## Notes from Fr. Bob...

## 12<sup>TH</sup> SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Jesus had begun his ministry by announcing the kingdom of God. He called disciples to follow him and then revealed to them, by his miracles, his exorcisms and his teaching, what God's rule meant. He had aroused opposition in Nazareth early on when he said that God was as much concerned about saving Gentiles as Jews. The disciples had discounted this and were dazzled by his powers.

Now, in today's Gospel, Jesus questions his disciples about his true identity; and so, having heard what the crowds say about him, he asks them who THEY think he is. Peter speaks up with the correct answer: Jesus is the Christ, the Messiah. But Jesus needs to qualify this answer by adding a truth which the disciples will not welcome. They shared the popular expectation of a Messiah who would bring Israel salvation by defeating their enemies by force. But are power and violence the answer? Jesus had already put behind him that satanic temptation in the desert.

Jesus now tells them that he will be a Messiah who will certainly give life through being raised after three days. But that life will come THROUGH suffering, rejection by the authorities and the shame of the cross. Jesus says this not because he likes suffering but because unless he tackles the root cause of sin, he cannot bring about a genuine salvation. He has to reject the spiral of violence which is part of the Jewish nationalist dream for liberation. What he offers in its place is a self-giving love, a sacrificial love that has the power to touch those who gaze upon the cross with the eyes of faith. It is a love that, through the power of the resurrection, can unite and not divide. Jesus knows his death is inevitable but now he needs to tell his disciples that they must follow on the same path – only by risking their life for his sake will they gain it.

Like the disciples, we get used to Jesus' company. We too are dazzled by his miracles and his teaching. We are used to seeing the cross as a decoration on the church wall or as a piece of jewelry. We have heard his words about the cross many times before.

But let's try to hear those words anew, as if we were hearing them for the first time. Is what he says true? Must we risk losing our life in order to gain it? Can't we just carry on in the same old way, where our religion does not really make many demands on us but gives us comfort? Surely we can save our life but NOT lose it?



promises of our baptism, which call us to die with Christ in order to live with him. It may not be as dramatic a choice as life or death, but it may involve a choice against racism, status-seeking, the worship of money; or it may mean making the hard decision to follow the moral and social teaching of the Church when the society around us may ridicule us for it. Then we can make the choice for ourselves: do we really believe in Christ's words, that losing our life for his sake will bring us true life?

## From Fr. Lorenzo's Desk



Our parish has a great sense of compassion in caring for the sick. Our ministers of care and volunteers make all possible efforts to bring the healing presence of Christ to the sick through their ministry. But sometimes there are questions like the ones that are presented in this short article that come to the surface as we minister the sick. Let us take these two questions as a moment of catechesis with regard to the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick.

## Why some people say Extreme Unction and others Anointing of the Sick?

"Extreme Unction," which may also and more fittingly be called "Anointing of the Sick", is not a sacrament for those only who are at the point of death. Hence, as soon as any one of the faithful begins to be in danger of death from sickness or old age, the fitting time for him to receive this sacrament has certainly arrived." (Sacrosanctum Concilium, Chapter III paragraph 73).

This paragraph clarifies that Extreme Unction or Last Rites are other names that through the centuries were given to the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick and, as it says, it is not necessarily administrated to a person who is at the point of death. For example, if you have been scheduled for a surgery, you may call the parish and set a time with a priest to receive Anointing of the Sick before surgery, and since you are at the parish you may wish to use the sacrament of confession. Also, if you have been admitted to the hospital and would like to receive Anointing of the Sick, ask the chaplain to call a priest. Do not wait until the last minute if the illness is worsening. One thing to take in consideration is that if you are requesting anointing of the sick for a family member or

for yourself in a hospital on a Sunday, remember that most parish priests are celebrating Masses on Sunday morning, this may delay the anointing.

"The first grace of this sacrament, Anointing of the Sick, is one of strengthening, peace and courage to overcome the difficulties that go with the condition of serious illness or the frailty of old age. This grace is a gift of the Holy Spirit, who renews trust and faith in God, and strengthens against the temptations of the evil one, the temptation to discouragement and anguish in the face of death. This assistance from the Lord by the power of the Holy Spirit is meant to lead the sick person to healing of the soul, but also of the body if such is God's will. Furthermore, "if he has committed sins, he will be forgiven." (CCC 1520).

