

Notes from Fr. Bob...

THIRTY-FIRST SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

There are some words that we toss into our language with a kind of careless abandon. We give them what often seems to be the meaning of the moment, sometimes weighty, sometimes almost glibly light-hearted.


One of these words is "love". In Nanette Newman's "God is Love" a six-year-old is quoted as saying "I wish they'd change the word love. It's used too much by the wrong people".

What do we say we love? Candy, or football, or hockey, or the book we are reading, or a special song or pop group, or a film star. Some of us say we love Autumn or Spring (a bit higher on the scale those two). We love the company of friends; we love our children and our parents; we love a particular and special person. We fall IN love and we fall OUT of love. It can be an interesting exercise to be aware when, and about when, we use this overcrowded word. We all want, and indeed need, to love and be loved, and we carry a sense of the idea of love even as we struggle to attain it.

Jewish teachers, it seems, were often asked which of the 615 precepts of the Old Testament law was the greatest. In 25 BC a famous Rabbi, Hillel, had said "What you yourself hate, do not do to your neighbor: this is the law. The rest is commentary. Go and learn."

From the question put to Jesus by the scribe, it seemed that the topic was still under discussion, and Jesus takes his place in this rabbinical searching. Refreshingly the scribe who keeps the topic alive with Jesus is neither hostile nor trying to outsmart him. Christ's answer falls into two parts: the first is a direct quote, in rabbinical tradition, from Deuteronomy, today's first reading, though Jesus adds that we should love with all our minds, as well as hearts, souls and strength. The second part would perhaps be less familiar to his questioner. "Love your neighbor as yourself". There were all kinds of rules in Jewish law as to how to treat each other, regulation after regulation. The new word here is "love" and the new thought is the extension of the concept of neighbor. A Jewish neighbor was not the same as a Gentile neighbor, and there was an expectation of different standards of treatment. Are we any different? The "not one of us" syndrome is as prevalent in today's society as it was then.

The questioning scribe understood what was meant. This love, of God and each other, was better than burnt offering or sacrifice. To offer holocaust and sacrifice were two important temple activities, but Christ takes his



Love God with all our hearts, soul, mind and strength... How can we? Do we exclude all other loves? And when our mind seems overwhelmed with a problem, and we cannot stop thinking about someone or something, what then? With all our strength, when we are sick or drained of energy and have no desire to be active? And as for the soul... how does the soul love?

What is this love which holds us in being and to which we must respond? Is it in head or heart; in feeling or will? Perhaps it is in choosing. We choose to keep as close to him as we can; to pray as well as we can; to give him all that we do even if it often goes wrong. All love is part of God's love. He IS love. We can simply want to put him first, and ask him not to let us deny him.

"Love your neighbor as yourself". As if he or she were myself? And that poses the question as to how I do, in fact, love myself. It is hard to love others if we do not feel loveable. If, for reasons in our past or in the present, we dislike what we see in ourselves, or have a crushing sense of unworthiness, how can we love as Christ asks us? There are no glib answers, for self-esteem once lost is hard to recover, and indeed we may need the help of another, whose value of us enables us to see our own. Paradoxically, it is often in recognizing the worth of another person that we find our own.

We ARE valued, of course, each one of us. We are loved, truly loved by Christ himself. He loved his own to the end, and we are his own.

GOD'S LAWS

God's laws are not intended to burden or torment us. Instead they are guideposts that point us in the direction of good living. Accordingly, good living requires loving God and loving one another. We should not follow God's laws out of fear of what might happen if we don't, but rather view them as a foundation for building relationships and trust with one another and with God.

