day', 'be prudent and have insurance', 'get a good bargain', it is difficult to be reliant on God and to find this gospel freedom. For those struggling with the radical gospel of today, a starting point might be to desire this change more deeply, and then to enjoy the giftedness of life. Celebration of the gift encourages spontaneity. From this rich source of freedom generosity may follow.



GIVING TREE

Our annual Advent Giving Tree Project--a St. Cletus tradition - begins this weekend! Our trees are filled with names of individuals in need from our sharing parish, St. Agatha's, and from our community. We also ask you to remember your special person(s) in your family's prayers throughout this holy season. Last year our parish made Christmas brighter for over 1800 people!

SOME BIG CHANGES FOR THIS YEAR!

This year, instead of having red food basket tags, you'll see **WHITE ENVELOPES** on some of the Christmas trees. Rather than giving out food baskets at Giving Tree, we will be offering clients a gift card, based on the size of their household, to purchase food. We are making this change for a few reasons:

- *Client Choice*: Many of us have dietary or allergy restrictions and we all have food preferences! We recently switched our food pantry from pre-packed bags to client choice. This model honors and respects the dignity and unique needs of each household and we want to continue this model with our Christmas food program.
- *Transparency and Fairness*: Every year we received such generous donations for food baskets! However, the food baskets meant that each household got very different baskets. This change will create a more equitable food program.
- December Food Pantry: In previous years we closed the food pantry in December. However, now we will continue to have our doors open every Thursday night in December (except 12/27) so clients will still be able to receive food that month.

How it works: On the trees you will find white envelopes. Each envelope lists a dollar amount. We respectfully request that you purchase cards for the *exact amount* listed on the card and then put the card(s) directly in the envelope. We also ask that you *only purchase cards from Jewel and Walmart*. These have been the preferred stores of our clients and they are also easily accessible via public transportation. Envelopes will need to be turned in by Sunday, December 9th at 12:30pm. They can be placed in the collection basket any week, dropped at the Parish Center or with the Gifts December 8-9.

Shop with Scrip Opportunity: For your convenience this weekend and November 17-18 we will have the St. Cletus School Shop with Scrip available in the

Narthex so you can purchase the gift cards today. This is a gift card purchasing program via the school that allows the school to get a percentage of the proceeds as a fundraiser. *It does not cost you anything extra to participate*. They accept cash/check.

GREEN TAGS (food pantry items): The food pantry will continue to be open during the month of December and we still have many donations that we will need! The new green tags list some of our most needed items at this time. If you enjoy purchasing food for those in need and miss the food basket program, this might be a great option for you. Items can be returned at your convenience to the bins in the Church Narthex.

PURPLE TAGS (gifts): Gifts are to be returned before/ after Masses the weekend of **December 8-9**. Gifts will be returned to Morrissey Hall using the convenient drop off lane on Stone Ave.! *There is no change to the gift program.*

We recognize that change can be difficult, especially around family holiday traditions. We are looking forward to these program updates to best meet the needs of our clients. Kendall Grant, Director of Social Concerns, will be in the Narthex this weekend and next and would be happy to help answer any questions you may have. We so appreciate your dedication to this important ministry in our parish and community. Thank you!

At this special meal, they learned the traditions associated with a Passover Seder, and even learned some traditional Hebrew songs that are sung during this ritual! THE CALL TO DISCIPLESHIP

The core vocation in the Gospel of Mark is the vocation, or call, to discipleship. Today's Gospel passage provides us with one last example of what the vocation to discipleship means, and one example of what it doesn't mean. A destitute widow shows us that discipleship means following Jesus' way of service, even if it requires giving one's livelihood (or life). The scribes show us by their bad example that discipleship should entail a vocation to extend God's care to those who are most in need.

In our reading from the book of Kings another widow and her son are close to death. They too give what little they have, but they are rewarded by Elijah with food enough for a year. And the reading from the Letter to the Hebrews reminds us that Jesus sacrificed his life "to bring salvation to those who eagerly await him" (Hebrews 9:28). Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co., Inc.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Veterans Day began with the signing of a symbolic treaty between the Allies and Germany ending World War I (then called the "Great War") on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month. The auspicious date was actually a well-established religious holiday, the feast of Saint Martin of Tours, a beloved soldier saint of the army of Rome. After World War II, Armistice Day was changed to Veterans Day in the United States and Remembrance Day in Britain, but of course the feast of Saint Martin endures.

Martin was named after Mars, the god of war, and against the advice of his parents he went on his own to church. He became a catechumen at the age of ten. By fifteen he was enlisted in the cavalry in France. Coming across a poor man, Martin had an impulse to divide his bright red soldier's cape and clothe him. He later had the insight that he had served Christ, and the other half of his cape became a lifelong sign to him of his duty to serve the poor. Housed in a tiny church *capella* or "chapel," the cape became a great object of pilgrimage on the way to Compostella, and a favored place for the prayers of soldiers. Martin was not so eager to serve as bishop as he had been as a soldier, and legend says that he hid in a barn filled with geese to avoid episcopal election. To this day, the customary meal for November 11 is goose! Traditionally, this is the last feast day before winter closes in, and begins a period of fasting once known as "Saint Martin's Lent" or "Martinmas," that later developed into the season of Advent. -Rev. MISSION LADIES





AARP TAX-AIDE NEEDS VOLUNTEERS FOR THE 2019 TAX FILING SEASON



The AARP Tax-Aide Program is now seeking volunteers for the upcoming 2019 tax filing season. It's not necessary for you to be an AARP member or to have a tax or an accounting background to volunteer. However, some knowledge of your own personal tax matters is very helpful. All returns are prepared on computers; thus, volunteers should be somewhat computer literate. Training classes will be held in January, 2019. Minimum time commitment during the filing season is 4 to 5 hours one day per week from early February to mid-April. This income tax preparation and assistance service is offered to low and middle income individuals with special attention to those 60 years and older. Won't you help? 




