

Important Notice about the Reopening of St. Cletus Parish

May 19, 2020

Dear St. Cletus Family,

I pray that you and your loved ones are healthy. As you may have seen, Cardinal Cupich recently shared our multi-phased plan for reopening churches in the Archdiocese of Chicago. Specifically,

- Phase I allows for parishes to reopen for Baptism, Reconciliation, Weddings and Funerals with a limit of 10 attendees.
- Phase IA allows for parishes to reopen for private prayer and adoration with a limit of 10 attendees.
- Phase II allows for reopening for weekday and weekend Masses for larger groups, depending on the guidelines from the state and the capacity of the church building.

Our St. Cletus Reopening Plan

First and foremost, it is important for everyone to understand that our efforts will prioritize the safety and wellbeing of all, while maintaining due respect and reverence for the sacraments and liturgical norms of our faith.

I am assembling a Parish Reopening Leadership Team with parishioner co-captains to lead our efforts. Together, we will attend required training from the Archdiocese to ensure that our parish reopening plan conforms to the guidelines developed by the Archdiocese in collaboration with civil and healthcare authorities. We will also receive a starter kit of protective and cleaning supplies, as well as guidance on purchasing/maintaining supplies ongoing.

Volunteers Needed

We are in need of volunteers to assist with various aspects of our parish reopening plan. Importantly, leadership team members and volunteers must not be part of a "vulnerable population" (that is, not over the age of 65; no underlying medical condition such as diabetes; lung disease; undergoing cancer treatment, etc.). I ask all of you who are younger than 65 and healthy with no underlying health conditions to consider assisting with one of three reopening teams:

- Greeting Team and Ushers. Sample duties include ensuring that entrances and exits are marked and propped physically open prior to attendees' arrival/departure and that windows are open. Ensure that pew and seat tags are all in place; assist in managing the flow of congregants as they enter the church, making sure attendees use hand sanitizer upon entering, are wearing a mask, and are reminded not to enter if ill; directing people to appropriate seating/waiting areas, etc.; assist with congregants movement during the service.
- <u>Set-Up/Sacristan Team</u>. Sample duties include ensuring that all supplies and liturgical vessels needed for each sacramental celebration/gathering are ready for use; ensure that sanctuary and sacristy are cleaned and sanitized before and after each service; clean and sanitize all supplies and vessels used during the service. Masks and gloves will be provided if you do not have your own, in addition to approved cleaning/disinfecting supplies.
- <u>Cleaning Team</u>. Sample duties include disinfecting and cleaning essential and trafficked areas of the church before and after the church has been used. Masks and gloves will be provided, if you do not have your own, in addition to approved cleaning/disinfecting supplies.

The Reopening Leadership Team and I will make sure that all volunteers are properly trained. Please send us a message at reopening@stcletusparish.com to indicate your willingness and ability to volunteer. From those that step forward, we will also request that some act as volunteer captains to help lead each of the three teams.

Timing for Our Reopening

As I mentioned, the Parish Reopening Leadership Team, which is still being formed, will need to complete required training. The parish priests, our business manager, our parish maintenance team and I completed the live one-hour required training webinar when it was offered this past Monday, May 18th. Once determined, all team members and volunteers will also need to complete the training, which will be available on demand. Once we complete the training, we will need to review and complete tasks assigned to all parishes as part of a reopening certification process to be approved by the Archdiocese.

Though the Archdiocese has indicated that a parish *may open* for sacramental celebrations, private prayer or Eucharistic Adoration by this weekend (May 23rd), our parish, like all others in the Archdiocese, will move forward at a pace and timing appropriate for its own situation and on this limited basis, upon receiving certification from the Archdiocese.

Following our training and certification approval, at St. Cletus we will only open our church once the Reopening Leadership Team and I feel confident that we have the right volunteers in place to make it possible to reopen. Again, the need for parishioner assistance cannot be overstated.

The extensive guidelines and measures required to reopen are designed to protect our wellbeing and that of our broader community. There are still many details to be put into place, for even this partial reopening, so that both staff and parishioners can be certain of safety.

And while our parish staff will attempt to take appropriate precautions with the advice of public health authorities, parishioners and guests should understand that they assume the risk of contracting covid-19 anytime they enter a public space since such precautions do not eliminate the risk of infection.

Since we are just in the beginning of the reopening process, St. Cletus will not be ready to reopen this weekend. We will communicate with the parish the exact date that we will be able to reopen.

As Cardinal Cupich has noted, Scripture teaches that we indeed are "our brother's keeper." Our Lord Jesus Christ prayed, "that they all may be one" (*In* 17:21) and commanded us "love one another. As I have loved you, so you also should love one another" (*In* 13:34). Our collective patience, willingness to help, and the care we take to reopen is a demonstration of our unity and love for one another.

