


29TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

On July 6th, 1535, Thomas More, one of the most illustrious Englishmen of his day, stood at the foot of the scaffold on Tower Hill. He had been condemned to death for refusing to take the Oath of Supremacy, which would have been to acknowledge Henry VIII as "only supreme head of the Church of England". More was a scholar, the author of many learned books; a devoted public servant, chosen by Henry himself to be his Chancellor; a much-loved family man, deeply attached to wife and children and anxious that his daughters should be educated far beyond the level usually available to women in those days; he was, as C.S. Lewis wrote of him, "a man before whom the best of us must stand uncovered".

He had told the judges who condemned him that he prayed that he and they would "all meet merrily in heaven"; and even as he was mounting the rickety ladder to the scaffold, he retained his customary wit. "I pray, Lord Lieutenant," he jested, "see me safe up, and for my coming down let me shift for myself." Then, after a few words of encouragement to the assembled crowd, he declared that he was about to die as "the king's good servant but God's first".

"The king's good servant but God's first": those words might serve as a commentary on what our Lord says in today's gospel. Let's recall the situation. Jesus has come up to Jerusalem for the last time; he has already been involved in controversy with the religious leaders. Finally the Pharisees decide to try and entrap him. They begin with honeyed words, intended no doubt to put him off his guard — in fact the Pharisees don't come themselves but send some intermediaries — so it's these intermediaries who use the honeyed words: "Master, we know that you are an honest man and that you are not afraid of anyone."

But after the compliments comes the barbed question, aimed to put Jesus in a no-win situation. "Tell us," They enquire, "is it permissible to pay taxes to Caesar or not?" The tax involved, a kind of poll tax, was detested by the Jews on two counts: first because it was a painful reminder that they were a subject people, and second because the coinage in which it was paid bore the head of the Roman emperor and an inscription which proclaimed him to be divine. And so if Jesus were to say that the tax should be paid, he would at once lose all credibility with the people; on the other hand, if he were to say it should not, he could then be accused of fomenting disobedience,



You can imagine the tension in the crowd as Jesus calmly holds up one of the well-known silver coins for paying the tax and asks, "Whose head is this? Whose name?" Well, everyone knows the answer to those questions: the head and name are of course "Caesar's" (the Roman emperor's). "Very well, then," says Jesus, "give back to Caesar what belongs to Caesar – and to God what belongs to God." By having such coinage in their possession, they were at least implicitly acknowledging Caesar's right to tax them.

However, Jesus' answer is more than an ingenious way of slipping out of a trap. By adding that what belongs to God ought to go back to God, he's making a further point: that our overriding commitment has to be to God himself. Of course we must accept lawful civil authority; indeed as Christians we ought to be the best citizens: being good, responsible citizen, working for the common good of the community, these are our Christian duty; in that sense, already part of our giving to God what belongs to him. At the same time we do not look to the State as our moral guide: the law may countenance abortion, for example, or the sale of arms to oppressive regimes; but the fact that such activities are legal does not make them morally right. And if ever there were a genuine clash between our duties to State and our duties to God, there is no doubt where our Christian duty lies. It is God's law not the State's that has the last word.

Today, let us remember in our prayers all who face this stark choice that they may courageously follow conscience, no matter what price they have to pay.

Students also enjoyed the museum exhibits about the Great Lakes fur trade of the 1700s and seeing a replica Native American longhouse. St. Cletus classes offer a wide variety of field trips throughout all grades levels to enhance the curriculum taught in the classroom.

Scenes from the Science Lab

During a recent trip to the Science Lab our second-grade students conducted experiments to test which soil substrate will grow the best plants. Putting the Scientific Method into action students choose three substrates, and then planted pea seeds. Each team discussed and then ranked based on which of the containers they believed would grow the fastest group and which would grow the slowest. After a few weeks the students observed their experiment and some were very surprised to learn that the clay and sand substrates produced faster growing plants than the potting soil.

Sunday Notes

POWER STRUGGLE

Power struggles occur on every level of society, from the world stage to relationships at work, to our own homes. We struggle for position in the hierarchy of power: Who has power over whom? How do they wield it? What is the source of that power? What is the healthy response?

