


SECOND SUNDAY OF ADVENT 2018

Fr. Raymond E. Brown was a great 20th century New Testament scholar, writer and lecturer, whose books include his commentary on the Gospel of John and important works on Jesus' birth, passion, and death. He once commented in a lecture that he had discovered that he shared with many of his New Testament colleagues a great passion for reading detective stories. He came to the conclusion, however, that this really meant he and his colleagues, when they thought they were relaxing with a good murder mystery, were taking their work home with them, because the art of New Testament study is a bit like the art of trying to find clues in a good "who done it" type story. We have a kind of example of this with today's first reading – not admittedly a New Testament text, but one that definitely needs a bit of unravelling.

The name "Baruch" heads the book from which today's reading is taken, and there is a reasonably well known Baruch in the Old Testament — the secretary to the prophet Jeremiah. It is highly unlikely, however, that this Baruch wrote this entire very short book. Perhaps this Baruch wrote part of the book, but it looks as if today's first reading came from a different source. Today's passage shows every sign of having been written a considerable time after the exile, because the author refers to, but does not directly quote, a famous passage from the part pf the book of Isaiah that was written towards the end of the Israelites' time in exile. This is, of course, the passage applied to John the Baptist in today's Gospel.

Like's Gospel introduces John the Baptist's ministry in much the same way as it introduced Jesus' birth. It provides a brief historical and political context, thereby rooting John's activity (as it did with Jesus' birth in the earlier episode) in the real situations of his time. Therefore, we are told that John began his prophetic ministry when Tiberius was in his fifteenth year as Roman Emperor, and Pontius Pilate was governor of Judaea – there is a chilling warning at an early stage, if ever there was one! Not only are we told when John got down to work, but also we are given advance warning of Jesus' passion and death.

This is the first appearance of John the Baptist in this Advent season. He will reappear in next Sunday's Gospel as well. Next week, we will hear details of how he exercised his ministry and of what he said. This week, we read hos he fulfilled prophetic words spoken six hundred years earlier: about preparing a way for the Lord, removing barriers between people and God, symbolized



Baruch used similar imagery in the first reading, writing hundreds of years after the exile, but recalling the words of the prophet of the exile. Baruch's words are aimed at Jerusalem's citizens, to get rid of all sadness and mourning – presumably when this part of Baruch was being written, yet another disaster had fallen Jerusalem. Therefore, we have a two-part strategy here. In Baruch's word's, this requires us to remove whatever is the opposite of the Good News of God's presence. Therefore, we are to do away with anything that prevents us recognizing the approaching Lord – spiritual "mountains", as it were, that block our view – and fill in the great gulfs that keep us at a distance from the Lord even if we are aware of his closeness.

The beauty of prophetic, poetic images in the Bible is that they allow us to apply our own understanding of what they mean to our lives. It would be helpful to offer a detailed list of all the ways in which we could apply the references to mountains and valleys to our lives. We can say this much, however, those mountains of Baruch, Isaiah and John the Baptist could represent anything that blocks our awareness of God in our lives. We have to identify these for ourselves. Likewise, the valleys might represent the gulf that exists either between ourselves and God, or between ourselves and other people. Mountains and valleys might be a good way of expressing what we need to get rid of, if we are to love God with all our energy, and our neighbor as ourselves.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Look around most Catholic churches, and you will discover an image of John the Baptist, often in the old baptistery, or in a window near where the font is or was located. He has two feast days in the calendar: one commemorating his birth, and the other his death. There are only three nativities in our calendar: for Jesus, for Mary, and for the Baptist. John's birthday is reckoned according to the schedule given in Luke's Gospel of the angel's announcement to Mary. The angel tells her that her cousin Elizabeth is in the sixth month of pregnancy, and so Mary hastens to help her. Reckoning Christmas as December 25, we count backwards nine months to March 25 for the Feast of the Annunciation. Then we count forward three months to June 24 for John the Baptist's birth. Halfway to Christmas, his nativity gives ample reason for rejoicing in the summer, and his symbols of fire and water are used playfully in bonfires and dives into the sea. Even at the polar opposite of Christmas in the calendar, the energy of Christ's birth in the Incarnation provides cause for rejoicing.

