

Notes from Fr. Bob...

13TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

As Jesus begins the long journey to Jerusalem where all will be fulfilled, he continues to instruct his disciples. The disciples have just been displaying their ignorance, firstly by arguing over who was the greatest and then by trying to stop a man casting out devils in the name of Jesus. They felt he should not be doing this because he was not one of them. Jesus now has to rebuke them again when two of the disciples want to smite the Samaritans who have refused to welcome him on his journey to Jerusalem. In their excitement at following Jesus the disciples are caught up in the feelings of power. They want to conquer the world and bring it under his rule. Jesus, through his replies to three potential followers, challenges such sentiments and turns them upside down. At one level Luke's gospel is the gospel of mercy and compassion for the poor, but it is also the gospel of absolute commitment. The commitment has to be unconditional, free from even the expected norms of social behavior and filial piety. The follower of Jesus has to be prepared to discount both the securities and the duties of custom. This may be the need for shelter and food; it may be the solemn duty to bury our nearest and dearest, the highest in the Jewish list of obligations. The reply Jesus gives plays on the difference between the spiritually dead and the physically dead. The urgency attached to the proclamation of the kingdom is such that even the hallowed rituals owed to the deceased should be left to the spiritually unenlightened so that the disciple may proceed with the task of the gospel. Paul reminds us that to reach such a state of wisdom we need freedom in the Spirit, brought to us by Christ. The focus is always on serving the other in works of love rather than falling back into self-indulgence or power-play.

Few of us are able to work without food and shelter. Few again would feel comfortable at failing to provide the due funeral rites for our families. Yet we are also aware of how our creature comforts and also an over-developed sense of duty or loyalty can get in the way of our openness to the gospel. We want our way to be the only way. We can be fearful of other churches, other faiths, other races, nations or groups. Such ultimately tribal feelings are very strong and can make the gospel a very tough proposition. We have to look carefully at whether loving goodness, justice and peace are really present in our behavior and practices. In a world that is still filled with injustice and discrimination, it is unlikely that we can claim total integrity in all aspects of our lives. In the



bottom line. In the world of education we have to question the narrowness of standards of achievement and the lack of equal access to educational resources. In the world of employment we have to question discrimination of gender and race. In the world of the Church we have to question whether we practice what we preach. This is why the uncompromising stance of Jesus is so important for our openness to the truth. He asks us where we are caught up in our hidden agendas and where we need his helping hand to have the freedom to work for the freedom of others.




BECOME A CATECHIST







FR. LORENZO'S NOTES



Our parish has a great sense of compassion in caring for the sick. Our ministers of care and volunteers make all possible efforts to bring the healing presence of Christ to the sick through their ministry. But sometimes there are questions like the ones that are presented in this short article that come to the surface as we minister the sick. Let us take these two questions as a moment of catechesis with regard to the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick.

Why some people say Extreme Unction and others Anointing of the Sick?


"Extreme Unction," which may also and more fittingly be called "Anointing of the Sick", is not a sacrament for those only who are at the point of death. Hence, as soon as any one of the faithful begins to be in danger of death from sickness or old age, the fitting time for him to receive this sacrament has certainly arrived." (Sacrosanctum Concilium, Chapter III paragraph 73).

This paragraph clarifies that Extreme Unction or Last Rites are other names that through the centuries were given to the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick and, as it says, it is not necessarily administrated to a person who is at the point of death. For example, if you have been scheduled for a surgery, you may call the parish and set a time with a priest to receive Anointing of the Sick before surgery, and since you are at the parish you may wish to use the sacrament of confession. Also, if you have been admitted to the hospital and would like to receive Anointing of the Sick, ask the chaplain to call a priest. Do not wait until the last minute if the illness is worsening. One thing to take in consideration is that if you are requesting anointing of the sick for a family member or for yourself in a hospital on a Sunday, remember that most parish priests are celebrating Masses on Sunday morning, this may delay the anointing.

"The first grace of this sacrament, Anointing of the Sick, is one of strengthening, peace and courage to overcome the difficulties that go with the condition of serious illness or the frailty of old age. This grace is a gift of the Holy Spirit, who renews trust and faith in God, and strengthens against the temptations of the evil one, the temptation to discouragement and anguish in the face of death. This assistance from the Lord by the power of the Holy Spirit is meant to lead the sick person to healing of the soul, but also of the body if such is God's will. Furthermore, "if he has committed sins, he will be forgiven." (CCC 1520).

