
15TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

"I hope I'm old before I die." The lyrics of Robbie Williams' hit song reflect the desire of most of us to have a long and full life. A recent scientific survey reported that the secret of a long life is regular churchgoing. The study found that churchgoers have lower blood pressure, suffer less from depression and have stronger immune systems. Apparently, those who regularly attend a place of worship are nearly a third more likely to live longer. No one seems to know quite why this should be so – some think that religious people actually take better care of themselves; others think that the friendship and support which go along with belonging to a church may be part of the reason why religious people live longer. Whatever the reason, it would appear that faith is not only good for the soul but good for the body too.

The lawyer in today's gospel asks that age-old question: what must I do to inherit eternal life? That's not just a question about having a long life or life without end, but is also about a certain quality of life. What must we do to lead a full, fulfilled and truly human life? How do we lead a good life, a happy life? How do we achieve our potential? Faced with the reality of death, how can I ensure that my life has lasting meaning and significance?

The people of Israel faced exactly that question during their wanderings in the desert. They had to decide what was important in their life together and in their relationship with God. God offers them commandments and laws to help them – not impossible ideals ("not beyond your strength or beyond your reach"), but practical guidelines to make their community life peaceful and equitable. These laws also ensure that the people can enjoy a rich and fruitful relationship with God – so that the people can live fully, as God intends. God is not imposing arbitrary rules on the people. His laws are not so much prescriptive as descriptive. God is quite simply telling the people what will lead to a happy, human, full life.

So when the lawyer comes up to Jesus with his question, Jesus simply reminds him of what he already knows. If he wants to live the right quality of life – the kind of life which satisfies the human heart's longing for eternity, for meaning and value – all he needs to do is to follow God's Law: love God and love his neighbor. "Do this and life is yours". But although the lawyer knows the right answer intellectually, he obviously has missed the heart of the law. Because his question, "who is my neighbor?", is



my neighbor, who qualifies as such? The parable of the Good Samaritan reveals that for Jesus, if we are to receive God's gift of eternal life, we need to stop thinking in terms of restrictions and limitations, and start loving as God loves – in an open-ended way. For Jesus a neighbor is never an object, always a subject. I am the neighbor: it is my duty to be a neighbor, to help those in need. That is the way to eternal life.

In our own lives, it is so easy to have the lawyer's attitude – to seek to draw boundaries, to exclude, to restrict, to do the minimum. This is true of our relationship with people, with God, even with ourselves and our own bodies. What do I absolutely have to do and what can I overlook? Who do I have to take notice of and who can I safely ignore? What is the bottom line?

Jesus' answer is simply that the human heart's longing for love and for eternal life is boundless, limitless, because it is made in the image of God himself. And so the only way we are going to be able to satisfy our "eternal longings" is by loving as God loves — inclusively, generously, and even extravagantly. The hallmark of our love is that it should be "with all our heart, with all our soul, with all our strength and with all our mind". Not a closed love, but an open-ended love. Such loving may not guarantee a long life on earth, but that is how Christ — the image of the unseen God — loves. That is how Christians — who are the images of Christ on earth — are called to love too, not by way of prescription or command, but quite simply because that is the only way to inherit eternal life.


The trees have been removed and construction has begun on our new parish center.

Fr. Lorenzo's Notes

THE EUCHARIST AS A HOLY SACRIFICE



During this past school year I had the opportunity to visit our students at our parish school. I was invited to talk about different topics but especially about the Sacraments. In talking about the Eucharist, I explained to our students that the Eucharist or Mass was also called a sacrifice. I told them that in the Old Testament, in the times of the Levites, the Levite priests would take a lamb brought by the penitent and would offer it in sacrifice as a way to clean his sins. And that according to the status in society, the animal was of a bigger size if the person had a bigger responsibility. So I asked them what about if the king had a sin, what kind of animal do you think they would bring to the priest to clean the king's sins? They thought for a moment and finally someone said: "I think that they brought a dinosaur!" Well "no" I said, "dinosaurs were already extinct." We all laughed at that comment.

Now the catechism of the Catholic Church says that the Mass is a "Holy Sacrifice, because it makes present the one sacrifice of Christ the savior and includes the Church's offering. The term Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, "sacrifice of praise," spiritual sacrifice, pure and holy sacrifice are also used," since it completes and surpasses all the sacrifices of the Old Testament.(1330)".

In the New Testament, Jesus is the Lamb of God. During Mass, when the priest elevates the Chalice and the consecrated Host he says: "behold the lamb of God, who takes away the sins of the world. Blessed are those called to the supper of the Lamb. (John: 1-29)."

