

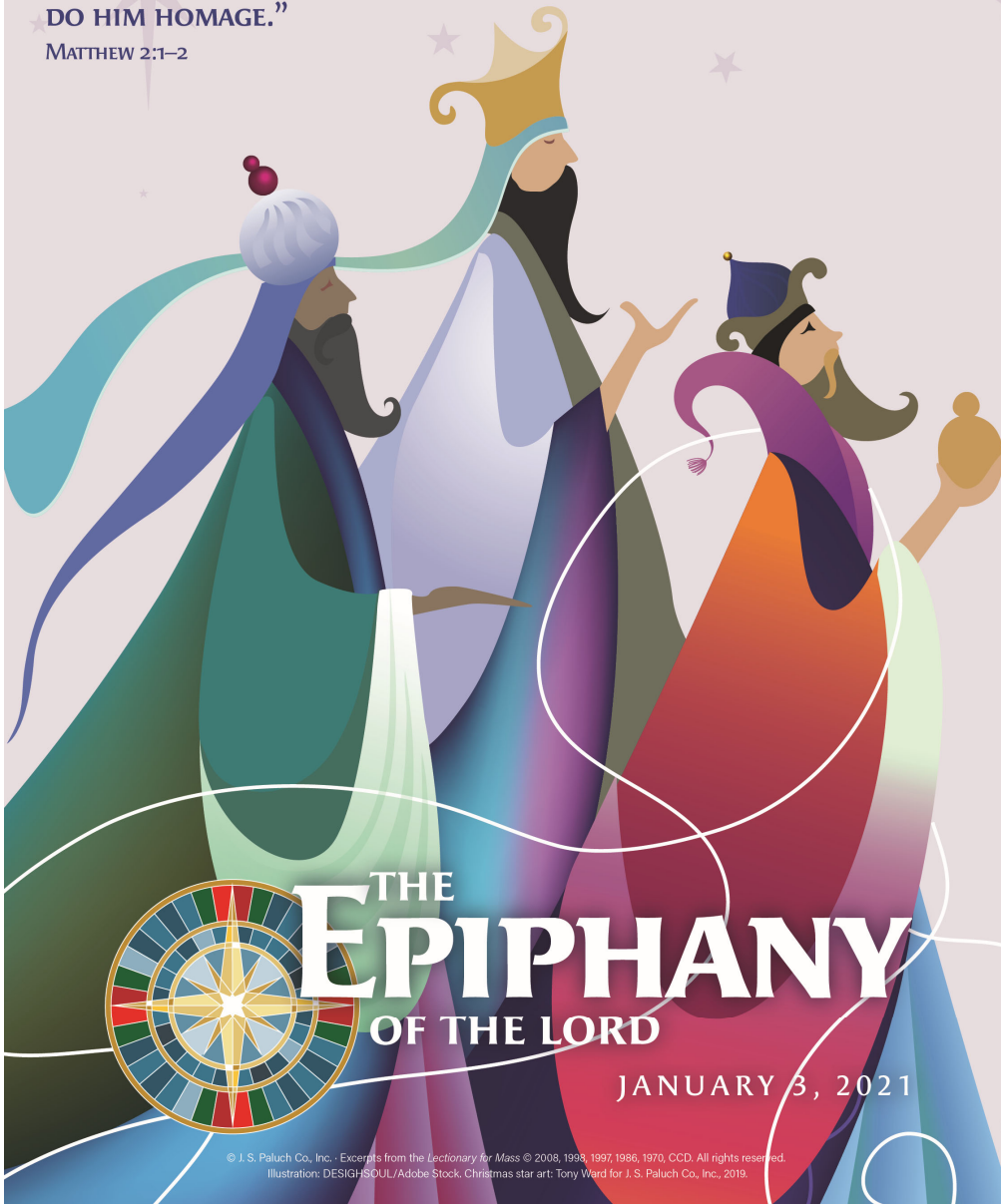

Notes from Fr. Bob...