Can a priest give the sacrament of Anointing of the Sick to a faithful who has passed away?

The church teaches that: "it is certain that the sacrament of the anointing of the sick- which is also the sacrament of the dying in the case of those who were unable to be anointed or in fact were not anointed at an earlier and proper time in the illness — may not be given to a dead person." This would be improper; none of the seven sacraments may be given to a person who is dead." (Code of Canon Law Book IV). However, prayers are offered for the faithful who has passed away, including the Rosary, the Chaplet of Divine Mercy, the Litany of the Saints, the Psalms etc. And at the proper time a funeral Mass may be celebrated. During Mass we come together in faith and pray for the eternal rest of the faithful departed that their sins may be forgiven and may be admitted to the company of saints and angels in heaven.



In this Jubilee Year of Mercy, Pope Francis has called each of us to be a witness of charity for our suffering brothers and sisters living on the margins. He encourages us to "open our eyes and see the misery of the world, the wounds of our brothers and sisters who are denied their dignity, and let us recognize that we are compelled to heed their cry for help!" (Misericordiae Vultus [MV], no. 15).

Through the Peter's Pence Collection, we unite with the Holy Father as he reaches out to our brothers and sisters suffering the effects of war and violence, natural disasters, and religious persecution. We stand in solidarity with Catholics all over the world to support the charitable works and outreach of the Holy See.

In Pope Francis, we have a joyful witness of charity. By supporting this collection, we can experience more fully how "mercy is the force that reawakens us to new life and instills in us the courage to look to the future with hope" (MV, no. 10).

Sunday Notes

FOCUS ON THE MISSION

"There are so many things to do." "We have so little time." How many variations of these statements have you heard or even said yourself?

Actually neither statement is completely true. There are many things to do in this life, but really few things that are vitally important. Working, searching, conniving, and worrying our way to "gratify[ing] the desires of the flesh," as Paul relates in today's second reading, are really non-productive. So little time? When we take on the freedom that Christ offers us, we have all the time we need in this world, and even more in the next.

Elisha, the prophet Elijah's chosen servant, was slightly befuddled about what he should do. When Elijah called, he returned to bid farewell to his parents and provide food for his people. Only then did he follow.

Jesus demands something different, something more of his disciples. He calls us to a single-minded determination to drop everything and follow him. Now, not later.

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TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

An old and still vital treasure in our tradition is a document called the "Apostolic Traditions," giving us a snapshot of church life in third-century Rome. Its author, Hippolytus, describes the liturgical life of the church and records the actual texts of the prayers. The way he explained the various "orders" of the church was the basis for a major reform of the rites of ordination by Pope Pius XII in 1947, and later for the Second Vatican Council. Hippolytus tells us that a bishop had to be elected by the entire people, and that ordination had to take place on a Sunday in the presence of the people, the presbyters, and neighboring bishops. The bishop-candidate is ordained by the other bishops, who impose their hands on his head while everyone else keeps a profound silence, awaiting the outpouring of the Spirit. There is a prayer of blessing said by one of them, on behalf of all, asking for the Spirit and describing his ministry.

Later centuries layered new features on top of this liturgy, including the requirement for three bishop consecrators. Today, whenever a new bishop is announced (election by the people is no more), a kind of genealogy is provided, tracing his pedigree through the consecrating bishops down through the centuries to Peter and the first body of believers. Every bishop today can trace his office through his consecrators back to the beginning in a tradition called "apostolic succession."

JUBILEE YEAR OF MERCY REFLECTION


Yet again in Ordinary Time, Jesus seems to demand extraordinary commitment. Α would-be disciple enthusiastically volunteers to follow Jesus "wherever" (Luke 9:57). Jesus replies that "wherever" means "nowhere to rest his head" (9:58). To other candidates, Jesus brusquely denies reasonable requests to fulfill family obligations (9:59, 61), declaring that discipleship demands total commitment—now! But Jesus also demands that we not judge how others respond. When James and John volunteered to "call down fire from heaven" (9:54) to destroy an unwelcoming town, Jesus "turned and rebuked them" (9:55). All violence of any kind is completely unacceptable among Jesus' disciples, a lesson this Jubilee Year of Mercy is teaching the Christian community once again. Paul's challenge to the Galatians and us reinforces Jesus' decisive command to James and John that they express their commitment to him through compassion for others. We must abandon the violence of "biting and devouring one another" (Galatians 5:15), choosing instead to "serve one another through love" (5:13).