"When John the Baptist calls Jesus the Lamb "who takes away the sin of the world", therefore, he identifies him not only as the Passover lamb, but also as the long-awaited suffering servant of Isaiah 53 – the Lamb who would offer his life as a sacrifice for sin. How fitting it is that we recite the Lamb of God at this precise moment in the Mass! While the priest breaks the host, the people join John the Baptist in recognizing Jesus as the Servant-Lamb of Isaiah 53 who offers his life a sacrifice for sin. (The Mass, Edward Sri, p. 136)."

Therefore, every time that we approach to receive the Eucharist, let us approach with thankful hearts for the sacrifice of Jesus made on the altar of the Cross. Also, let us remember that receiving the Eucharist produces spiritual fruits in our souls and in our lives. "The principal fruit of communion is an intimate union with Christ Jesus. The Lord said: "He who eats my flesh and dinks my blood abides in me, and I in him. Life in Christ has its foundation in the Eucharistic banquet. (CCC 1391)."

As sacrifice, the Eucharist is also offered in reparation for the sins of the living and the dead and to obtain spiritual and temporal benefits from God. After a good confession, "communion with the Body and Blood of Christ increases the communicant's union with the Lord, forgives his venial sins, and preserves him from grave sin. Since receiving this sacrament strengthens the bonds of charity between the communicant and Christ, it also reinforces the unity of the Church as the Mystical Body of Christ. (CCC 1414-16)."



Sunday Notes

GO AND DO LIKEWISE

Miss Collins, the dean of students at Olympic High School, was past the point of scolding Matt, though she liked him very much. "Four detentions in two weeks are too many."

Still Matt wouldn't tell. It was only after Miss Collins went on a morning neighborhood patrol that she found out the real reason for Matt's tardiness. Thump, thump, thump, came the wheelchair down the stairs. It was Matt, steadying Shawnetta as he helped lower her down the stairs and then push her to the corner bus stop.

"She's a girl in my parish youth group," Matt explained to Miss Collins.

There are many ways to describe Matt's actions—a random act of kindness, making a difference one person at a time. Jesus would understand. When the lawyer correctly identified the good Samaritan as the one who had treated the injured man with compassion, Jesus said simply, "Go and do likewise" (Luke 10:37).

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TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

The first "presbyters" were advisers to the bishops rather than what we would call "priests," yet by the year 1000 our present-day understanding of the ordained priesthood is clearly in place. The Germanic influence was strong in those days, reflected in a series of questions posed to the candidate about his intentions.

The priest's role in the celebration of Mass had by then come to the fore, as the ritual notes that Mass vestments must be worn, the hands of the priest must be anointed with chrism, and a chalice with wine and water and a paten with a host must be given. Up to then, the ordination rite had stressed the presbyter as a collaborator with the bishop and a member of the order of presbyters. Then, in a not-so-subtle shift, the presbyter came to be seen as a "priest" designated to celebrate the Mass and, as the prayer suggests, to touch the chalice. By these days, remember, the cup had long vanished from Communion for the laity. A thousand years ago, today's patterns were already in place. The priest no longer saw himself as a member of a council of elders, a presbytery, and in some dioceses he had little influence over the bishop. Instead, he was either a pastor, with relationship to the eucharistic community in the parish, or he was a priest monk, offering Mass for the salvation of the departed or the intentions of the living.

The St. Cletus Religious Education Office is still looking for volunteers as Catechists and Aides in Grades 1-8 on Sunday Mornings and Monday evenings.



JUBILEE YEAR OF MERCY REFLECTION: FIFTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Could anyone object to Jesus' supreme lesson in mercy, the parable of the Good Samaritan? Jesus' devoutly religious audience certainly did! Scant sympathy for anyone foolish enough to travel crime-ridden "Jericho Highway" alone. Much sympathy for priest and Levite, hurrying to assigned temple ministry, unwilling to risk ritual impurity through hands-on mercy. No sympathy for Jesus' scandalous hero. Samaritans were religious apostates and political enemies. Jesus challenges them and us—to seek God's presence not only in liturgical beauty but in a fellow traveler's self-inflicted misfortunes. See God's presence even in someone outside the law, whose hands-on mercy springs not from religious obligation but from the heart's instinctive goodness. Since Jesus became our "Good Samaritan" despite our foolishness and sins, who are we to ration our mercy? "Who is my neighbor?" (Luke 10:29). The next person we see who needs hands-on mercy! No conditions, no limits, no exceptions. Especially in this Jubilee Year of Mercy, Jesus commands, "Go and do likewise" (10:37).

Ignite is a student-led small group that meets one hour each week over the summer. Groups of college or high school students reflect on a Scripture




