Pastor's Note

"If your mind is like a garden, you can observe it, pull weeds, and plant flowers," *Neuro Dharma, New Science, Ancient Wisdom, and Seven Practices of the highest Happiness,* Rick Hanson, PhD

Dear Parishioners,

How often do we intentionally pause and pay attention to our mind? Every day we have a lot of wonderful things to do. We have responsibilities that need our care and attention. We also have distractions, tensions, misunderstandings, and so forth that come our way. As we cope and engage them, we might find ourselves with not much time left to notice how our mind is helping us (or not) to become the person that God has created us to be.

The good news is that there is always time to engage our mind. Some are good at this. Some might find themselves in the process of trying. Others might be wondering and asking themselves, "how can I do this?"

First, simply acknowledge that your mind needs your attention.

Second, reach out and seek guidance from those who seem to be at peace, carry themselves well, and radiate true joy and happiness. They may be our parents, grandparents, teachers, mentors, a friend, and so forth.

Third, intentionally grow in your relationship with the Lord through the practice of your faith.

Fourth, grab a good book like the Bible or any other book that truly helps you to understand yourself better, to become the person you desire to be, and to live a life that is meaningful, peaceful, and rewarding.

On Saturday, May 14th, 2022, at Mundelein Seminary, four young men were ordained deacons by Cardinal Blase J. Cupich for the Archdiocese of Chicago. They are, Kevin Gregus, Daniel Korenchan, Francisco Pagan and Jesus Raya. The liturgy was beautiful. The chapel was filled with family, friends, parishioners, and those who were responsible for their priestly formation.

I was blessed to know them from the first day they joined the seminary. Each of them was carefully guided in their seminary formation to explore and get in touch with their mind. Each of them received the help they needed to think more like Christ. As they engaged their priestly formation, it was encouraging to see the progress they made each year.

With their diaconate ordination, they are saying to the world that they are ready and committed to serve God and His holy people, the Church. They are extraordinary young men. They can also be a source of inspiration for us as we seek to open our minds to the Lord's presence and guidance. Please let us keep these new deacons in our daily prayers as we continue to pray for more vocations to the priesthood and religious life.

Finally, our parish is waiting for a new Associate Pastor. Once appointed by Cardinal Blase J. Cupich, he will join our parish as of July 1st, 2022. Following the counsel of an experienced pastor, I am asking all of us to be actively part of this process by praying for our new Associate Pastor. Tina Norton, the Pastoral Associate, prepared a wonderful prayer that was printed in our bulletin last weekend (page 10). Let's all pray that the Lord will send us a caring priest.

May we each day let the good and gracious Lord continue to share His grace with us and to tend our minds like a garden so that we may yield for Him a great harvest.



Después de su muerte en el año 670 d.C., las personas que visitaron su monasterio afirmaron que tenía poder curativo. Fiacre se representa en el arte y la estatuaria como un anciano que lleva una pala (ver arriba).

RETURNING TO ORDINARY LIFE

Six weeks into our Easter rejoicing, the Church gives us readings today that start preparing us for a return to ordinary life. The Acts of the Apostles and the Gospel both dwell on proper daily behavior for followers of Jesus, while the reading from Revelation reminds us why we bother with laws at all. In Acts, leaders of the church meet to discuss which essential elements of the Mosaic Law converts must obey if they wish to be disciples of Jesus Christ. John's Gospel reflects back to the Last Supper discourse when Jesus himself emphasizes the importance of obeying God's commandments. Observing God's law, says Jesus, shows a desire to be intimate with the Lord. We follow rules not for their own sake, but to love God and neighbor better. His legend is this: Fiacre asked the local bishop for more ground on which to plant food and herbs. The bishop told him he could have as much land as he could entrench in one day. After prayer, Fiacre used the point of his staff to turn the earth, topple trees and dig up

briers and weeds to prepare the land for a garden. After his death in 670 A.D., people who visited his monastery claimed that it had healing power. Fiacre is depicted in art and statuary as an elderly man carrying a spade.

Statement of Cardinal Cupich on the racist mass shooting in Buffalo, NY

On Saturday, May 14, a gunman used an AR-15, high-capacity assault weapon to murder 10 Black Americans at a Buffalo grocery store, wounding two bystanders. Many of his victims were near or beyond retirement age, including Pearl Young, 77, a grandmother of eight who taught Sunday school, and Katherine Massey, 72, a civil-rights advocate who had written in favor of stronger gun-safety laws. Civil authorities say the 18-year-old suspect traveled hours to carry out his rampage, apparently leaving behind a manifesto filled with white supremacist ideology, including the vile conspiracy theory that people of color are "replacing" white Americans.

In 2019, a gunman who shot up a Walmart in Texas wrote a similar manifesto that referred to the same conspiracy theory, complaining of a "Hispanic invasion of Texas." Whatever the theory, white supremacism is a lie. This ideology is not always so explicitly expressed, but it is condemnable whether it hides behind slippery political rhetoric or does not bother with any fig leaves of deniability.

We must pray for the victims of this outrageous act. We must keep them in our thoughts. But that is not all we are obliged to do. As Christians, we are called to be our brothers' and sisters' keepers. Part of that obligation entails being witnesses to truth. When this chapter of American history is written, what will our grandchildren say about what we did to protect the marginalized? What will they say about how we responded to a culture that became increasingly tolerant of rhetoric that demonizes our fellow human beings on the basis of their race or ethnicity or religion or sex? Will they wonder how we could have become inured to daily gun violence and mass shootings, how our consciences were numbed to the consequences of violence-inspiring rhetoric? Will they wonder at our failure to stop dangerous people from procuring assault weapons, including children, or our failure to see how social media is being used to rend the social fabric? What will they think about how we responded to a moment in which a Black American, indeed any person of color, is forced by the scourge of racism to live in fear?

These questions should preoccupy our minds as we stand at this cultural crossroads. We need not choose the path of indifference. We can choose to listen to the suffering of our brothers and sisters who suffer racism in all its forms — and then act to build a more just society. We can choose to face the challenge of gun violence, including that which occurs daily in the Chicago area, by enacting common-sense federal safety laws that help keep firearms out of the hands of irresponsible people and end the flow of firearms across state borders.

We can choose to take the path of love and see in our neighbors the face of Christ. We Christians can choose to act as though we actually believe that we, indeed all human beings, are made in God's image.

It is in this spirit of family that we must stand in solidarity with the victims of the Buffalo massacre, with the victims of gun violence here in Chicago and across the nation, with victims' loved ones, indeed with all people who face the threat of racism every day, holding fast to the knowledge that we are beloved by God, not because of how we look or where we or our ancestors were born, but because we are of God, made in his image, and directed toward love.