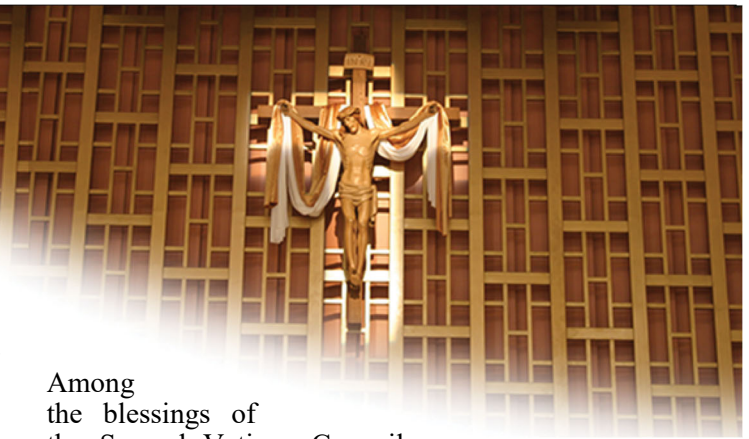
THE EPIPHANY OF THE LORD

A pilgrim to the Holy Land was one day praying in the underground cave at Bethlehem, when he heard an unusual hubbub in the basilica above. It grew louder; it seemed to be getting ever nearer. Then, suddenly, the grotto was flooded with a crowd of West Africans led by three magnificent black bishops. Everything about them – their glistening eyes, their chants, their brilliantly colored clothes – seemed to speak of a childlike delight. Not even the Magi in their traditional garb could have cut so splendid a sight. After a period of prayer, they retraced their steps to the basilica above and there celebrated the Mass of the Epiphany. It was a woman, dressed even more sumptuously than the rest, who read the passage from Isaiah we heard today: “Arise, shine out...for your light has come...the nations come to your light.” The pilgrim realized that the ancient prophecy was being fulfilled yet again.

The story of the Magi, recorded by Matthew, has an almost magical charm about it which befits this wonderful Christmas season. But of course what matters is not so much the story as the message it conveys. It’s possible to get lost in questions, such as: how many Magi were there (Matthew doesn’t say), or where exactly did they come from (“from the east” is not very helpful), or what kind of star was it that could guide them and then pinpoint the location of the stable? To get hung up on such questions is to risk missing the real point of the story.

And the real point of the story, its message, is that the tiny Child of Bethlehem is meant for all humankind, and that he is worth seeking, at whatever cost. Like a wondrous light that can never be extinguished, he draws people from every land towards him. His first visitors, as we heard on Christmas Day, were a handful of Jewish shepherds; his second, we learn today, are a group of pagan, that is, non-Jewish, Wise Men, travelling from far-away lands. The very word “epiphany” means a revelation: today we celebrate the revelation that Jesus is for everyone. As Paul explained in our second reading, God has laid bare his eternal plan, which is that the whole world, pagans therefore as well as Jews, are to be sharers in the same inheritance.

The gifts the Wise Men bring are significant, for they speak subtly of the identity of the Child in the manger. They show why he is worth seeking: gold – the royal metal; how fitting for one born to be King; sweet-smelling incense – used for worship of God and so eminently suitable for the one who is God-made-man; and myrrh – used for embalming the dead: even this apparently odd gift is appropriate, for this Child has come into the world to lay down his life as our Savior.



Among the blessings of the Second Vatican Council was the decision to describe the Church as a pilgrim people. Like the Magi, we’re pilgrims, we’re on a journey; our guiding star is the precious gift of faith; we’d be lost without it, for so long as this life lasts we remain pilgrims. The Magi had to make a long, arduous journey before they found the Lord. Perhaps friends and families ridiculed them; there must surely been times on the way when they felt like giving up; and when the journey was almost over they ran into King Herod.

The Christian pilgrimage too has its hazards; it sometimes invites ridicule, can even seem a waste of time. Yet persevere in it we must; nothing else is so important. Sunday Mass, a kind of milestone on the way, enables us to take our bearings, ensure that we are on course and receive in Communion the food needed for the journey. It is only at the end that we shall find what we’ve always been looking for (even if we’ve sometimes sought it in the wrong place), what in fact we were made for – the face to face vision of Jesus, the light of our lives.

The word used to describe our Lord’s visitors does not, strictly speaking, mean “wise men”. All the same, it isn’t a bad way of describing them: the truly wise people in this world are those who have wisdom not simply of the head but also of the heart, the kind of wisdom that leads them to pin their hopes on the star of their faith and to follow it courageously to the end.

