

I encourage you to ponder, reflect, and share your own point of view of procreation with someone you love. Acknowledging and celebrating our blessings, our parish will be hosting a few important communal and spiritual celebrations this month. A letter from the Associate Pastor's Desk

"I came so that they might have life." (John 10:10b)

Every year, the Church celebrates October as Respect Life Month. This year is no exception. Recently, Cardinal Cupich sent a thought-provoking letter to the priests of the Archdiocese, stating that Pope Francis has chosen the above quotation from St. John's gospel as this year's theme -- "I came so that they might have life." (John 10:10b) The actual end to that quotation is also important "...and have it more abundantly." (John 10:10c) Not to criticize the Pope by any stretch. I'm just stating a fact.

When October rolls around, the churches around the world light up with images of babies in the womb. Yes, babies. Children that, if they are allowed to be born into the world and experience things that you and I have throughout our lives, have gifts from God and may turn out to be the most intelligent human being who develops a cure for certain cancers that have not yet been explored or discovered. Yet, we are all aware that, sadly, abortion continues to happen. But babies are not the only group of people affected by the principles of Respect Life.

Each day, somewhere in the world, a hospitalized person who is terminally ill, is taken off of life support without their permission. Someone else decides that their quality of life will never improve and they still suffer. So, that someone else decides to "pull the plug" (using a colloquialism). It's what the Church has referred to as euthanasia. And no matter what the

situation, without proper documentation (i.e. a legally signed "Do Not Resuscitate" order by a competent authority), no one has that right.

The most controversial life issue is probably Capital Punishment (i.e. the Death Penalty). Someone on the proverbial "death row" is still a human being. Does someone who has committed heinous crimes against another human being deserve to die at the hands of yet another human being? While emotions in many cases like these run high, it still doesn't constitute the right of even a legal authority to make that decision to end another's life. It's gone on for decades and centuries. "An eye for an eye," right? Nope. "Thou shall not kill" still applies in this instance.

Yet, these issues are not the end of the story. Probably one of the newest issues in the media is human trafficking. While trafficking doesn't tend to necessarily END someone's life, it still diminishes a person to a simple object "undeserving" of respect for being human. Deportation is another example of how others are treated for being no less human, yet "undeserving" of the respect every person is given being made in the image and likeness of God. Go back in your studies to The Story of Creation in the book of Genesis. Yep. It's THAT old and THAT fundamental.

Respect Life. It's not supposed to be limited to the month of October. It's every day. It's the reason Jesus came – to restore our original dignity with God.



XXVII Sunday in Ordinary Time (B) Reflection By Deacon Franco Foti

The above pericope comes from today's Gospel, which the Order of Baptism of Children also suggests as a reading. I proclaim it often, as it reminds me of how precious our children are and how they are a wonderful gift from God. Jesus invites us to model our lives after children, valuing their innocence and purity.

There is a long-standing Mexican tradition of "presenting" a child to the temple. It is an act of thanksgiving for a child who is 40 days old or three years old. The Presentation of a Child is a ritual in honor of the Virgin Mary's presentation at the temple at the age of three and the Presentation of the Baby Jesus in the temple 40 days after Christmas. The child is dressed in a gown or elegant suit and is accompanied by parents and godparents. At this ceremony, we remember the baptism of the child (if already baptized) and the commitment parents and godparents made at the time, who are encouraged to move forward as the child grows in mind, body, and spirit. It is also a celebration of the child's innocence and purity, which Jesus tells us to imitate.

"Let the children come to me; do not prevent them, for the kingdom of God belongs to such as these." (Mk 10:14)

Our responsibility to bring children to Jesus is not limited to specific occasions. As we reflect on this passage from Mark, we should consider how we are all part of the lives of children. Perhaps children were a top priority at some point in our lives, but now that they are grown, they are not so much. However, we should always be prepared to treat all children with respect and kindness, showing them the love of Christ in the way we interact with them. If we're going to be people who bring children to Jesus, then we need to be prepared for the unexpected. Children will often surprise us when it comes to matters of faith. They may ask tough questions we never had to answer before. Or they may show maturity in faith that we had not expected. We should be ready to support and guide them through these moments. When the unexpected happens, we would do well to remember this story in Mark. It serves as a guiding principle, reminding us that we'll never be too far off if we're seeking to bring children to Jesus.




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
