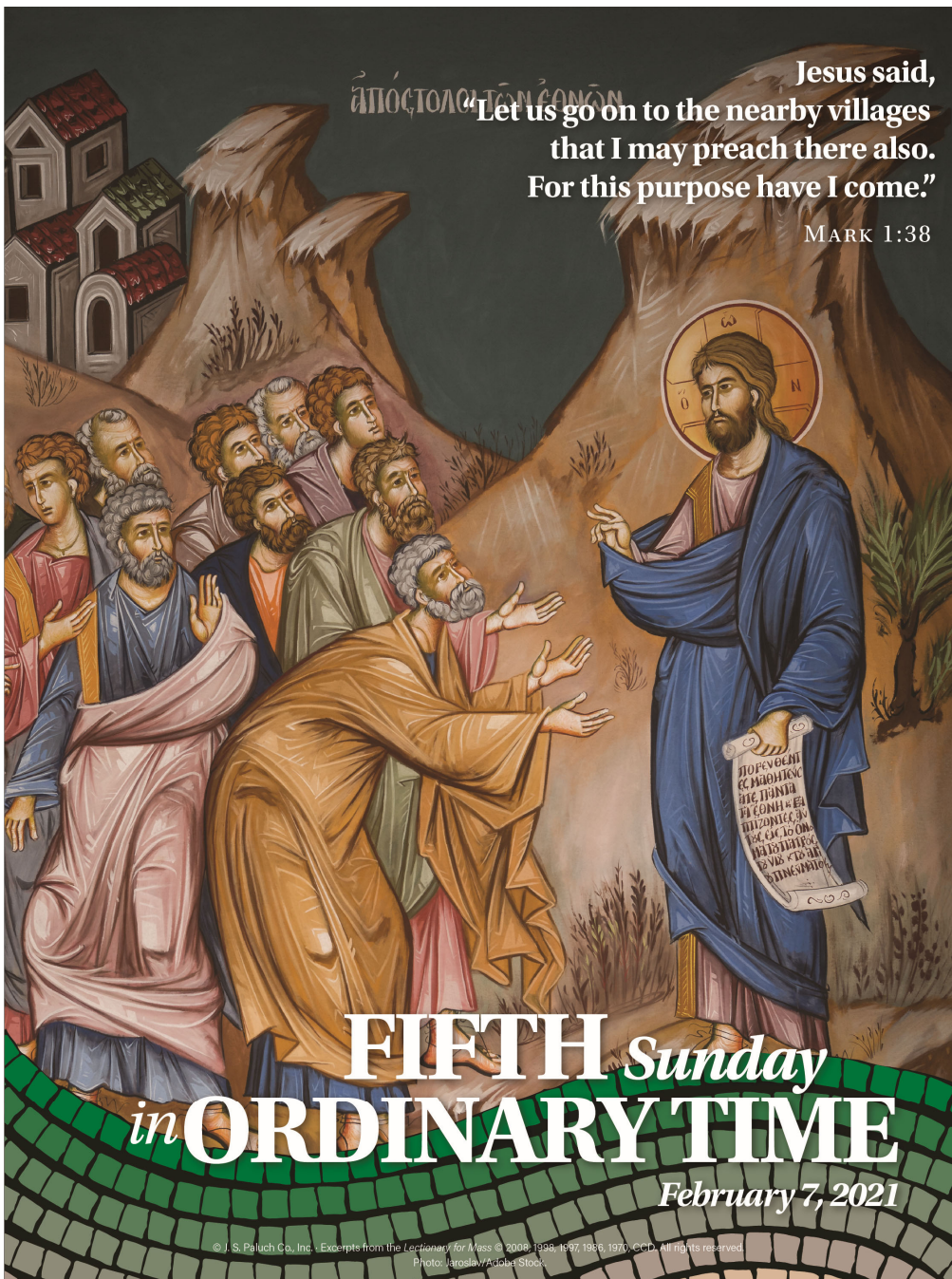

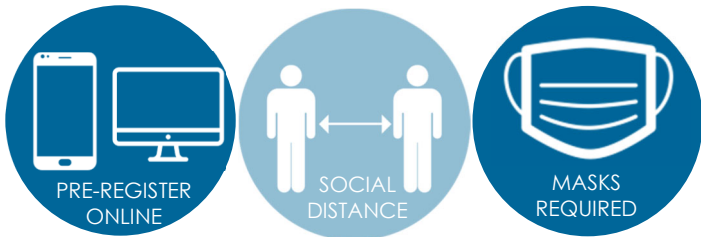

## Notes from Fr. Bob...

### 5<sup>TH</sup> SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Is it sheer misery and loneliness that drives the leper in today's Gospel towards our Lord? No doubt he's heard rumors of Jesus' kindly way with the sick and his extraordinary ability to cure them. Well, now that ability will really be put to the test.

The leper sinks down on his knees; he's desperate. "If you want to," he murmurs, "you can cure me." Jesus, we're told, is deeply moved. He's filled with pity or, as some scholars translate, with anger – not of course at the man, but at his disease and its dreadful consequences. In any event, he does what is unthinkable: he stretches out his hand and touches the leper, thereby incurring ritual defilement himself. But how precious that touch is to the leper! It constitutes a breakthrough, a new beginning; he's no longer isolated; at last there's someone who cares for him enough to risk catching his loathsome disease. And then the incredible words which are the passport back to a normal life: "Of course I want to. Be cured." And in that instant the leprosy leaves him.

The healing of leprosy was said to be as difficult as raising the dead. But Jesus accomplishes this apparently impossible task effortlessly. He now asks the cured leper to go at once to report his cure to the priests, and say nothing to anyone in the meantime. That really is asking the impossible. Jesus doesn't want people to seek him simply as a wonder-worker, yet there is surely an understanding smile on his face when he hears that the man is sharing his story with anyone who will listen.

Jesus' touch was important for the leper but it's also important for us. It's one of those actions that speak louder than words, an action which shows that the Lord is inclusive, not exclusive; he draws people towards him, doesn't send them away; he's not unduly concerned about political correctness.