May that kind of wisdom be granted to us all.

THE FEAST OF THE EPIPHANY



I recently watched a video by Joe Paprocki (an author for Loyola Press) talking about the Magi (also referred to as the Three Kings or the Three Wise Men) and how they can model discipleship to us. I wanted to share his insights with you as well, in the form of **6 Lessons we can learn from the Magi on Discipleship:**

1. **Don't Travel Alone** – the Magi came together from different parts of the world to seek the newborn King. We also do not have to travel alone on our faith journey. We are part of a wonderful faith community, and we should support each other and accompany each other on the journey of faith.
2. **Look for Signs** – The Magi saw and followed the star. We see signs of God's presence in the world all around us. We simply need to open our eyes and see them.
3. **Seek Direction** – the Magi stopped to seek direction along the way. We also should constantly seek direction from trusted individuals in our life. Sometimes we need help to get back on track.
4. **Offer Gifts** – The Magi offered gifts of Gold, Frankincense and Myrrh. We also can offer gifts to Jesus by sharing our time, talents and treasure. We can offer ourselves as gifts to the newborn King.
5. **Find Another Way** – the Magi had to find a different way home in order to protect the newborn King. As Catholics, we are called to ongoing conversion as we continue to follow Jesus. As we travel in our faith journey, sometimes we get sidetracked and need to find a new way to resume the journey. Remember that Jesus is the Way, the Truth and the Life.
6. **Tell Others** – the Magi shared their epiphany with others, that is why we know the story today. We are called to share our own stories of encounters with Christ. When we share our encounters, others may be able to encounter Jesus as well.

In December, one of our RE Home Lessons asked the children to think about gifts they would give to Jesus on his birthday. Here is a sampling of their answers:

Gifts for Jesus:

- Stuffed animal elephant
- Stuffed animal mouse
- Gold for the King of Kings
- Hugs for a year
- My heart
- Food
- Love
- Hope
- Happiness
- Prayers to keep him safe
- A sweater to keep him warm
- Basketball so we can have fun together
- Toys so he can have fun growing up
- A stuffed animal to give him peace and comfort while he sleeps
- A stuffed animal because they are nice and cozy to snuggle with
- I will pray the rosary with my family
- Football so we can play together
- Socks to keep warm
- My love
- A Telephone so that we can communicate better
- Wine (might come in handy when he is older)
- Clothes to keep him warm
- Being with the Holy Family to experience the love, similar to the love that I feel on my birthday with my family.

On this feast day of the Epiphany, may we all learn a lesson from the Magi and become better disciples of Jesus, Emmanuel – God with us.

The Epiphany of the Lord

When I tell a story, I have a friend who prefers the “nutshell version” first. After that she’ll listen to me ramble, but she wants to know the main point right off the bat. When reading and hearing Sunday scriptures one may often find the nutshell by looking at the responsorial psalm or the Gospel acclamation. From Psalm 72 we hear “Lord, every nation on earth will adore you.” The verse for the Gospel acclamation is Matthew 2:2 “We saw his star at its rising and have come to do him homage.” As a weary world, we need to see the light, to follow with our actions and our words. This is the same hope that is echoed in Isaiah 60:2 “See, darkness covers the earth, / and thick clouds cover the peoples; / but upon you the LORD shines, / and over you appears his glory.” Don’t give up, friends. You must shine!

SEARCHING

In Matthew’s Gospel today we see two extremely different perspectives, two different reasons for searching for Jesus. In some ways, this resembles the polarization of our nation in today’s time. What one group sees as good for the nation, those with opposing views think will wreck the country. The Magi were astrologers who saw a vision in the sky and were trying to find a way to follow it and discover the new king of the Jews. Herod heard about this king, and his reaction was dark and negative. He saw the birth of such a king as a threat to his power as the Roman leader of the country and wanted the Magi to pass on to him what they knew about this Christ child. Similarly, on a more personal level, we can either feel threatened or excited by changes that may come, depending on our perspective.

GIVING HOMAGE

In our minds, it is easy to mix up bits and pieces from Luke’s account of the shepherds coming to see Jesus in the stable and the story of the magi. Clearly, it has taken the magi time to get here, and the reading speaks of them coming to the house where the star led them. Nevertheless, they “prostrated themselves and did him homage. Then they opened their treasures . . .”

