A Note from Fr. Elmer

Dear Friends,

I would like to share some updates with you regarding the Priests' residence (Rectory). Our parish is blessed with beautiful buildings such as our church, Parish Center, School and Rectory. Since 1951 you all have done an amazing job in keeping them in great shape. Sensing your care for them since my arrival (July 1st, 2021), I decided to address some urgent maintenance work in the Rectory, specifically the Pastor's living area and workspace. Below you will find details of the work that has been completed as of August 10, 2021.

I also want you to know that before making the decision, I reached out and consulted with the office of our Episcopal Vicar, Chairperson of our Parish Finance Council, Fr. Dan Costello, Associate Pastor, Fr. Robert Clark, our Pastor Emeritus, Debbie Lestarczyk, Parish Business Manager, some parishioners, some pastors, and my mentor priest. Everyone to whom I reached out strongly recommended that we do the work that has now been completed.

I am delighted to let you know that since Thursday, August 12, 2021, I am already residing in the Pastor's suite. With all the work done and completed, it is clean and habitable. I have already started the process of unpacking and organizing my living area and workspace. This will now be my residence until the Archdiocese says otherwise.

Please continue to help me to keep our parish buildings in good shape and welcoming.

The cost paid for this needed project was \$28,554.

Thank you very much for your prayers, trust, and generosity.

DETAILS OF WORK COMPLETED

PASTOR'S LIVING AREA

- Remove all water damage around the framed windows.
 - Clean up and prepare surface and under wall frames and metal corners for the application of new components, such as plaster and compound.
- Apply primer in the living room and bedroom
- Apply two (2) coats of paint in the living room and bedroom.
- Remove ten (10) vinyl windows from living room and bedroom
- Install ten (10) new C G white Aluminum Thermal RSM Windows.
- Remove wood bedroom door and remove steel frame from door. Fix 2x4 frames and make new door frame, also install same door with different swing opening (outside). Fix damaged corners with drywall and plaster and install new moldings (both sides- inside and outside). Then, prime and paint.
- Remove and install approximately twenty-four (24) outlets and eight (8) switches and two 3-way switches.
- Install six (6) new electrical boxes to receive six (6) can lights. Fix three (3) existing can lights facing wall.
- Remove and replace countertop for bathroom sink and new water faucet.
- Install new vertical curtains that cover ten (10) windows.
- Remove and relocate bathroom water pipes to make space for medicine cabinet installation.
- Make new frames and prepare to receive two (2) cabinets.
- Install new medicine cabinet and existing oak cabinet.
- Install two (2) new lights. One in ceiling and one on top of medicine cabinet.
- Remove all ceramic tiles from floor and install new ceramic tiles for floor.
- Fix bathroom electricity by adding two new cables to separate ceiling light, light on top of cabinet and outlet.
- Remove and install new shower head.
- Remove and install new fan in bedroom.

Pastor's Note (continued)

PASTOR'S LIVING AREA (CONTINUED)

- Remove and replace new toilet seat.
- Wash and disinfect three walls and shower.
- Install two (2) new lightproof curtains.
- Remove old insulation from air conditioning in the Pastor's bedroom and install new insulation to prevent humidity and water leaks.

PASTOR'S OFFICE

- Prepare and prime.
- Paint two (2) colors and two (2) coats of paint.
- Remove and install weather strips in exterior door by the deck.
- Install new aluminum cap in exterior door by the deck in the Pastor's office.

RECTORY ENTRANCE

- Install new oak stairs with stain and two (2) coats of varnish (Synteko) – in entrance.
- Install new wood baseboard approximately 60 ft. linear. Primed and painted – in entrance.
- Install new wood shoe base approximately 60 ft. linear. Primed and painted – in entrance.

RECTORY DINING ROOM AREA

- Plaster hallway
- Prime and paint hallway
- Additional Work
- Install downspouts by the north entrance of the building.
- Reconnect downspouts in-between entrance doors.

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE OUTREACH

How long have you known me?

“I can barely speak about what goes on in my home. Well, it’s not really my home. At their insistence I moved in with my son and his wife. They thought I was unsafe in my old home and they wanted me here. What could I say? It seemed generous on their part. How was I to know it would come to this? It all began as I moved slower and slower. They seemed so impatient with me. They would tell me, “get a move on, we don’t have all day.” But I just couldn’t move as fast as they wanted. They began saying other mean things to me, then they began pushing me to get me to move faster. I don’t know what overcame them. Finally, she pushed me and I fell. Oh, then things really began to happen. They couldn’t get me up, and finally had to call for help. When the ambulance came, they told them I was walking and just fell down. At the emergency room the doctor wondered why I had those finger marks on my arms, but I didn’t tell him. After all, where would I live if someone arrested my children for hurting me?”

MYTH: Domestic Violence can occur in older women, but it is quite rare.

FACT: Approximately half of all elder abuse in women is thought to be domestic violence “grown old.” Older battered women are less likely to seek and receive help.

THE SOLEMNITY OF THE ASSUMPTION OF MARY



Today's feast celebrates Mary's Assumption into heaven. It is one of three feasts of Mary that are Holy Days of Obligation for Catholics in the United States. January 1 is the feast of Mary, the Mother of God, and December 8 is the feast of the Immaculate Conception of Mary (where we recognize that Mary was conceived without original sin). The assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary into heaven has long been held as an important Catholic belief. The belief was not defined as dogma, however, until 1950 by

Pope Pius XII. The dogma teaches that Mary, who was without sin, was taken, body and soul, into the glory of heaven. You will not find this story in the Bible. However, a tradition handed down from the earliest days of the Church says that Mary died in Jerusalem and was buried in a tomb. When the Apostles opened the tomb again, her body was gone. Why would God take Mary's body and soul into heaven? In part because Mary is so special to God. She said "yes" to becoming the mother of Jesus and trusted God with all her heart. God also wanted to show us that one day, all of us will share in the bodily resurrection of Jesus. Mary is the first person in the Church to experience the resurrection in its fullness.

