

Notes from Fr. Bob...


2ND SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

At 12:30 pm on November 22nd, 1963 shots rang out in Dallas, Texas, and the world was stunned to learn of the assassination of John F. Kennedy, the thirtyfifth President of the United States. Whatever historians subsequently unearthed about the man's alleged shortcomings; there was a palpable sense of tragedy, of a promising bright future being brought abruptly and cruelly to an end. People who were alive at the time will almost invariably be able to tell you where they were, what they were doing and whom they were with, when they learned the shocking news of Kennedy's death. (I was attending my Grandmother Clark's funeral at the Methodist Church on the east-side of Joliet, IL along with my family). It was a decisive moment of history, an event which literally changed the course of world events. Things would never be the same again.

There is the same sense of a momentous event in today's Gospel. We are told the exact time when those two disciples of John the Baptist first met Jesus: the tenth hour, about 4 o'clock in the afternoon. This may be an unimportant, trivial fact perhaps, but an indication of just how important, how life-changing that first encounter was for Andrew and the other disciple, who was possibly St. John, the evangelist himself. Their lives changed so much that they can tell us exactly when and where it happened.

Tantalizingly, the evangelist doesn't tell us the content of that encounter. He doesn't tell us what Jesus said to him and Andrew, nor what questions they asked. He doesn't describe Jesus or where he was living. John simply says that they accepted his invitation to come and see, and they stayed with him for the rest of the day. Perhaps the conversation was too personal to be recorded, or perhaps a written account would not be able to convey its effect or the power of the presence of Jesus. Certainly the Lord had a profound effect: the two disciples left John the Baptist to become followers of Jesus, and Andrew wasted no time in telling his brother Peter: "We have found the Messiah."

Perhaps, too, the gospel writer realizes that an encounter with the Lord must be a unique event, something which each potential follower has to experience personally. It's not something which can happen second-hand; it cannot be experienced vicariously. The Lord issues an invitation, but it is up to us to respond. We have to be in a state of readiness, open to hear the Lord's call. Samuel was already living in the Lord's sanctuary – in the right place to hear the call. And the two disciples were already followers of John the Baptist – predisposed to the coming



As Christians, we believe that we have been called, and that we are following the Lord, however falteringly or hesitantly. But we must have a real personal meeting with the Lord, and not simply go by what others have told us about him. Whether or not we can pinpoint an exact moment when we first encountered him, we need to allow our relationship with Christ to change our lives irrevocably. By spending time in his presence, we learn to see as he sees, judge as he judges, act and speak as he does.

The call to follow, the invitation to spend time with the Lord, is never a once and for all experience. It is a daily happening. As we grow in discipleship, as we learn to recognize his voice and walk in his ways, we learn that he speaks in many ways: not just through the authentic teaching of the Pope and Bishops who, like Eli and John the Baptist, are able to point us in the right direction. Christ is also able to speak to us through everyday events and people. Peter, remember, was brought to the Lord by his brother Andrew.

As Samuel shows us, recognizing the Lord's voice and presence can be a gradual affair, just as discipleship is a life-long commitment, not a one-day only decision. Perhaps today the Lord is calling to us most persistently in the faces of those in need: in the faces of the poor, the homeless, the victims of war, violence or oppression, the sick and the dying, the lonely and the unloved. Whenever we can see and serve the Lord in these people, we know that we really have become his disciples.


Monthly Domestic Violence **Support Group**



The Second Sunday in Ordinary Time

THE LAMB OF GOD

"Behold the Lamb of God!" We hear this phrase every Sunday at Mass, but there's a good chance that many Roman Catholics do not know who in the Bible originally spoke it. The phrase appears only in the Gospel of John, on the lips of John the Baptist, who utters it twice.

In today's Gospel reading, John proclaims Jesus as the Lamb of God, and two of John's own disciples then follow Christ. A little bit later Andrew, who heard John and then followed Jesus, brings his brother Simon to be re-named Cephas, or Peter. A careful look at these Bible verses shows us the mission of everyone baptized into the Body of Christ: we must always proclaim our faith in Christ, so that others will follow him. We may not know how the will of God might work through those we bring to Christ; that is not the point. The point is that our ongoing mission as a church is to bring others to Christ, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

"Ordinary Time" began for us this week. On the old calendar, the feast of the Presentation, still more than two weeks away, was the last day of the Christmas season. Sadly, Bethlehem is hardly a place of peace on earth these days. The ancient Christian community has been largely uprooted by political strife. The Church of the Nativity stands (barely) in remarkable disrepair and disorder in Manger Square. The roof is crumbling, the major doorways are blocked, the wiring is faulty, and the worship life is disrupted by quarrels among Eastern Christians.

The church was founded by the Emperor Constantine in 325, destroyed in a Samaritan revolt in 539, and rebuilt by the Emperor Justinian. When the area came under Muslim control in 638, the holiness of the church was respected, and in return Christians allowed Muslims to pray in the south aisle, a right still upheld. Earlier in that century, invading Persians were ordered to destroy all churches, but when they saw the magi carved over the doorway of the Church of the Nativity, they spared it out of respect for their ancestors who bore gold, frankincense, and myrrh to the same city. The Crusaders restored and redecorated the church by the twelfth century, and it is their plan that survives. Down a few stone steps is a stone grotto with a silver star marking the place of Christ's birth: when the star was stolen in 1847 it triggered an international crisis that exploded into the Crimean War.

Since 1852, the church has been shared by the Roman Catholic, Greek Orthodox, and Armenian Churches. The Greeks are in charge of the grotto, but don't enjoy the best of friendships with the Armenians. Catholics have the care of the Chapel of the Manger, and avoid the squabbles by a separate entrance to the Franciscan monastery church of St. Catherine. Pray for peace in Bethlehem!

Sometimes they are the only health practitioners in the area.

With your help, the sisters bring the love and tenderness of God to these remote areas and have shown people living in Peru the mercy of Christ.


