UNITED STATES CONFERENCE OF CATHOLIC BISHOPS

Hunger is criminal, food is an inalienable right.

Families are struggling to put food on the table during this time of economic crisis. Churches and charities are working overtime to meet this rising need, but more must be done. SNAP effectively addresses hunger by delivering resources directly to low-income households to help families keep food on the table. It’s also a proven tool to boost the economy - every dollar spent on SNAP generates between \$1.50 and \$1.80 in economic activity. Congress has the opportunity to protect those who are most vulnerable by strengthening SNAP for the duration of the economic crisis.

Tell Congress to prioritize SNAP in the next COVID-19 relief bill by:

- Increasing the maximum SNAP benefit amount by 15%

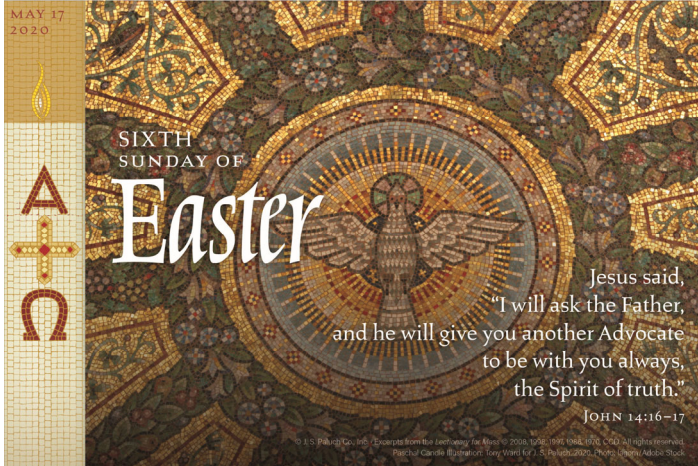

THE REASON FOR OUR HOPE

“What is the reason for your hope?” Imagine somebody coming up to you and asking you that question. Not “What are you hoping for?” or “What are you hoping to do?” No, this isn’t about our desires for possessions or aspirations for life, it’s “Why do you hope?” Peter today tells us that we ought to be ready to give an answer to this question. Truth be told, few of us spend much time thinking about why we hope. Luckily, the scriptures today give us our answers. We hope because Christ suffered for us, in order that we might come to God. We hope because we know that, in the Spirit, God grants us another Advocate through Christ to remain with us always. No matter what we might hope for, whatever we might hope to do, we must always first know and proclaim the reason for our hope: the presence of God in Christ, with us through the power of the Spirit.

SAINT RITA OF CASCIA (1381-1457)

May 22

If you’re ever in Philadelphia on May 22, forget parking anywhere near Saint Rita’s shrine. Cars line streets and fill medians as throngs pack a candlelight vigil and six Masses, honoring this patroness of lost causes, hopeless situations, and—as her statue in countless churches built by twentieth-century immigrants testifies—difficult marriages, troubled homes, and alienated children. Wise people warn, be careful what you pray for. “Divine Savior,” Rita prayed, “let me suffer like you!” Obedient to parents who refused her wish to become a nun, Rita married a man who returned her devotion with twenty years of abuse. When enemies murdered him, Rita’s two sons swore revenge. Paintings depict her pointing the angry boys toward Christ crucified, whom she begged to restrain them. Within the year, both sons died. Alone now, Rita went to the convent but was refused. The nuns feared violence, since one of them was related to the murderer. Rita arranged peace between the families, made vows, and became much sought after as a counselor and intercessor for forty years on earth—and ever since in heaven.

Music Ministry

As our on-line Sunday masses continue, you are enjoying listening to different cantors all of whom are faithful members of our music ministry. It has been particularly wonderful to receive your positive feedback as to how much you have enjoyed seeing these familiar faces and also how you have enjoyed singing along with them from your “front row pew” at home!

In a previous Canticle I was able to provide you a formal introduction to Michael Eardley, our newest cantor as well as some background on the other “Michael”, Mike McComiskey. Today I’m happy to provide you with the history of three cantors who have been St. Cletus “regulars” for quite some time.

Erin Doppke cantored our 3rd Sunday of Easter mass on April 26th. Her beautiful rendition of “In the Breaking of the Bread” referred to the disciples on the road to Emmaus. It wasn’t until Jesus’ followers were again at table with their Lord that “suddenly their eyes were opened!” Wow! If only we could have been there!

Erin most frequently cantors at the 5:00 p.m. mass and is a member of the Contemporary Ensemble. But did you know that Erin has been a cantor at St. Cletus since she was 11 years old? She reminisced that the Music Director at that time may have been either Bernadette Sleighbor or possibly Dick Dluogo. Talk about a blast from the past! She has in more recent history provided solo oratorio work for the Naperville Chorus and also has been a member of the renowned Apollo Chorus. Her husband Jim and son Jack have also participated in the music ministry. They, along with their other two children, seriously remind me of the VonTrapp family.

Lauren Kapusta took to the cantor stand for the 4th Sunday of Easter mass on May 3rd. You may recall that Fr. Bob was the Celebrant for that liturgy and in keeping with the theme of the “Good Shepherd” started by saying how much he missed his flock. Chris Wagner, our on-staff internet technology guru, picked up on this and put together a special “snippet” from that mass and has posted it to our website. The image of Jesus as the shepherd plus Lauren’s beautiful singing of the Psalm 23 response “shepherd me o God beyond my wants, beyond my fears, from death into life” is certainly another way for all of us to experience the presence of God in these most unusual times.