The *Shema* prayer of Orthodox Jews is based on the reading from Deuteronomy today, "Hear, O Israel." Every morning people recite the prayer as a profession of their love for God and pledge their obedience to God throughout the day. They pass on their love of God to their children, from one generation to the next.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

Just two years ago, we engaged in one of the core activities of our democratic system: a presidential election. Actually, the institution of election can be traced to traditions in the Church, and although bishops are no longer chosen in this way, abbots and abbesses (heads of monastic communities) have almost always been elected by full voting members of their communities. The lifetime appointment begins when the monks or nuns are gathered in "chapter" at the death or resignation of the abbot, and fortunately for all involved, campaigning is not allowed! The members of the community discern, with prayer to the Holy Spirit, who among them is the best suited for leadership. Once chosen, the new leader requests the blessing of the local bishop, who usually presides at a ceremony of consecration or investiture. The ballots are always secret, and a simple majority must be achieved.

In our American system the Electoral College is the determining voice in the presidential election, not the popular election on a November Tuesday, just as the monastic chapter is the electorate. Today, most religious orders elect general superiors in "chapter" by delegates of the professed members, and usually for a term of six years. A few, like the Jesuits, elect for life. At least we don't have that weight on our shoulders when we choose a president. Four years at a time will do!

GIVING TREE

Our annual Advent Giving Tree Project--a St. Cletus tradition-- will begin next weekend, November 10-11. Our trees will be filled with names of individuals in need from our sharing parish, St. Agatha's, and from our community. We also ask you to remember your special person(s) in your family's prayers throughout this holy season. Last year our parish made Christmas brighter for over 1800 people!

SOME BIG CHANGES FOR THIS YEAR!

WHITE ENVELOPES (gift cards for food): **NEW THIS YEAR** This year we are offering clients a gift card, based on the size of their household, to purchase food at Walmart or Jewel AND their choice of meat: ham, chicken or turkey. This is in place of the "food baskets" we have done in the past. There are a number of reasons for this change:

- Client Choice: 6 months ago we made big changes in the food pantry. This included switching from pre-packed bags to "client choice". Now, clients are able to shop through the pantry to pick items that work best for their household. Often at pantry and with food baskets, clients would receive items they couldn't eat (for dietary/allergy reasons) or might not like (we ALL have food preferences!) This model honors and respects the dignity and unique needs of each household and we want to continue this model with our Christmas food program. A gift card will allow families to purchase what they are most in need of to help supplement their groceries this time of year.
- Transparency and Fairness: Every year we received such generous donations for food baskets! However, because of how the program was set up we got a wide variety of items back. This means each household walked away with very different baskets, even if they had the same amount of people in the home. These changes will make very clear what each household is receiving and why.
- December Food Pantry: In previous years we closed the food pantry in December. However, now we will continue to have our doors open every Thursday night in December (except 12/27) so clients will still be able to attend and shop for the food they need that month.

How it works: On the trees you will find white envelopes. Each envelope lists a dollar amount. We respectfully request that you purchase cards for the *exact amount* listed on the card and then put the card(s) directly in the envelope. We also ask that you *only purchase cards from Jewel and Walmart*. These have been the preferred stores of our clients and they are also easily accessible via public transportation. Envelopes will need to be turned in by Sunday, December 10th at 12:30pm.

Shop with Scrip Opportunity: For your convenience during the weekends of November 10-11 and 17-18 we will have the St. Cletus School Shop with Scrip available in the Narthex. This is a gift card purchasing program via the school that allows the school to get a percentage of the proceeds as a fundraiser. *It does not cost you anything extra to participate.* They accept cash/check.

GREEN TAGS (food pantry items): The food pantry will continue to be open during the month of December and we still have many donations that we will need! The new green tags list some of our most needed items at this time. If you enjoy purchasing food for those in need and miss the food basket program, this might be a great option for you. Items can be returned at your convenience to the bins in the Church Narthex.

PURPLE TAGS (gifts): Gifts are to be returned before/after Masses the weekend of **December 8-9**. Gifts will be returned to Morrissey Hall using the convenient drop off lane on Stone Ave.! *There is no change to the gift program*.

We invite you to stop in the narthex next weekend to take a tag or two from one of the Giving Trees. We are thankful for your past generosity in purchasing many gifts for the individual(s) you choose. Thank you! Your generosity will provide hope and make a difference in someone's life. God bless you on your Advent Journey!