May God grant you His peace during this difficult time and may He manifest His love and presence to you in abundant ways.

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE OUTREACH

Airbnb and HotelTonight to help domestic violence victims in Chicago during coronavirus pandemic

Airbnb and HotelTonight will work with anti-domestic violence workers to help domestic violence victims find a place to stay amid the coronavirus, Chicago officials announced.

Under Illinois Gov. J.B. Pritzker's stay-at-home order, there's been an increase in domestic violence calls to the Illinois Domestic Violence Hotline, and the police department has seen a 12% increase in domestic violence calls from Jan. 1 to mid-April, Mayor Lori Lightfoot's office said.

Airbnb and HotelTonight will work with the Illinois Domestic Violence Hotline to help people "flee a violent situation." The hotline will work with HotelTonight and The Network: Advocating Against Domestic Violence to place a hotel reservation on the caller's behalf, officials said.

The Network will cover the costs with money from the state, the city said.

"There is a growing need to support victims of domestic violence as there is increased demand for shelters during the pandemic, and we are pleased to work with the city of Chicago and The Network to help fill this transitional housing need," Kelley Gossett, head of Chicago Policy for Airbnb, said in a statement. "By connecting The Network with accommodations, we hope to help Chicago domestic violence survivors get to a place to stay as quickly as possible."

Lightfoot praised Airbnb in a statement.

"This new partnership with Airbnb creates a key link for individuals fleeing violent situations by affording them immediate safe shelter and enabling them to take the next steps in their journey of recovery and growth," Lightfoot said.

USCCB CALL TO ACTION - SNAP



Hunger is criminal, food is an inalienable right. - Pope Francis

Families are struggling to put food on the table during this time of economic crisis. Churches and charities are working overtime to meet this rising need, but more must be done. SNAP effectively addresses hunger by delivering resources directly to low-income households to help families keep food on the table. It's also a proven tool to boost the economy - every dollar spent on SNAP generates between \$1.50 and \$1.80 in economic activity. Congress has the opportunity to protect those who are most vulnerable by strengthening SNAP for the duration of the economic crisis.

Tell Congress to prioritize SNAP in the next COVID-19 relief bill by:

- Increasing the maximum SNAP benefit amount by 15%
- Increasing the minimum SNAP benefit amount, which is currently only \$16
- Suspending all SNAP rule changes that limit eligibility and benefits

THE RICHNESS OF THE SPIRIT

Students, and most adults recalling their school days, are familiar with the phrase "compare and contrast" that shows up from time to time on tests. Today we hear two different accounts of the giving of the Holy Spirit to the church. Let's contrast, then compare. Luke's account from Acts is filled with arresting details: the mighty wind from heaven, the tongues of flame, the miracle of different languages. John's account seems timid: fearful disciples, the wounded Christ, the expelling of breath from his risen body, not from the sky. Our literal, modern minds wonder which way it happened; our noisy culture probably makes us prefer the former. But if we compare the two, we find that the dazzling richness of the Spirit fills both accounts, for it is the very breath of the risen Christ, ascended to the sky in Luke, that appears to his disciples in John and sends his followers forth to carry on his mission of forgiving sin and proclaiming the mighty acts of God.

SAINT CHARLES LWANGA AND HIS COMPANIONS (MARTYRED 1886-87)

June 3 - "Master of Pages," reputedly the handsomest man in all Uganda, Charles Lwanga, lay catechist, courageously led about forty teenaged boys, Catholics and Anglicans, on a forty-mile forced march to martyrdom for their common Christian faith. Teaching each other the hymns of their different churches, they strengthened one another for the ordeal ahead. King Mwanga, himself barely twenty, had ordered them executed for being "those who pray." But these royal pages were the king's male harem, who, now Christians, refused what pious accounts demurely describe as his "unreasonable demands." Some were clubbed to death, most burned alive; the youngest, thirteen-year old Saint Kizito, whom Charles had often shielded from the King's lust; the most tragic, Saint Mbaga, whose father was his executioner! In 1964, Paul VI canonized the young Catholics and praised their Anglican companions, recalling the heroism of early Christianity's African martyrs, which we modern Christians of far less faith never expected to see repeated. Forty years after the pope's words, what does our faith cost us? Heroism aside, how generous is our response? —Peter Scagnelli, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

Bring Hope to Our Neighbors


Dear Parishioner,

Hello, Neighbor...

I am reaching out to say "hi" and to let you know you are not alone during this trying time.

I am Catholic and every year on the 50th day after Easter my church celebrates Pentecost. Today we remember when Jesus sent the Holy Spirit to his disciples who had been in hiding for 50 days. They were afraid and disillusioned. On Pentecost, Jesus let them know they were not alone, and He is alive in this world. We cannot gather with our faith community today, so I am reaching out to you, my neighbor, to let you know I am praying for you. And to let you know we will get through this.




