

Notes from Fr. Bob...

FOURTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

Over the last 60 years or so Israel has invested in large-scale irrigation schemes that have helped to make parts of the desert into farmland. However, the greater bulk of the country is still very harsh and unforgiving. It is in these semi-desert areas that you can often come across a young shepherd with a small flock of sheep. There are no fields rich in green grasses here. An untrained eye may occasionally spot a small stream that disappears within a few feet of its tiny source. In this forbidding environment the shepherd and his sheep eke out their existence.

After a while you notice another difference from our own country's landscape. There are no sheepdogs. The shepherd doesn't have a vast flock to steer from place to place. He has only a small flock that he leads from one grazing ground to the next. The shepherd will strike off in the direction of food and simply call to his sheep. Because the sheep trust in him for their very lives they follow him and find nourishment and safety.

In the time of Jesus things were not very different from the shepherds in Israel today. The sheep depended utterly upon the shepherd for their protection and for food. The shepherd and his whole family were dependent upon the sheep for their economic security and the supply of the basic essentials for life. They could not afford to let someone who does not care for the sheep, or for them, look after the flock – the sheep and the shepherd were bound together for survival.

In today's Gospel Jesus is speaking to the Pharisees and the religious leaders of Israel. In the description of the good shepherd and the hired hand he is describing the flaws in their understanding of leadership. The Pharisees and the scribes behave as though they are temporary shepherds hired from an agency – they fulfill their duties but they will not have any lasting commitment to the people they are responsible for. When the duties become too onerous or dangerous they will abandon their post and their flock. They are very keen to ensure that the people in their charge are educated in the ways of the law and religious duty. However, they are not so keen to bandage the wounded or carry the weary.

In contrast with the Pharisees, the Good Shepherd, Jesus himself, is faithful and will offer up his own life for the sake of the sheep. Those who hear his voice know that he is trustworthy and that he will lead them to safety and nourishment. Just as God has been the shepherd of Israel from generation to generation Jesus now assumes this role for the new Israel. This is a costly road for Jesus; he will lead his flock to Calvary and through death to the glory of resurrection. We are now part of this flock and we also will travel the same road – through death to the glory of resurrection.

Good
Shepherd
Sunday is often

portrayed in rather fluffy terms. The image of Jesus holding a lamb tenderly in his arms is the dominant picture. Yet, it may perhaps be more appropriate to rename today: "Are you a good shepherd Sunday?" For me, and for all who are preachers, teachers or leaders in the Church, today's scripture readings challenge us deeply. They force us to reflect on our motives and behavior. Am I, are we, truly serving those to whom God has called us or have we fallen into the trap of selfishness and self-importance that the Pharisees succumbed to?

It is my prayer that I will be a good shepherd among you: one who encourages rather than chides; one who bandages rather than hurts; one who is faithful in serving rather than looking for my own advantage. Yet, this day is not simply a challenge for me and others commissioned to lead in the Church. It is for each one of us to look into our hearts and judge the generosity of our service to the people around us. Each one of us is called to lead others to the gracious mercy of God. Like the shepherds in Israel today we do not do this by herding or forcing them along. We live lives of such self-evident joy and holiness that others can trust that we are leading them in the path of life eternal. Jesus, our Good Shepherd, give us the grace we need gently to lead those whom we love and work with to your heavenly kingdom. Amen. Alleluia!

MUSIC MINISTRY

Last week's Canticle offered background regarding the organ music we have been experiencing during the Easter season. As promised, this week we have the opportunity to share with you some bio information provided by our two organists, Kelly Dobbs-Mickus and Catherine (aka Cathy) Hlavacek. Enjoy!

Kelly Dobbs-Mickus (8:45 a.m. Mass)

I have been serving Catholic parishes in the Chicago and Joliet dioceses as a music minister since the 1980s, currently as Director of Music at St. Edmund Parish in Oak Park. I was introduced to music via piano lessons at age 6, but it was my involvement in the children's choir at St. Barbara in Brookfield that got me interested in playing the organ. I studied organ during junior high and high school, then at Indiana University in Bloomington, and I ultimately received a bachelor's degree in organ performance from DePaul University, Chicago, in 1989.

It seems that the church music profession chose me, rather than the other way around. When a youngster shows some promise as an organist, there are many mentors around to encourage her to pursue that as a career! I also have a long career as a music editor, having worked for GIA Publications in Chicago for many years, and now MorningStar Music in St. Louis.