In this Sunday's Gospel, reading the Pharisees engage Jesus in a power struggle over whether Jews should show tribute to Caesar by paying taxes. Jesus' response puts this and every struggle for power into perspective. In harmony with the words of Isaiah and Paul, Jesus teaches us that God is the ultimate source of all power—the power of earthly rulers, the Pharisees, Jesus, the Church, and the power within ourselves.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

What makes the Eucharistic Prayers for Masses with Children different from the others? First, there is the intended assembly, which is described as comprised of mostly children of school age. There are three Eucharistic Prayers for Masses with Children available to us now in the missal. The first one has a very simple form, easily grasped by even a young child. The second has a great deal of participation by the assembly—repeated sung acclamations. The third has a number of variations that can be tricky for a priest to handle if he hasn't prepared carefully.

All of this work does point to a true treasure of our tradition: children are part of the Sunday assembly, precisely because they are baptized members of Christ's body. By contrast, the churches of the Reformation tend to look upon children as members in training, and see worship as an adult activity. Sunday school happens downstairs while the adults celebrate Holy Communion upstairs. In a phrase, that's not Catholic. Children belong to Christ and to the assembly. So, the desire to care for the children in the assembly, to draw them into the prayer, and to adapt our rituals and texts to their needs is deeply Catholic, a true pastoral effort to help draw everyone into the praise of God.



MISSIO.ORG FACT SHEET

The Catholic Church, through the Pontifical Mission Societies, supports a global network of people working on the frontline of service for the world's most vulnerable communities. Every year, though, the need outstrips our ability to help. Through MISSIO, projects that might otherwise remain un- or underfunded, can now be showcased via a digital platform, thereby expanding the network of potential supporters beyond the doors of a church, school or parish.

- Pope Francis launched the first version of the Pontifical Mission Societies' MISSIO as a mobile app in 2013, which offered news from the Mission Church.
- In 2015, during the Pope's visit to the United States, the Pontifical Mission Societies updated this app to allow users to connect directly with mission project leaders overseas.
- A web version of MISSIO MISSIO.org was launched on World Mission Sunday 2016.
- MISSIO.org is a crowdfunding platform.
 Crowdfunding is the practice of funding a project or venture by raising small amounts of money from a large number of people, via the Internet/social media.
- All MISSIO projects are affiliated with the local Church or with a local Religious institution (seminary, convent, school) in the Missions.

- Projects are vetted by the Pontifical Mission Societies in the United States and reviewed by the Ordinaries of those (arch)dioceses in which the projects are located.
- 100% of the funds donated to MISSIO go directly to projects/project leaders.
- Funding is transferred to project leaders via the Apostolic Nuncio of the country in which the project is located.
- MISSIO is a transparent, trusted and effective means of supporting mission projects overseas.
- Parish and school leaders in the United States can create or select projects to support in the Missions for annual sacrificial giving (such as Lent and Advent), secure in the knowledge that that funds will be directed to the Pope's own missions. Best of all, MISSIO builds community and fosters missionary discipleship by encouraging ongoing communication with mission project leaders.
- MISSIO is an ideal platform for parishes and (arch) dioceses engaged in twinning relationships. Specific projects can be posted on the platform to expand the potential network of supporters.



THE LIVING ROSARY

Tuesday, October 24th, the St. Cletus school 7th graders will honor the Blessed Mother by participating in a "living" rosary in which they become the beads of prayer that encircle the church.

The Rosary, which is a much loved devotion in the Church dates back to the early Middle Ages, when a practice of monastic prayer based on the 150 Psalms developed, using beads as counters corresponding to the 150 Psalms.

The Mysteries themselves (5 Joyful decades, 5 Sorrowful, & 5 Glorious = 150 beads) did not become linked with saying the repetitious Hail Marys, while meditating on the events in the lives of Jesus and Mary, until about the 15th -16th centuries. In 2002, Pope John Paul II added the Luminous (Light) Mysteries.

In 1951, Bishop Fulton J. Sheen (national director of the Society for the Propagation of the Faith – the Missions) inaugurated a World Mission Rosary. The focus was and is to pray and support our brothers and sisters throughout the world. Each decade of the World Mission Rosary calls to mind an area where the Church continues her evangelizing mission of spreading the Good News:

Green for the forests and grasslands of Africa; Blue for

the ocean surrounding Australia and the islands of the Pacific; White symbolizing Europe, the seat of the Holy Father, shepherd of the world; Red, calling to mind the fire of faith that brought missionaries to the Americas; and Yellow, the morning light of the East, Asia.

The 7th graders will be forming a rosary around the church wearing t-shirts representing these colors of the continents. They will each recite one of the prayers of the rosary after a short Scriptural passage is read. They will move around the church completing a rosary circle.

You are invited to join us in the praying of the rosary – October 24th at 2:00 pm in church.




