Notes from Fr. Bob...


CHRIST THE KING

At Monasterboice in County Louth, Ireland, the ancient Celtic cross depicts the story of the Last Judgment in graphic terms. Christ is weighing souls in a pair of scales. Those who are found worthy are seated on the right side of Christ with faces towards him, while those who are found unworthy are being prodded away by little devils with pitchforks, their faces looking aghast and facing away from Christ. The stone which has survived the weather of twelve centuries is an early means of teaching the gospel to a people who were illiterate. Only the monks and priests had access to handwritten texts of the gospel. If the cross could speak of the people who had gathered there, name those who had prayed there, witness to the history written in the fields and villages, the history of Christian people would be told.

The story told would be that of the deeds and acts of the love which were done without thinking, often unrecognized and unacknowledged. The heroes of the story would be the unknown of the history books: a woman who nursed a dying neighbor, a man who gave a stranger food and drink one cold November evening, perhaps a woman who hid a priest on the run for being a Catholic in penal times. These moments in history were sudden, brief and quickly past. They are the moments in history when the gospel was lived out.

The gospel highlights the paradox of the Christian life. Christ is met in the most unusual and unknown circumstances of life, and often in the most unlikely and unexpected people. In a world in which style and presentation are very important in advertising and images of beautiful people abound, the gospel reminds us of the anawim, 'the poor', those who can rely only on God because they have nothing and are considered by most others as nothing in the world. They are the people whose history is not written in the history books and whose tombstones, if they could afford a tombstone, are the only reminders of their lives.

Perhaps it is difficult to reconcile the story of the Last Judgment with the mercy and love of God, which is often the focus of preaching today. The feast of Christ the King celebrates God's love and justice. In the first reading, God is presented as a shepherd who cares for each of his sheep. The shepherd seeks each out, knows each by name, strengthens, heals and bandages the wounded. Christ the Good Shepherd deepens this understanding in the story of the shepherd who seeks out the one lost sheep of the hundred in the fold. He carries it home on his shoulders. To this story God's love, we are called to

reminder that we are called to take responsibility for our lives and that the commandment of love is the invitation to be followed. God does not reject us, but in freedom, we have the possibility of rejecting God and God's invitation to love. Through our actions, we can determine how God will judge us.

Christ the King presents an image of humble love and service of others. God will know our weakness and need for healing but invites us out of our brokenness to be close to the weakest in society. It is important to recognize one's Achilles' heel in order to be compassionate to others.

At the end of the Church's year and as we prepare for Advent, we are invited to take stock of our lives and recognize the action of God's grace in shepherding us throughout the last year. Can I see the times of darkness or the times when God has healed me? Are there times when God's love, through love of those around me, rescued me from darkness and despair? Do I thank God for this love?

How have I responded to the invitations with which I have been presented in the poor and weak? With gratitude let us thank God for the way we have responded. Perhaps there is also need for repentance for moments of selfishness and carelessness? God who heals can forgive and show mercy which can restore us to new life.

The feast of Christ the King is a celebration of God's love, which extends to the ends of the earth. To recognize God's love is a call for praise and gratitude.



CHRIST, KING OF ALL

On this, the final Sunday of the liturgical year, we celebrate the solemnity of Christ the King. By concluding the year with this feast we are proclaiming our faith that Jesus Christ is the one and only king over all seasons, all peoples, and all of creation.

At the end of time as we know it, Christ's work of restoring all things to unity and harmony with their Creator God will be completed. This Sunday, when we claim Christ as both our Shepherd and our King, we recognize our own calling to participate in Christ's saving work by caring for those whom Jesus calls "the least ones" (Matthew 25:45).

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Today we have a modern feast, less than a century old, and placed at the very end of the liturgical cycle of Sundays only in 1969. In 1925, the world was in a sorry state from the vantage point of Pope Pius XI. The winds of war had swept the map of Europe raw, and ancient Christian dynasties had fallen in Russia and Spain. Although the Great War had ended, wars were breaking out everywhere. Fascism was already in control in Italy, and Nazism was on the horizon for Germany. The disorder making its claim on the human race was, the pope felt, an insult to the Divine Order. Pius XI designated the last Sunday in October as a day of universal recognition of the kingship of Christ. Creating this feast was an act of bravery by the pope, who was standing up against idolatry of the state and the dehumanizing forces of the modern world, things that are not hard to detect in today's world as well. In 1969 it seemed fitting to move the feast to a place of honor at the end of the year, a way of summing up the whole movement of the liturgical year toward the perfection of the Kingdom of God. In recent decades, many Protestant churches have adopted this day from the new Roman calendar, so it is shared now with the Church of England, the Episcopal, Presbyterian, and Lutheran churches, and others.







SOMEONE YOU SHOULD KNOW

Native Southside Chicagoan, 4th of 6 children and product of 16 years of Catholic education, Ray Streit is a friendly familiar face around St. Cletus Parish. Ray has a long history with St. Cletus, as he and his wife, Carolyn, were married at St Cletus in 1978. They have 2 children, Bryan and Jennifer who live and work in the Chicagoland area. Carolyn is an accomplished baker, life-coach and coordinator of Gift Shop volunteers at Good Samaritan Hospital in Downers Grove. Before retiring in 2007, Ray worked at Chicago Communication Service for 40 years, providing him with early exposure in developing his technology skills.

Ray opens the church for weekday Mass and fluctuates between being an altar server to lector to Eucharistic minister. He and Carolyn are regular Sunday 7:00 Mass attendees.

Not being one to stay idle, after retiring, Ray became involved in the Ministry of Care.

On a weekly, basis, Ray visits the sick in the hospital, in their homes and in nursing homes. He conducts Communion Services and prays the rosary and assists at funerals in the parish. He also assists with server training and scheduling. He definitely qualifies as St. Cletus' "Minister Handy-Man". Ray will tell you, one of his greatest pleasures is intermingling with all ages of people. Bringing Communion to those unable to come to church is a fulfilling part of his ministry

He enjoys sports (especially the Cubs!), golf and fishing, and walking with his dog in the neighborhood. Although he has little time for these activities, he always makes time for a friendly chat and an offer to help if needed.

It is no wonder that he was awarded the Christifidelis Award by the Archdiocese October 29th. This is an award given to "an individual Catholic layperson who has demonstrated by participation in parish life the personal and ministerial renewal calling the laity to the vocation of responsibility for the Church's life springing from the gift and mission of their baptism".