If, as Paul urges in today's second reading, we are to take Jesus as our model, we need to ask ourselves how we treat today's lepers, those who are marginalized. How, for example, do we react to ex-prisoners or even to the innocent families of those in prison? Do we pass by those referred to as "unfortunates" as though they didn't exist? How do we as a community behave towards the divorced and remarried; do we make them feel unwanted? Are we racist, even in our thoughts? Can we find it in our hearts to pray, or experience a shred of sympathy, for the real outsider, such as the pedophile? It's not a question of saying that anything goes but rather of ensuring that we exclude no one from our loving concern.

Some years ago a woman noticed that one of her colleagues, an alcoholic who had got drunk and made an



exhibition of herself at an office party, was now being shunned by everyone. She determined to speak to her. All she could say was: "You're not invisible to me, anyway." But for the woman who'd been treated like a leper, it was – well, a kind of little miracle. And we too have it in our power, the power that comes to us through our contact with Jesus at Mass, to work similar little miracles for the outcasts of our world. .

## FOOD PANTRY

### New: Food Depository Prepared Meals Program

We are thrilled to have been chosen to participate in this pilot program with the Greater Chicago Food Depository (GCFD). These meals are prepared by students in the GCFD Community Kitchen Job Training Program. All meals are single serving frozen meals for added convenience to clients. A sample menu of current meals is below:

- Beef Meatballs/Potatoes/Green Beans
- Chicken Drumstick/Carrots/Mixed Veggies
- Chicken Fajita/Lima Beans/Rice
- Beef Burger/Sweet Potato Fries/Peas
- Beef Polish/Tater Tots/Lima Beans
- Ravioli with Marinara/Corn/Peas
- Sweet & Sour Chicken/Mashed Potatoes/Carrots