How do we do this? Do we continue looking for Jesus, even if it takes a while and he is not where we expect to see him? Are we paying attention to the signs showing us the way? What gifts do we have with which to pay him homage? After seeing him, the Magi were warned in a dream not to go back the way they came. But if we have seen the Christ child, how can we go back to where we were? We must continue to respond to God’s call to move forward and grow in our lives. We must seek the right and just path and turn away from the “Herods” and inherent evils in our life.

Nutshell: Seek God. Pay homage. Amen.

Isaiah reminds the people of God that the land shall be restored to their possession, they shall rejoice to see their people return from the bondage of exile, and they shall be a light to the nations. In other words, through the people of Israel, the Savior shall come to all people who seek God with a sincere heart. This brings joy and the radiance of God's glory to all the world and to all people everywhere. Through the fidelity of the people of God, and through God's fidelity to them, all people shall become God's children and rejoice in the fulfillment of God's promise to Israel.

FEAST OF FAITH

The Liturgy of Emmanuel

The assembly has gathered from near and far, on foot, by bus, by car, by subway, singly and by twos and threes: single people, couples, families. Now that movement is ritualized and made visible in the liturgy's entrance procession.

We are not alone on this journey; Christ is with us. The procession is led by the cross, with the image of Christ upon it. Candles, signs of a living presence, are carried around the cross. Candles also accompany the Book of the Gospels, another sign of Emmanuel, God-with-us. The priest presider is likewise a sign of Christ's presence in our assembly; he will act *in persona Christi*, in the person of Christ, who presides at every Eucharist.

As the procession begins, we stand and sing together in our first act as a community. The joining of our voices begins to turn many into one. The songs we sing range from ancient chants to contemporary hymns, but they have the same purpose, to foster our unity and turn our thoughts to the mysteries we gather to celebrate. We may feel that we can't sing well, but "Christ always invites us to enter into song, to rise above our own preoccupations, and to give our entire selves to the hymn of his Paschal Sacrifice" (USCCB, *Sing to the Lord*, 14).

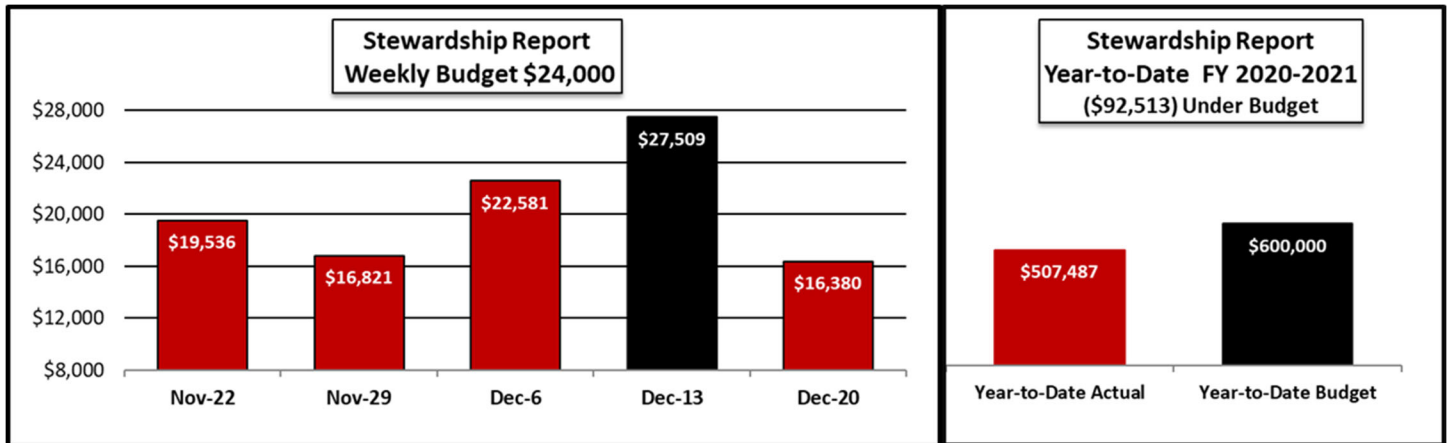