Lauren has been a cantor for about 14 years and is also a member of the Contemporary Ensemble. Her three daughters: Emi, Gabi and Natalie all have lovely voices and have been part of the Combined Youth Choirs. Emi, a student at Fenwick, is now a lector. Gabi and Natalie in addition to being members of the Jr. Choir are altar servers. So, it isn’t unusual to have the entire Kapusta family “on the altar” at one mass while Dad and “Big Bro” are in the congregation.

Finally, George Pach got the call for Sunday May 10th. The Gospel for that week was the very familiar John 14: 1-12, which as Fr. Ken mentioned during the mass, is very often used at funerals. In it Jesus said to his disciples “Do not let your hearts be troubled. You have faith in God; have faith also in me...” Mother’s Day was also celebrated that day so if you attended this mass “on-line” you heard two meaningful solos: “Do Not Let Your Hearts be Troubled” (arranged by Lloyd Larson) which has been sung for the past 9 years, in four-parts, by the Chancel Choir and Shubert’s, “Ave Maria.”

George and his family have been members of St. Cletus since 1991. It was in 1995 he joined the “Penance Choir” (a name given to it by Fr. Gallagher...does anyone know the background of the name?) which had at that time just opened up membership to men. Shortly thereafter he became a cantor and by his own admission was “scared stiff!” Of course George has continued to branch out in his ministries, and is frequently partnered with Brian Jungels (another cantor who we will be hearing from in the weeks ahead) “hawking” Fall Rest raffle tickets, handing out fresh-picked corn on the cob, “hopping around” as Easter bunnies at the Holy Name Society’s pancake breakfast, frequently appearing in the Ed Ward Fine Arts Series productions, etc., etc. Who in our parish has not at one time or other been a recipient of George’s sharing of his gifts and talents? But I bet you didn’t know that he holds a Master’s Degree in Landscape Architecture from the University of Michigan/Ann Arbor. Who would have thought!

It is with great humility that I have been leading the Music Ministry now for just about three years...time flies! To work with such a group of talented and dedicated volunteers has truly been a blessing to me. Be they cantors, choir members, adults or children, they deserve a huge thank you for all they have done to make our parish stronger and our liturgies more meaningful.

However, let me tell you that videoing these masses has been one of my most emotional experiences ever. As we know, a church is not meant to be empty! We are truly a community of believers; and our “community” has not been together, in person, now for quite a few weeks. Fr. Bob may miss his flock, but I miss each one of you! Your smiles, your nods, your SINGING! In the past I have subbed at many parishes and yes, St. Cletus is by far and away one of the most singing/participative congregations I have ever encountered. I hope that each week as you view these pre-recorded masses you will join in singing, keeping your vocal chords in good shape, so that one day, when we are finally able to come back together, whenever that may be, you’ll all be rarin’ to sing out and give God praise and thanksgiving for all He has done for us!

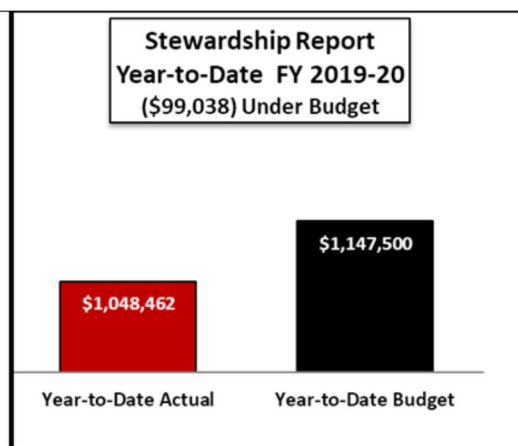
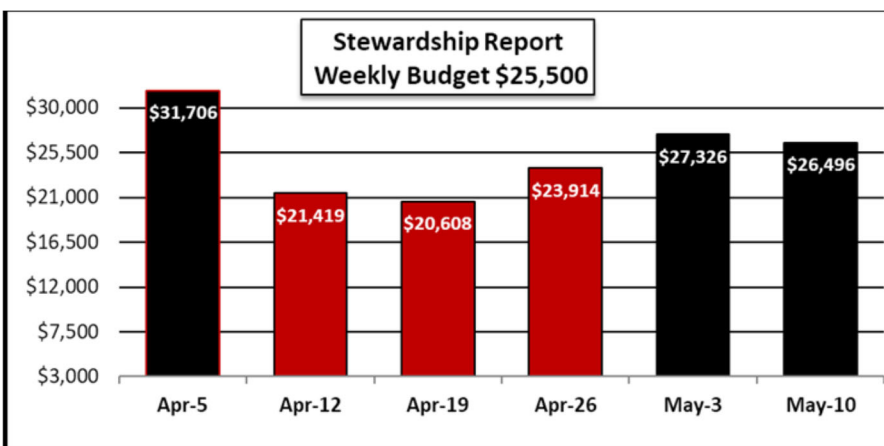
POPE FRANCIS
