


FEAST OF CHRIST THE KING

Whenever there is change in the structure of power, the rise of a new leadership, a transfer of allegiance, then there usually follows much uncertainty, violence, even war between peoples and states. Usually it is only after much compromise and often a great deal of suffering that people can adapt to a new situation, come to terms with the new reality and begin to live in peace once again.

That's the situation in the first reading. Following the death of King Saul there is a power vacuum. For a while, there are two rival factions: one is led by Saul's weak and ineffective son, Ishbaal, the other by the charismatic leader David. The scene in our first reading comes at a time when the matter has finally been decided: David is acknowledged as king of all the people of Israel. Not only is he God's choice, but all the people and their leaders eventually move over to David's side and acclaim him as king. This brings an end to the bloody divisions within the people and opens the way to security, prosperity and peace. For this, David was remembered as the greatest of all Israel's kings, and over the centuries, the Jewish people looked for a descendant of David – another messiah, a man anointed by God – to restore that unity and peace.

In the gospel, Jesus is mocked on the cross for claiming to be that long-awaited king. The people stand looking at him, uncommitted, not sure what to make of him – not attacking Jesus, but far from acclaiming him. The elders – the leaders of the people – are in no doubt. They, together with the soldiers and one of the criminals, taunt Jesus for claiming to be the Christ, the one chosen by God, the so-called "King of the Jews." Whereas David saved the people from internal division and external threat, Jesus is perceived on the cross to be totally incapable of saving even himself, let alone anyone else.

These taunts are reminiscent of Satan's threefold temptation of Jesus: "If you are the Son of God..." PROVE IT. Jesus refused to use his powers for himself then, to dominate or gain control over people. The Devil would return at an opportune time. This is that time, but again, Jesus refuses the temptation to think of himself. Jesus' way is service. Jesus doesn't use his power to save himself. Rather, he is where he has always been throughout his ministry – in the company of those who are most despised and rejected by others. He is among the outcast, hanging between criminals. And his final act is not to save himself, but to save another – the "penitent thief" – by offering him salvation. In the words of St. Paul, Jesus creates a place for him in his kingdom. That means that he will be with Jesus, for Jesus is the kingdom.



we stand as this struggle between the powers of good and evil goes on? Hopefully, we are not among those who scream for Christ's death. But perhaps we can see ourselves among the people – non-committal, waiting to see what will happen, unable to throw our lot in with Jesus for fear of what his way may cost in our own lives. Surely Luke wants us to be like the good thief, acknowledging our sins, turning to Christ in faith, seeking to belong to his kingdom.

If we belong to his kingdom, there will be certain consequences in our life. Being loyal to him means seeking to serve as he did, being found among the outcasts, in solidarity with the poor, the powerless, the despised. It means offering and receiving forgiveness. It means quite simply being with the Lord. Jesus promised the thief: "Today you will be with me in paradise." Paradise is an ancient term symbolizing the deepest trust and intimacy between a king and his friends. We can be with Christ in the "today" of our own lives: in prayer and the sacraments, in his word, in serving the poor and needy, in the ordinary events of our lives. As today's final prayer tells us: it is by OUR DAILY LIVING OF HIS GOSPEL that we will be brought to THE JOY OF HIS KINGDOM, to enjoy unending intimacy and friendship with Christ.


Veterans Day Celebration



Domestic Abuse: The Epidemic No One is Talking About in Parishes

...Catholics are responding to this dire need, organizing a prayer campaign for domestic abuse victims while trying to spread awareness of the problem and educate clergy on how to properly deal with instances of abuse.

A symposium on domestic abuse took place in July at the Catholic University of America in Washington, D.C., hosted by the university's School of Social Service.

A "toolkit" for fighting domestic abuse has been provided by the Catholics for Family Peace, Education, and Research Initiative, which includes prayers and directions for helping a victim of domestic abuse.

The group is asking everyone to pray at 3 p.m. daily for domestic abuse victims, and have called for a day of prayer on Oct. 28, the feast of St. Jude the Apostle, the patron saint of hopeless cases.

Fr. Chuck Dahm has created a parish-based ministry to combat domestic violence. A key part of his work is simply preaching about it, he says, because it is a widespread problem that hides in plain sight.

There is an "overwhelming lack of recognition that the problem is more frequent, more common than people think," he told CNA. Many priests are completely unaware of cases of it, Fr. Chuck noted, although "there are people in their parishes who are suffering."

"I have gone to 90 parishes in the Archdiocese of Chicago," he said. "And after I preach about it, people walk out of the church and they tell me 'thank you for talking about this. This is long overdue. And my sister, my daughter is in it, or I grew up in it.' And this is so much more common than anybody realizes."

Priests must listen when victims tell them of their abuse they've suffered, he insisted.

"You always have to believe the victim," he said. "Victims do not exaggerate. If anything, they minimalize. So they have to be believed and supported."

In one case, he said, "a victim survivor" told him of how she went to her parish priest, who "was not receptive and said he couldn't do anything to help her."

"Well that's tragic," he said. "She went and told him about the abuse she was suffering. He didn't know how to handle it."

Another problem is when some priests tell an abuse victim

to go to marriage counseling with her husband – which "is not appropriate," Fr. Chuck noted. "She needs domestic violence counseling and he needs perpetrator counseling," he said. "A lot of priests don't know that."





Summary of the Parish Financial Report

- The parish finished the June 30, 2016 fiscal year with an operating income (the shaded line of the Statement of Revenue and Expense) of \$38,370.
- The parish's Sunday, Christmas and Easter collections for the year ended June 30, 2016 decreased by a total of \$5,094 from the prior year ended June 30, 2015.
- Combined parish and school salaries and benefits increased by \$157,789 in 2016 due to increased premiums health insurance premiums and contracted salary increases.
- Ordinary maintenance and repairs for the church, school and rectory decreased by \$27,975 in 2016.
- Increased parish and school family participation contributed toward \$212,860 of school fundraising revenue in 2016.
- The Fall Fest/Carnival was a huge success netting a profit of over \$82,000, allocated approximately \$50,000 for the school and the \$30,000 for the new Parish Center building campaign.
- The required parish support to the school in 2016 was \$186,212 a decrease from 2015 of \$31,411.
- Building Campaign Fund revenue received during 2016 was \$535,005 and expenses of \$279,909. Because building fund activity is not part of the parish's normal operations, it is not considered in determining the parish's operating income, but rather considered Other Revenue.
- During the year ended June 30, 2016, the parish's investment accounts had net unrealized loss of \$(12,543). Because investment gains and losses are not part of the parish's normal operations, they are not considered in determining the parish's operating income but rather considered Other Revenue.
- In 2015 an \$805,540 donation was received representing a bequest that a generous parishioner left to the school endowment. During the fiscal year ending June 30, 2016 the donation funded school building capital improvements amounting to \$91,035, which included major projects such as roof repairs, new sidewalks, 2nd floor windows, a/c units, and abatement and replacement of classroom and hallway ceilings.