It was my time at Our Lady of Mt. Carmel Church in Chicago (2010–2020) that allowed me a deeper dive into playing more serious organ and choral repertoire; I found the many practice hours a real enjoyment and was glad to catalog all the new music I was learning. Other parishes I've served: St. Joseph in Downers Grove (where I got to know Cathy Hlavacek) and St. John of the Cross in Western Springs (where I got to know Karen Ziembra).

I live in La Grange with my husband Jeff, who occasionally plays trumpet for Masses at St. Cletus. I am glad for the opportunity to play for you, and to help make this Easter season one filled with joy!

Catherine (Cathy) Hlavacek (5:00 p.m. and 10:30 a.m. Masses)

I currently live in Wheaton with my husband, two sons, and my cat.

I became interested in playing the piano prior to the organ because I had a kindergarten teacher who played the piano. I started formal piano lessons at age 9. I began accompanying some of the weekday masses when I was in 5th grade at my childhood parish, St. Joseph's in Downers Grove, where I also attended school. Weekend masses followed, and I soon transitioned to organ playing with private lessons. I became the regular accompanist at the 9 am mass during my high school years.

I was undecided about my major when I began college at Saint Mary's in Winona, MN. After encouragement from the music department faculty, I pursued a degree in piano performance. I later received a Master's degree in Instruction and taught comprehensive music in Palatine, IL. I have continued to play

at St. Joseph's parish, accompanying the choir for many years. Until recently, I taught classroom music at a private school in Wheaton.

I am thrilled to play at St. Cletus and am touched by the warm reception from the parish staff, cantors, and parishioners.

WHAT'S HAPPENING IN RELIGIOUS EDUCATION?

In today's Gospel we hear one of the famous I AM statements from Jesus. I am the Good Shepherd. Teaching children about Jesus as the Good Shepherd can be a little challenging these days. Most of us have never seen a Shepherd, nor a flock of sheep. There are no grazing areas around LaGrange! Back in biblical times, shepherds were more plentiful, and everyone knew what a shepherd was and could easily understand Jesus' ideas when he used them in parables and teachings.

Some children have seen sheep at the zoo, a farm, or a petting zoo. If you ask a child what they know about sheep, they might say they are used for wool or meat, and that they are dirty and smelly. These are all true statements. Sheep are not intelligent animals. Sheep don't think for themselves. They just follow other sheep who seem to be in charge. This means that sheep will even follow other sheep right over the edge of a cliff without another thought. Another interesting fact about sheep is that they are directionally challenged. The poor things couldn't find their way out of a wet paper bag. If they wander off from the flock and shepherd, it's hard, if not impossible, for them to get back on their own. The shepherd has to come and find them.

When Jesus says he is the Good Shepherd, it implies we are the sheep – dirty with sin, with messy lives, and with the nature to follow others blindly into trouble or bad choices. There may be times we go so far off in the wrong direction, we might never find our way back. Sometimes we are so eager to fit in, to be cool or liked that we do or say things that other people do or say without even thinking about it. It is very important for us to think through our actions and words and even our beliefs. This is where Jesus comes in – the Good Shepherd!

Jesus, our good shepherd, sacrifices his life for ours. Sheep are dirty, dumb, directionless and defenseless. We too, are full of dirty sin, we make wrong choices instead of trusting and following Jesus, we easily get lost, and there is nothing we can do to protect or save ourselves. Without our good shepherd, we will die. The wolves, or temptations and sin, come in and threaten to kill us, but then Jesus our good shepherd steps in and dies in our place. He did this out of love for each and every one of us. He is truly the Good Shepherd.

The Easter Season is a time of joy and new beginnings. It is fitting that we also celebrate First Communion celebrations during this season. Please keep our 100 young children in your prayers over the next two weeks as they join us for the first time at the Table of the Lord.



RESPONDING TO THE CALL

Do we truly know the voice of Christ? Do we truly respond to the voice of our shepherd with our own distinctive voice? How often we attempt to imitate those around us, appropriating the response of another member of the flock to Christ. Perhaps we need to balance the image of being sheep of one flock with the image from the second reading, which tells us that we are all children of God. What child has precisely the same interaction with parents as his or her siblings? Instead, they frequently do and say things to distinguish themselves in the eyes of their parents.

Whether we use the image of children or of sheep to understand our relationship with Christ, we believe that we are all known and called by name. With this great gift comes a responsibility: to respond to the call with our own distinctive voice, to take time to discern exactly what our call is, to determine precisely what the will of the Father is for each of us.