AREA RESPECT LIFE MINISTRY


Parishioners from St. Cletus, St. Francis Xavier and St. John of the Cross (SJC) will gather to continue

Domestic Violence Outreach - Deacon Stuart Heyes



Dear Friends please find below the text of my homily given at the weekend Oct 27/28 masses.

Thank you for the supportive comments from many following my deliveries. It is a very difficult subject but one that needs our collective effort and support.

May God bless the many victims of Domestic Violence and may the abusers see the error of their ways and get help.

During this month of October - in the Gospel's proclaimed - we heard about The Pharisees quizzing Jesus about adultery, The Rich man asking what must he do to enter the Kingdom of God, and last week James and John asking for places on His right and left.

The Pharisees didn't like His answer, neither did the Rich man, nor did James and John. **Today the lowly Bartimaeus - a blind man -** not important like the Pharisees, or rich like the young man and not a disciple like James and John... **he has his request fulfilled!**

Yes, indeed Bartimaeus asks to "see" but not before he asks Jesus to "have pity on him." In his lowliness and desperate situation, he recognizes Jesus as someone very special. "Son of David" he shouts TWICE, and as a result of his faith, Jesus grants his wish to see.

Bartimaeus took a huge risk shouting out as he did. We heard the crowd told him to be silent. BUT THEN Jesus calls him and he jumps up - "throwing off his cloak" - that cloak was his protection, his bed, his livelihood, the single most critical item to his survival and he throws it the ground!

During the month of October the church asks us to pay particular attention in our communities to Respect Life and Domestic Violence Awareness issues.

In the past I have addressed the church's teaching on the dignity of human life - it is from conception to natural death - and so today I would like to address Domestic Violence in our society.

I think this is so important that I would respectfully ask those of you who use the homily as a time to read the bulletin or catch up on email to desist. PLEASE.

Bartimaeus approaching Jesus and asking for pity and his sight resonated with me because a few weeks ago I attended a Domestic Violence meeting here in the Parish Center. We watched a very moving and disconcerting video and then heard from a victim of Domestic Abuse - Denise. Something in particular that she said really bothered -me and it was this...

In her crisis, that was shared by her two school age children she turned to the church - her church a Catholic Church in the

Archdiocese - she explained her awful situation to her Pastor / priest - he who acts "in persona Christi" -In the person of Jesus Christ - at the consecration. He told her that he couldn't help her and turned her away." "Really?" I exclaimed - somewhat involuntarily. - "Yes." said Denise, "Really". I would like to tell you this happened many years ago when we were all less well informed about this DV epidemic - but it wasn't - it was only 6 years ago.

That said the USCCB issued "When I call for help" - 26 years ago - and updated and reaffirmed the teachings 16 years ago - so this is not a problem of the last few years - but rather one that has not been seriously addressed by society or the media.

A good friend of mine, a deacon I was ordained with, is a member of an ecumenical DV group in Arlington Heights and I borrow his opening line from a talk he gave - it was this:

"Sometimes the person you once trusted the most - is now the one you fear the most."

For most of us that's unimaginable, but for those living in an abusive relationship, it is their reality. A daily unrelenting reality.

Pope Francis said "domestic violence and abuse is NOT a cross one has to bear." The USCCB affirmed this teaching by proclaiming, "such abuse is never acceptable, it's not a cross to bear - seek help urgently". They further add - It is not a punishment from God, and no one is expected to stay in such an abusive relationship - divorce and annulment in such cases are ENCOURAGED!

I would say that was very clear!

Domestic Violence crosses over all socio economic, religious and ethnic groups, it occurs between married couples, unmarried partners, same sex partners, those who may be dating and includes child abuse.

Domestic Violence is a learned purposeful behavior - the abuser needs to have power and control and will use any means to achieve his or her goal: physical threats or actually bodily harm, financial control, intimidation, isolation, emotional and physiological torment- to name some types of abuse.

The abuser needs to feel superior and while their actions may be exacerbated by alcohol, drugs, anger, stress, genetics, they do not cause it and most important to understand neither does the victim or the relationship!

