## Notes from Fr. Bob...


#### 3<sup>RD</sup> SUNDAY OF LENT 2016

A family crisis you might call it. It was nothing very serious, but quite fascinating, all the same. What had happened was that when Mother went to the cake pan she found all but one slice of chocolate cake had disappeared. The children protested that they knew nothing about it – and that included Michael, whose upper lip was still adorned with a chocolate-colored moustache. What upset the mother was not her youngest son's "crime"; she could understand that and was only too ready to forgive. What grieved her was his refusal to own up. If only he'd done that and said he was sorry, then of course all would be forgiven and the happy family atmosphere would be restored.

Of course it isn't only little boys who find it hard to own up, and yet owning up to our sinfulness is an essential part of being a Christian. In fact from the beginning of his public ministry Jesus is constantly urging people to repent, to amend their lives; and it is a call we frequently hear during Lent. However, there's always the danger that it will be taken as a threat rather than a loving invitation. Worse still, it may even be taken to mean that God is threatening to get his own back upon those who won't repent, by visiting them with terrible calamities. For example, a young couple loses their first born child in tragic circumstances. The priest, who calls on the young mother's parents - both "good" Catholics - to offer sympathies, is astounded to hear them murmur: "But you know Father, Angela and Bill didn't go to Mass". So that's why the tragedy happened? What were they trying to say?

In today's gospel, when it is reported that Pilate has engineered the massacre of some people while they were offering sacrifice, Jesus is quick to respond that it did not mean they were worse sinners than anyone else. And the same, he added, applied to that building accident in which eighteen people lost their lives. He rejects outright any notion that there is an equation between suffering and sinfulness; still more he repudiates false ideas about God: the God he speaks about is not out to punish bit rather to help us to do what is in our own best interest.

A sensitive awareness of sin in my life, a recognition that I fall short of my high calling as a son or daughter of God is not indulging in some kind of neurosis but rather facing up to reality; and that is a blessing, provided that it is accompanied by an awareness of God's abiding love for me, his readiness to forgive, whatever my failures.



God's forgiveness: for example, the Eucharist, an act of contrition, or a service of kindness to others. But at this time it might be worth considering making the sacrament of reconciliation part of our Lenten exercises. The sacrament is not some terrible burden imposed upon us, but a unique privilege offered us, an opportunity to confess before an official representative of the Church that we have failed in this way or that, for after all, our sins harm not only ourselves but also the Church. It is the sacrament in which we meet Jesus as friend of sinners, rather as we meet him in the Eucharist as Bread of Life. and receive the assurance that our sins are forgiven. It is an opportunity for us to show that we take sin seriously, as God takes it seriously. Above all it's an opportunity to show we really do believe on the one hand in the utter holiness of our God and on the other in his endless mercy and compassion. The true center of this sacrament is the

Today's gospel ends with the story of the barren fruit tree. The vinedresser pleads for time. He asks that it be given another chance; if that fails, then perhaps there'll be no option. And the moral of the story is? Though the compassion of our God has no end, our opportunities of benefiting from it cannot last for ever.

And, let me repeat, that is not a threat but a word of loving advice. May God's Mercy and Compassion be yours through Repentance this Lent.

## **Jubilee Year of Mercy**

#### **FEBRUARY 28**

Pope Francis wants "Twenty-four Hours for the Lord," around-the-clock availability of the sacrament of reconciliation, implemented worldwide this Friday and Saturday. Celebrated with his oft-recommended "tenderness," the sacrament is "a source of true interior peace," says Francis, enabling people "to touch the grandeur of

mercy with their own hands" (Misericordiae God's Vultus, 17). In Luke's Gospel, Jesus warns us against judging others. Focus instead, Jesus says, on deepening or restoring—our own relationship with God, for during this Lenten springtime that Master Gardener can use even life's manure (the parable's "fertilizer") to coax fresh fruit from a tree that seems hopelessly barren—us! Parishes preparing catechumens may choose John's Gospel, which likewise cautions against judging. Imagine what the Samaritan woman's lifelong neighbors thought of her multiple relationships. But by discovering Jesus, then sharing her good news-and Jesus-with those very neighbors, she whom they had probably judged quite sinful became instead their evangelist and "missionary of mercv." —Peter Scagnelli, Copyright © J. 

to society, and serves to perpetuate abuse through learned patterns of behavior.

**Myth**: Most of the time, domestic violence is not really that serious.

**Fact**: Domestic violence is an illegal act in the U.S. and is considered a crime with serious repercussions. Although there are aspects of domestic violence (e.g., emotional, psychological, spiritual abuse) that may not be considered criminal in a legal sense, serious and long-lasting physical, emotional and spiritual harms can, and often do, occur. Each and every act of domestic violence needs to be taken seriously.

**Myth**: Anger management programs are briefer, more cost effective than, and just as successful as certified batterer intervention programs.

**Fact**: Although briefer and less expensive than certified batterer intervention programs, anger management programs are not effective to address the deep-rooted issues of batterers.