On the longest night of the year, please join us as we again remember our homeless brothers and sisters who have died in the last year.


The memorial will be held on December 18th at Old St. Patrick's Church. Music again will

ISAIAH 11:1

THE JESSE TREE

The passage above is the basis for the Jesse Tree, which has become a symbol of Christ's heritage, or roots, and God's covenant with the Jewish people. The stump symbolizes the family of the Jews; the shoot, Mary; and the branch, Jesus.

In the Old Testament, Jesse, the son of Obed, was a poor farmer in

Bethlehem. He had 8 sons, the youngest of whom was David. As a boy, David was anointed by Samuel to succeed Saul as king of the Israelites. Christ was to be born of the house of David in Bethlehem.

Today the Jesse Tree is used to trace God's promise of the Savior and Christ's ancestry.

There are some variations of the symbols but primarily the same intent.

Our Jesse Tree is near the ambo. Each day, simple paper ornaments will be added with a symbol on one side and Scripture passage on the other side. Please come up and take a look.

- (4) 2018 change in balance from 2017 column includes pledge and interest deposits \$607,338; distributions of (\$348,472) towards the construction, stage lighting, sound, and other furnishings and equipment; (\$29,222) loan interest paid and in May, a (\$200,000) payment toward principal on the Parish Center Capital Loan.





Uses of Parish Operating Funds Fiscal Year 2018 \$1,925,546




Sources and Uses of School Operating Funds

Stewardship of Treasure

Summary of the Parish Financial Report Year Ended June 30, 2018

- The parish finished the June 30, 2018 fiscal year with an operating loss (the shaded line of the Statement of Revenue and Expense) of \$10,789.
- The parish has combined Sunday; Christmas and Easter collections for the year decreased by a total of \$8,433 from the prior year ended June 30, 2017. As regular operating and ministry costs, utilities, supplies, and benefits will continue to increase, we are asking Parishioners to prayerfully consider a slight increase in their offerings. Also, please consider changing to electronic giving, currently 13% of donations are made electronically; giving electronically provides a convenient option to donate on a regular basis. Thank you for any amount you can give.
- The Fall Fest/Carnival was a huge success netting a profit of over \$109,000. With entertainment, food, rides, raffles, this was a great event where the community can gather. The Fall Fest will return in 2019.
- The Religious Education and Youth Ministry programs receives approximately \$85,000 in parish support to provide catechesis and formation to our Youth through your regular Sunday donations.
- The required parish support to the school in fiscal year 2018 was \$143,829, due to increased maintenance/utility costs, tuition assistance, a 3% salary increase and a rise in benefit costs.
- Parish and school family participation contributed toward \$161,449 of school fundraising revenue in 2018. The school hosted a Spring Auction raising approximately \$80,000 of which \$16,650 will be used toward next year's STREAM (science, religion, engineering, art, math) program. The remaining funds are from the Golf Outing, Dance-a-thon, Fall Fest and Annual Fund donations. Thank you.
- Parish salaries and benefits decreased \$50,873 due to staff changes, and the school's expense increased \$18,584 due to salary increases and benefit costs.
- Ordinary maintenance and repairs for the church, school, rectory and parish center, increased by \$72,972 due to snow removal, landscaping improvements, painting/repairs in the church, a/c and boiler.
- The total loan for the Parish Center was \$788,189, thanks to the generous pledge commitments and donations; the parish was able to pay \$300,000 towards the principal balance this year. The building is providing a wonderful space for the children as well as the adults to utilize for the school, religious education, sports, social gathering events and worship. The loan balance at year-end is \$488,189. We still need your continued support to pay down the debt and maintain the building. Thank you in advance for your continued generosity.
- The Parish's investment accounts had a net unrealized gain of \$20,824. The school's investment account had a net unrealized gain of \$27,482. Because investment gains and losses are not part of the parish's/ school's normal operations, they are not considered in determining the parish's/school's operating income but rather considered Other Revenue.