Now at this point some of you, maybe many of you, are sitting here thinking this is a problem in the inner cities, or poor neighborhoods... certainly not in La Grange, Western Springs, Burr Ridge!

Well, if you are thinking that, let me tell you, what the Police Departments of La Grange and Western Springs told me.

¹This year to date they had a combined 150 Domestic trouble 911 calls - i.e. no physical assault but a situation serious

enough to warrant police intervention.

They had 25 domestic battery calls - that is where some form of assault was evident.

And less you think well for villages of a combined population of about 30,000 that's not so bad! Well those my friends are the ones reported - this issue is like an iceberg and that is the tip of the iceberg.

The vast majority of DV abuse goes unreported through fear of the consequences: shame, embarrassment, denial - or the mistaken belief on the part of the victim that they can fix it! They cannot - the victim needs help! Much of it is not reportable because there are no outward signs. Emotional or psychological abuse is often more devastating to the victim who can't prove the abuse but suffers greatly because of it - and the abusers are masters at living a double life - so good that very often his or her friends and family dismiss the victim's pleas for help.

Emotional and psychological abuse is likely more prolific than physical abuse but for obvious reasons we don't have statistics on this - its not a prosecutable crime but it most certainly is a heinous crime in God's eyes.

As I speak, we likely have abusers present. I don't know who you are - you do and your victims most assuredly do - To you I say this - you are hypocrites and you know how much Jesus despised hypocrites.

To the victims here - and I know absolutely we have victims here - please consider what I say because unlike Denise's pastor we have a network at St Cletus to help you.

²On a typical day, DV hotlines in the USA receive 20,000 calls, that's a cry for help every 3 seconds. We tend to think that this is a crime of men over women and indeed one in three women in the USA have been victims of severe physical violence by an intimate partner within their lifetime and 85% of victims are women. Which means one in seven are men!

DV abuse results in more injuries requiring serious medical attention than Accidents, Rapes and Muggings combined.

So that's the problem - What can we do?

Well, Church maybe one of the few occasions the victim can escape their abuser and we need to know how to respond if we are asked for help.

Will WE care, listen, believe, offer support or direction?

Will YOU care, listen, believe, offer support or direction?

We must - such an inquiry or opening up is a desperate plea for help,

- We care because we believe in the dignity of human life.
- We will listen because they are taking us into their confidence at great risk.
- We will BELIEVE them because their stories are painful to live and to tell.
- We will direct them to the resources they need DV hotlines and the DV ministry here at St Cletus run by Kendall Grant, our Social Concerns Director.

- We will be supportive.
- We will keep all our interactions in absolute confidence!

What we will not do is this:

- We will not neglect our duty to treat them as children of God
- We will not doubt them,
- Nor disbelieve them,
- Nor dismiss what they share with us,
- Nor blame them for the situation it's not their fault
- AND certainly we will not refer them to marriage counselling!!
- But we cannot rescue them they have to make their own very difficult choices.

We are to be Jesus to their Bartimaeus - when they talk about their abuse - they are saying "have pity on me " and when they explain their situation "they are asking for our help."

I intend to publish my homily in the bulletin together with the contact information available - if we are given an opportunity to help or indeed already know someone who has indicated they are dealing with DV issues. It behooves us as Christian Faithful to act to help **when asked.**

It is important that the abused individual seeks out the help first, because our intervention may otherwise exacerbate an already chronic situation.

And finally - we the clergy and staff are not the experts - we are the conduit to those that are.

I make this point because Denise, the victim and speaker I referred to earlier, noted to me that the deacons at her parish wanted to meet with her husband, who they knew, to intercede. They were well meaning but had no comprehension of the situation, nor expertise in the field of DV. They **interrogated her** "Denise's words" and it was "clear as day" to Denise their further intervention would have been both disastrous and dangerous for her and her children.

May our Lord protect the victims of DV and may the abusers seek help to address the sinfulness of their ways.

Amen.