Today's Gospel highlights Mary's faith. Mary's faith enabled her to recognize the work of God in her people's history and in her own life. Her openness to God allowed God to work through her so that salvation might come to all. Mary is a model and symbol of the Church. May we be like Mary, open and cooperative in God's plan of salvation.

Here are a few ideas of ways you can celebrate this holy day of obligation as a family:

1. Do you have an herb garden? It is traditional to bless herbs on the feast of the Assumption. This is a Germanic tradition. Here is a simple blessing you can use:

Almighty everlasting God, who by your word alone brought into being the heavens, earth, sea, things seen and things unseen, and garnished the

earth with plants and trees for the use of man and animals; who appointed each species to bring forth fruit in its kind, not only for the food of living creatures, but for the healing of sick bodies as well; with mind and word we urgently call on you in your great kindness to bless + these various herbs and fruits, thus increasing their natural powers with the newly given grace of your blessing. May they keep away disease and adversity from men and animals who use them in your name; through Christ our Lord.

All: Amen.

2. Add in fruits and herbs into meals you are cooking today. Perhaps you can make a special dessert with fruit in it!
3. You can pray the Rosary together, recalling the Glorious Mysteries. If you cannot pray an entire Rosary, you can say one decade together focusing on the Assumption (one of the Glorious Mysteries).
4. Gather a special bouquet of flowers today and place them in a vase near a statue of Mary or an image of Mary in your home.
5. Have your children color in a picture of Mary, and talk about her life with them as they color.
6. Make a cupcake rosary with your children!

MASKING POLICY UPDATE

We are grateful for the heroic work done these past months by our clergy, school staff and other employees to keep our places of worship, education and work safe for all we serve. As we continue to monitor guidance of public health authorities and respect the input of our employees and school families, we must remain flexible in our policies. Only by doing so can we maintain safety so all feel protected in our facilities.

The rise in the number of COVID-19 cases and hospitalizations attributable to the highly transmissible delta variant understandably has caused a shift in the guidance of public health authorities.

Cook and Lake Counties and the City of Chicago have reached the threshold for “Substantial Transmission” of the virus. Therefore, the Counties’ and Chicago’s Departments of Public Health, consistent with IDPH and the CDC have issued guidelines strongly recommending that all persons, vaccinated or unvaccinated mask in all indoor public spaces.

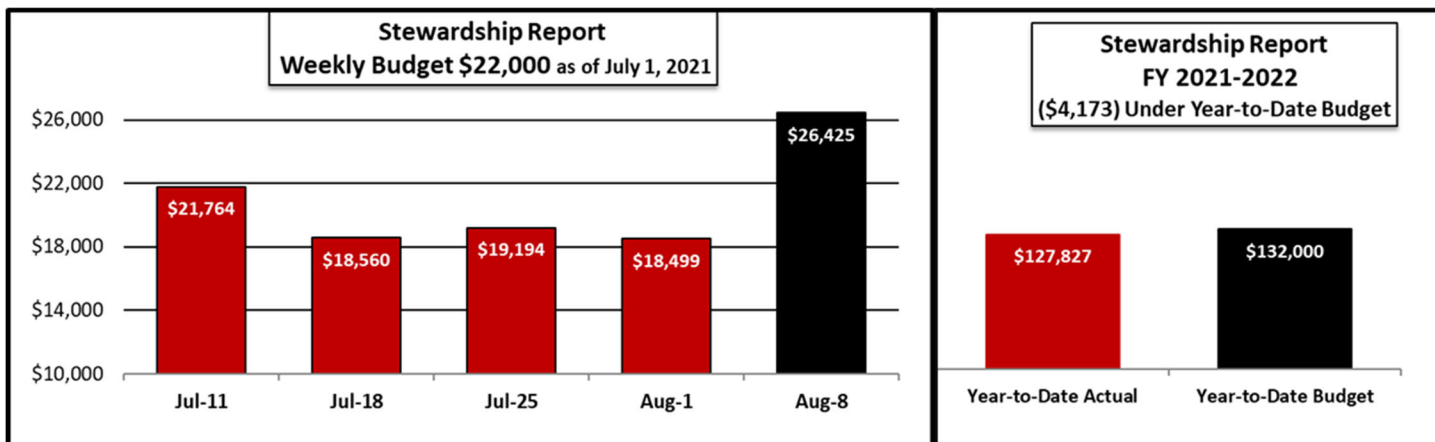
We will follow this new guidance. **Beginning now, it is strongly recommended that all persons entering Archdiocesan facilities be masked regardless of their vaccination status.** This applies to parish offices, schools, churches and other public spaces. Observance of this policy aligns us with public health officials layered mitigation strategies. Further guidance on mask usage during liturgies will be forthcoming for clergy and lay ministers. We will release student and staff mask guidelines for the beginning of the 2021-2022 school year shortly.

We will continue to monitor the situation and will reevaluate our policy if conditions and public health guidance warrants it. It is our hope and our prayer that measures taken now and scrupulously applied will enable us to adopt a mask-optional policy for vaccinated persons in the future. Certainly we are disappointed and saddened that infection and serious illness rates have again surged. We must do our part to bring the pandemic under control and the suffering to an end. This is both our civic and Christian duty. Thank you for all you have done and continue to do to keep each other and the people we serve safe and well.
