Notes from Fr. Bob...

SECOND SUNDAY OF EASTER DIVINE MERCY SUNDAY

In its original form, John's gospel concentrates the stories of the resurrection and the gift of the Holy Spirit into one chapter. Then, as if it were by popular request, John tags on another final chapter, with further supportive resurrection experiences.


The summary of the earlier chapter offers concise points of reflection on the risen Lord. To appreciate them fully we have to read them against the background of the whole gospel, for their significance has already been traced for us by John in the body of the gospel text. John's gospel, more self-evidently than the synoptic gospels, is imbued throughout with the presence of the risen Lord.

The two themes which dominate today's gospel reflect the usual Johannine pattern of gift and response. Jesus appears as the bringer of peace and the giver of the Holy Spirit. What is asked in response from his followers is faith as the indispensable channel for the new life in the Spirit.

Throughout the gospel Jesus has illustrated through signs and teaching his special relationship with the Father, a relationship which enables him to bring people into a new way of living. He is recognized now in his gift of peace and in his life-giving wounds. The disciples are filled with joy at seeing him, and he empowers them with the Holy Spirit, who will enable them to forgive sins and remove the blindfolds we put on ourselves.

The story of Thomas shows how difficult this can be if Jesus does not show himself to us. John uses this story of doubt to end his gospel with a reminder of the great need for faith. It is such faith that will enable the persecuted early Christians to discover true life in the presence of the Lord.

We can find many blocks on the path to accepting the new life of the risen Lord. There is lack of faith which dulls our perception, preventing us from seeing God's power working through us and in his world. There is sin, depression, sometimes even despair. There is our heavy investment in secular preoccupations and our failure to make the links between them and the divine life which can be celebrated in them.



It is openness of mind and heart, nourished by prayer, the sacraments and our fellowship with other believers which allow us to discern God's love at work in us and in the world. Just as the risen Lord is recognized through his gift of peace and through his wounds, so we too express our faith through the giving and receiving of peace and through the living out of our own woundedness and vulnerability.

Divine Mercy Sunday

Today the church celebrates God's endless Mercy in our lives. Let us be grateful on this special day for God's abundant love and his desire that we experience his Mercy in our relationship with him each day. May we all look to God's Divine Mercy and become instruments of that Mercy in the world around us. A Mercy filled with God's love, compassion, forgiveness, understanding and charity.




Panel Discussion on "How I Landed My New Job"



JUBILEE YEAR OF MERCY REFLECTION: DIVINE MERCY SUNDAY

Last year on this Sunday, Pope Francis

declared this year a Jubilee Year of Mercy. Saint John Paul II named the Second Sunday of Easter "Sunday of Divine Mercy" in response to Saint Faustina Kowalska's Divine Mercy spiritual devotion. which offered comfort to hearts worldwide. But Francis challenges us to make that comfort we receive a gift we gladly share: "We are called to show mercy because mercy first been shown to us." The clearest expression of merciful love, says Francis, is pardoning others. "At times how hard it seems to forgive!" he acknowledges. "And yet pardon is the instrument placed into our fragile hands to attain serenity of heart" (Misericordiae Vultus, 9). The necessary condition for living joyfully? "To let go of anger, wrath, violence, and revenge." May Divine Mercy Sunday in this Jubilee Year of Mercy remind us that Jesus made mercy our life's ideal and a criterion for our faith's credibility: "Blessed are the merciful, for they will be shown mercy" (Matthew 5:7).



At every mass, a miracle occurs when the bread and wine are transformed into the body and blood of our Lord Jesus Christ through transubstantiation, but the bread and wine retain the physical characteristics of bread and wine. throughout history, Jesus has on many occasions made his body and/or blood visible in the Eucharist.

Early in the history of Christianity, one of the Desert Fathers wrote about a monk who doubted the Real Presence in the Eucharist. When his disbelief was challenged by two priests, the monk told them that he wouldn't believe until he saw it with his own eyes. A week later, an angel and a Child appeared at the altar during consecration. The angel pierced the Child with a sword, and blood ran into the chalice.


In 2001 in India, Father Johnson Karoor witnessed the exposed Blessed Sacrament physically changing, and the image of a human face soon appeared.

In between those nearly 2,000 years, countless people claim to have witnessed Eucharistic miracles. Of those that have been investigated and approved by the Catholic Church, 140 are featured in "The Vatican International Exhibition: Eucharistic Miracles of the World". We hope you will be able to attend the exhibit. Do you know Jesus' blood type? Look at the sample poster from the exhibit that is next to the library cart to find out the answer.

Second Sunday of Easter Divine Mercy Sunday

JOINING THE COMPANY OF BELIEVERS

What will help you to believe? Today's scripture readings tell of faith and doubt. They offer stories "recorded to help you believe," as the passage from John's Gospel (20:31) remarks today. There is an urgency about this. On this Second Sunday of Easter we are challenged to join the company of believers—countless men and women who witnessed the power of the apostles' faith.

There is no doubt that this power comes from Jesus Christ. The second reading, from the book of Revelation, reports John's mystical vision of the Son of Man, who proclaims, "Once I was dead, but now I live" (Revelation 1:18). The Gospel gathers everyone but Thomas to see the Risen Jesus and receive the Holy Spirit from him. Like Thomas, we who have come along later must have faith so that we can have life.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

We return to our reflections on the rites of marriage with a brief consideration of reforms from the Council of Trent. When the Protestant Reformation took hold, the fairly recent achievements of the Church in regard to the sacrament of marriage were reviewed with a critical, reforming eye. In general, Protestants returned to an earlier view that marriage was a civil matter, although some said that the civil society had to be in harmony with Christian teaching. In the Catholic Church, the Council of Trent took the question up in 1563, and decided to shore up its teaching on the sacramentality of marriage. They identified many threats to this, including secret marriages and easy divorce. So they enacted laws that still govern our practice today: to be valid, marriage consent must be exchanged in the presence of a priest and two witnesses. Ever since Trent, marriages must also be announced three weeks in advance to the community, and recorded in a register. In some places in the world, the "banns" are still posted in the public square. In the United States, parishes sometimes publish the "banns" in the bulletin.

Anyone who has ever watched a soap opera has seen the standard scene of a minister announcing gravely, "If there is anyone here present who sees any reason why these two should not be married . . ." This bit of drama has no place in the Catholic liturgy, but survives among Protestants who broke with us before Trent edited this cliff-hanger out of our public prayer.


