



Notes from Fr. Bob...

31ST SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

There is a French saying which, roughly translated, means: "Give a man a peaked cap, and he immediately behaves like a policeman." something about the trappings of authority that appeals to our worst instincts of arrogance and pride. Down through the ages both the armed forces and the Church have made quite a clever use of this tendency. They increase the grandeur of their uniforms to fit the importance of the role of office or responsibility. The flamboyance or dignity of dress is meant to impress others with the authority of the person, but there is also an expectation that the wearer of the robe or uniform will behave in a way fitting to the level of authority and responsibility the dress signifies. This expectation is not always fulfilled! Some bearers of office get carried away by their external array and believe they are dictators of others rather than their servants. It is in no way surprising that the fourth estate, the Press, has always considered it an important duty to prick such balloons and expose such behavior when it is spotted. We do have high expectations of people in positions of authority. In our democratic society these expectations seem to have increased rather than decreased. When they fall short of our expectations, the wolf pack descends, and particularly if someone has been preaching a highly moral message and their own way of living turns out to be precisely the opposite.

We are coming towards the final chapters of Matthew's account of the public life of Jesus. Before the narrative of his passion Jesus preaches his last great discourse, often called the eschatological discourse because of its preoccupation with "the last things", the discussion of what is to happen at the end of the world. Before he begins this reflection, Jesus launches into a long and stinging attack on the scribes and the Pharisees. Matthew may have placed this attack here because intermingled with the account of the last things is an awareness of the more contemporary events surrounding the destruction of Jerusalem. It was at this point that the early Christian communities made the definitive split with their Jewish roots, and particularly with the Pharisees who would carry the responsibility of keeping Judaism alive after the destruction of the Temple. This is the point at which the Church starts out on its own. It is a willing break, and the unfinished business with its Jewish roots will echo tragically down through the ages. The collection of sayings by Jesus in which he attacks the scribes and Pharisees is intended to reassure the early Christian communities that they are on the right track. The attack is



life for the sake of those he loves.

If we are honest, we cannot claim to have fully appreciated or applied this central message of the gospel. Many reform movements in the Church have begun because people have felt the leaders of the Church have in turn abused their positions of authority and power. "What we have once condemned is what we have now become" (Andre Gide). The only difficulty is that what begins as genuine reform so often ends up as a power struggle on both sides. To use force to enforce one's view is too much of a temptation, and it is rapidly accompanied by devoting one's energies to self-aggrandizement rather than service. Even children can be dominated by the desire for external signs of acceptability and street credibility. We only need such masks to cover our inner emptiness and self-doubt, which is why Jesus chooses the opposite track. He takes on that very emptiness we fear. He becomes the one who is cast out and abused. And he did not say following in his footsteps would be easy only that the truth lies in that direction.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

What is the name of the pope's cathedral? If you said the Vatican, or St. Peter's, you were off by a few miles, since the answer is the Basilica of St. John, the Lateran, the "Mother Church" of all the churches of the world and the cathedral of the Diocese of Rome. It takes its name from the Lateran family, the Trumps of their day, who somehow ran afoul of the Emperor Nero. He seized all their property, including their vast Roman palace and estate. We don't know how Plautius displeased Nero so badly, but eventually all the Lateran property came to Constantine, the first Christian emperor, through his wife, Fausta. Early in the fourth century, when Christianity was at last legalized, Constantine gave the property to the church. Soon the great meeting halls were expanded and adapted.

Over the centuries, the church building has been sacked by armies, ruined by fire, torn down, and rebuilt. The oldest and most unchanged part of the Lateran is a vast, separate baptistery with steps leading down to a huge green basalt pool. Imagine what a triumphal moment the dedication of this public church building was for a community that had worshiped in secret for so long! This Thursday's feast of the Dedication of the Lateran Basilica is really about the tradition of consecrating space for worship, and so by extension, a feast for your parish church building and, given the beautiful second reading, for its baptistery as well.



Catholic Charities Advocacy Alert Take Action: Support Immigrant Domestic Violence Crime Victims

Immigrants who experience domestic violence or other crimes often do not report to the police for fear that going to the police could lead to deportation. In 2000, Congress created the U visa, which enables immigrant victims of certain crimes to stay and work temporarily in the US if they cooperate with law enforcement, and the T visa, which offers similar protection to trafficking victims.

To qualify for a T or U visa, an immigrant needs local police or another investigating agency to provide a certification that documents the immigrant's cooperation. Many law enforcement agencies, however, refuse to issue certifications or delay their responses. These delays and refusals block immigrants from being able to apply for U and T visas, and discourage them from coming forward to work with law enforcement.

These certifications do not grant any immigration benefits. This bill clarifies that U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) must evaluate all U and T visa applications, and is solely responsible for deciding whether the applicant is a qualifying victim of a qualifying crime to whom it will issue a U or T visa. This bill requires ONLY that a certifying agency complete the certification in a truthful and timely manner.

Please contact your State Senators and Representatives today to support SB 32 and SB 33 during the veto session now in Springfield.

Let them know you care: "As a constituent of your district, I stand with Catholic Charities in its support of SB 32 and SB 33 so that immigrants experiencing domestic violence do not continue to live in fear and can count on help from local law enforcement."

The AARP Tax-Aide Program is now seeking volunteers for the upcoming 2018 filing season. It's not necessary for you to be an AARP member nor have a tax or an accounting background to volunteer. However, some knowledge of your own personal tax matters is very helpful. All returns are prepared on computers, thus volunteers should be somewhat computer literate. 