### Returning Program: USDA Farmers to Families Food Box Program

We've been participating in this program, since Spring 2020 until it ended. Through this program, USDA is partnering with national, regional and local distributors, whose workforces have been significantly impacted by the closure of restaurants, hotels and other food service businesses, to purchase up to \$6 billion in fresh produce, dairy and meat products from American producers of all sizes. Distributors package these products into family-sized boxes, then transport them to food banks, community and faith-based organizations, and other non-profits serving Americans in need. The boxes off high quality items. While the contents can change, in each box we currently expect to receive:

- 5lbs. potatoes
- 3lbs. onions
- 4lbs. oranges
- 1 gallon milk
- 1lb. cheddar cheese
- 2lbs. yogurt
- 4lbs. chicken leg quarters
- 1lb. chicken hotdogs

This is in addition to the meat, dairy, produce, and non-perishable items we already provide.

## LENTEN OUTREACH

As we prepare for Easter, we partner with Catholic Relief Services (CRS) to reach out and serve others through the Rice Bowl program. We will have Rice Bowls available at Masses February 13-14. You do not need to pick up a Rice Bowl to participate this year! You can still collect funds on your own and donate them directly to Catholic Relief Services! More info to come.

## **...PRINCIPAL POROD'S REFLECTION FROM THE WEEKEND OF JANUARY 30/31**

The theme for National Catholic Schools Week 2021 is "Catholic Schools: Faith. Excellence. Service."

In our Gospels the sacred writings indicate that Jesus was able to share his message by teaching the apostles and His many followers. He needed to get His message of salvation and everlasting life out to the small crowds or the large crowds that he called in a variety of ways to follow Him. In today's Gospel according to Mark, it mentioned that Jesus entered the synagogue and taught His followers even when He was twelve years old. Sometimes Jesus instructed small crowds or even large crowds sharing His teachings by going on a small boat out on the water so that the large crowds gathered on the land would be able to see and hear Him. He created his own classrooms or lecture halls.

All of us continue to share our Catholic Faith with others by being teachers of the Gospel. More specifically, our teachers at St. Cletus pass on our Catholic faith through our classes being instructed at School. We are so blessed to have a school as part of our overall campus here at St. Cletus. As we teach we do not have to take a small boat out on water to meet the needs of all or our students, we are able to instruct in a beautiful school with a rich history and a tradition of educational excellence. Our classrooms are designed a little differently this year as we continue to deal with the current pandemic. Students desks are appropriately spaced from one another, everyone is wearing a mask, student's temperatures are checked upon entering the school, hand sanitizers are used by the students, and students remain in the same room for most of the day. Our student's vocabulary as well as their way of life has increased this year with words like Covid 19, virus, pandemic, social distancing, disinfectant and the constant wearing of facial masks.

With all of the safety measures in place, our teachers continue to offer excellent educational opportunities for all students. Students continue to be instructed in their core academic subjects including the fine arts, computers, Spanish class, and physical education. Teachers have increased the utilization of technology in the classroom as a method for students to learn both at home and in school. Who would have imagined that someday students would be instructed either at school or at home through a "tv" like device known as a desktop computer, laptop computer, Chromebook, emails, text messages, or how about receiving messages on your own watch.

Our students are surrounded by thoughts of "service" to others. Students will either be practically involved in a food collection drive, create special seasonal cards for individuals in assisted living facilities, collect money for a cause or offer prayers for the less fortunate. Although the service opportunities are somewhat limited this year we are still able to participate in some practical activities and have in depth conversations with our students on how we can as Catholics help make the world a better place.

Sharing the Catholic Faith; striving for Excellence in Education; and stressing the importance of being of Service to others summarizes what is happening at your parish Catholic School.

On a final note, we are so blessed with the amount of land we have here at St. Cletus School which includes: the wonderful facilities from the church, the school, the Parish Center, and the rectory. We would like to thank God for providing all of us with the opportunities that He has given us; we would like to thank all of you for your prayerful and financial support of our school; and we would like to thank Father Bob Clark for his support in doing whatever he is able to from his position as Pastor in promoting and supporting the education of the flock that he leads. Additionally, we are very blessed to have Father Ken Baker, Father Lorenzo Gamboa, and Deacon Stuart Hayes to offer their support as well for our school.