# Can a priest give the sacrament of Anointing of the Sick to a faithful who has passed away?

The church teaches that: "it is certain that the sacrament of the anointing of the sick- which is also the sacrament of the dying in the case of those who were unable to be anointed or in fact were not anointed at an earlier and proper time in the illness - may not be given to a dead person." This would be improper; none of the seven sacraments may be given to a person who is dead." (Code of Canon Law Book IV). However, prayers are offered for the faithful who has passed away, including the Rosary, the Chaplet of Divine Mercy, the Litany of the Saints, the Psalms etc. And at the proper time a funeral Mass may be celebrated. During Mass we come together in faith and pray for the eternal rest of the faithful departed that their sins may be forgiven and may be admitted to the company of saints and angels in heaven.

## Does your partner...

- Embarrass or make fun of you in front of your friends or family? Put down your accomplishments or goals?
- Make you feel like you are unable to make decisions?
   Use intimidation or threats to gain compliance?
- Treat you roughly-grab, push, pinch, shove or hit you? Threaten or abuse your pets?
- Call you several times a night or show up to make sure you are where you said you would be?
- Use drugs or alcohol as an excuse for saying hurtful things or abusing you?
- Blame you for how they feel or act?
- Pressure you sexually for things you aren't ready for?
- Make you feel like there "is no way out" of the relationship?
- Prevent you from doing things you want-like spending time with your friends or family?
- Try to keep you from leaving after a fight, or leave you somewhere after a fight?

### Do You...

- Sometimes feel scared of how your partner will act?
- Constantly make excuses to other people for your partner's behavior?
- Believe that you can help your partner change if only you changed something about yourself?
- Try not to do anything that would cause conflict or make your partner angry?
- Feel like no matter what you do, your partner is never happy with you?
- Always do what your partner wants you to do instead of what you want?
- Stay with your partner because you are afraid of what your partner would do if you broke up?

High school and college students often have summers packed with summer classes, jobs, internships, family and friends,






Our prayers and hearts are with the victims of the mass shooting in Orlando, their families and our gay and lesbian brothers and sisters.



# Twelfth Sunday in Ordinary Time

## FOLLOW IN THE FOOTSTEPS OF CHRIST

The great fifty-day celebration of Easter has concluded, as have the feasts honoring the Holy Trinity and the Body and Blood of Christ. Last week we began a long stretch of Ordinary Time that will bring us to late November. Saint Paul tells us today that those who are baptized "have clothed yourselves with Christ" (Galatians 3:27). This scripture is echoed in the Church's baptism ritual when we sing, "You have put on Christ, in him you have been baptized." This message is inspiring and sobering at the same time, for in today's Gospel, we get to the heart of what it means to be clothed in Christ. The Lord tells us. "If anyone wishes to come after me, he must deny himself and take up his cross daily and follow me" (Luke 9:23). For the next twenty-two weeks we are called to take up the cross and, with Saint Luke as our guide, follow in the footsteps of Christ.

### TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

It's almost midsummer day! One of the great hidden treasures of our liturgical calendar occurs this week. There are only three "nativity" feasts on our calendar: for the Lord, the Blessed Mother (September 8), and the Nativity of Saint John the Baptist on June 24. Friday's date is anchored by the Annunciation (March 25), when Mary learns not only of her own child's advent, but of Elizabeth's child. We are exactly half a year away from Christmas Eve. There are strong traditions around this feast. Just as the winter solstice provides a rich vocabulary for Christmas, so does the abundance of light at midsummer inform this celebration. Just as at Christmas, a religious festival spills over into culture. As summer light reaches its peak, the sun-drenched zones of northern Europe see people staying up all night, kindling "St. John's Fires" in the long summer twilight. Bonfires seem to be the unifying force in all these celebrations, kindled along the shores of the St. Lawrence in Quebec and Montreal, with harbor illuminations in France. You may be most interested in the custom in San Juan, Puerto Rico, the Baptist's own city. People there will leap into the sea between midnight and dawn to honor John. Why not find your way to a pool, a lake, or a sandy beach this week and plunge in to recall your baptism? It's a tradition!