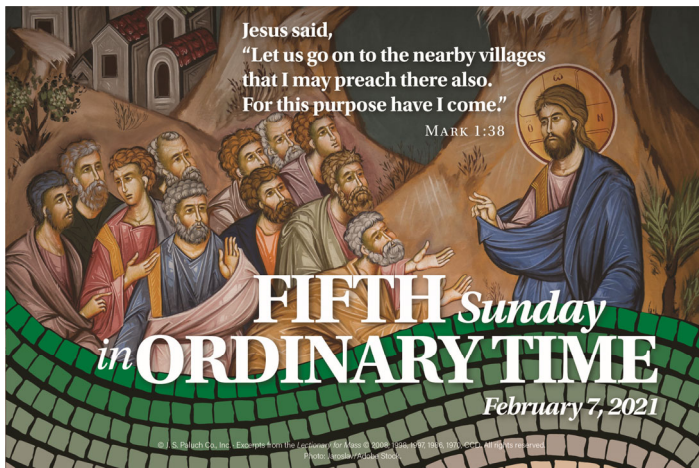

## Sunday Notes



### THE GOOD NEWS

Today's readings begin with a few verses from the book of Job. First, Job complains that his nights drag on endlessly. Then, worse yet, "My days are swifter than a weaver's shuttle; / they come to an end without hope" (Job 7:6). Not exactly encouraging, these lamentations, not when taken alone.

Most of us have been there, though, and the antidote is the "good news" that Paul found so compelling that "an obligation has been imposed on me, and woe to me if I do not preach it!" (1 Corinthians 9:16). Paul felt driven to announce the gospel to as many people as possible, "to save at least some" (9:22).

This good news is the mystery of the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ, who lifted Simon Peter's mother-in-law from her sickbed with a mere touch of his hand. "The whole town was gathered at the door. He cured many who were sick with various diseases, and he drove out many demons" (Mark 1:33-34)). Our woes and demons are as real as Job's, and Jesus is our savior.

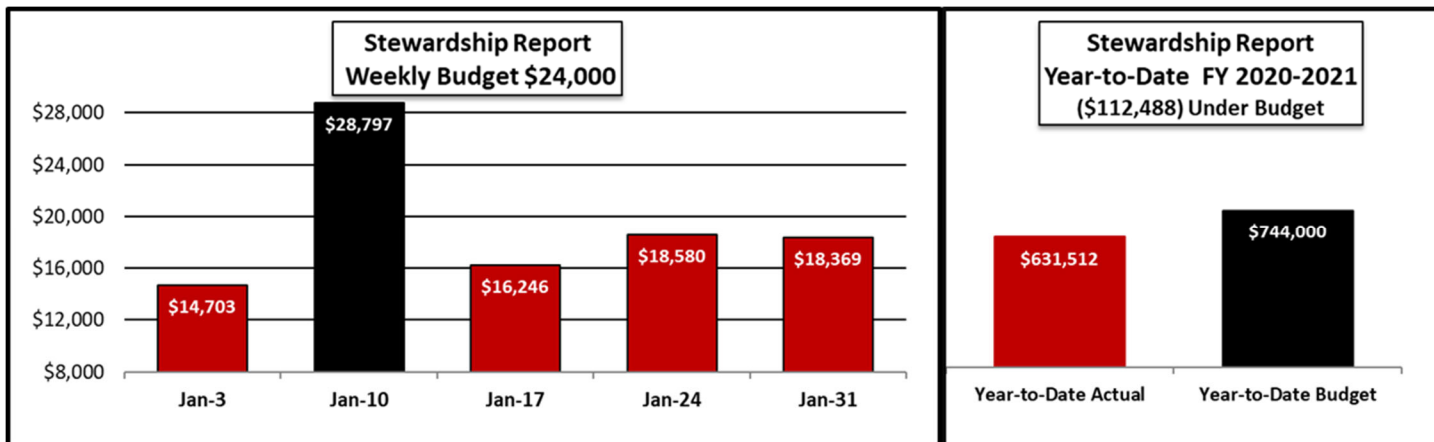
